SAFETY IS IMPORTANT DURING FARM MACHINERY REPAIR
Farm machinery repair during winter is wise management. Repairs made now will relieve busy season pressures. According to accident statistics, however, more persons are injured repairing machinery than are operating it. This caution from Wayne Fisher, Extension Safety Specialist, University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service.

Fisher offers some safety tips he hopes can avoid injuries. Eye injuries are quite common. Safety goggles are recommended, especially when hammering on steel or working with the emery wheel. Eye protection is a nuisance but, Fisher warns, not as much as the loss of any eye would be. Eyes of others working in the shop can be protected from the welder's flash by a simple home built portable screen.

Electric cords are easily damaged in shop conditions. Broken or poorly repaired cords are not dependable and are dangerous. Placing the cord out of the way should be given time and attention. If broken, a proper splice should be made.

Strain injuries are common during equipment repair. The weight of objects to be handled should be recognized and a hoist used when needed. Lifting injuries are often initiated by: bending over to lift, reaching while lifting or twisting the body to turn. Proper picking up procedures are: kneel on one knee, boost the heavy object onto the other knee and then rise up with it. Wrong lifting can rupture the diaphragm in the chest cavity as well as cause back injuries and common hernia. Heavy objects also smash fingers and toes. Thinking and planning are an important part of lifting injury prevention.

Fall accidents most often occur due to shop clutter. Fisher warns a "trip" may land you in the hospital. Special care to clear things away should be given when objects must be carried or when doing work that needs extra effort or concentration. Obstacles underfoot during these conditions do not receive due

Nutrition Program To Begin In County

The WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) program has been started at the Latah County office of the North Central District Health Department. WIC is a nutrition program sponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture. The local health district operates the program and issues food vouchers. These food vouchers are in turn exchanged for certain nutritious foods at retail grocery stores. These foods would include eggs, milk, cheese, fruit juices, cereals, and baby formulas.

Women, infants and children are eligible for WIC if they meet certain nutritional risk and low income criteria. Those eligible are pregnant women, breastfeeding women, infants to one year of age and children to 5 years of age.

If you have questions about this program or wish to make an appointment to participate in this program, call the Health Department at 882-7506 in Moscow.

This program is different from the food stamp program. Persons who receive food stamps may also take advantage of this program, if they meet the above qualifications. Persons who do not qualify for food stamps, may qualify for the WIC program if the above guidelines are met.

Caring for Nosebleeds
Among today's active youngsters, nosebleeds are a common occurrence, notes the Idaho Medical Association. Combined with a child's energy any number of seemingly innocent objects can result in the inevitable. When it happens, you might try this technique, suggested by the American Academy of Pediatrics:

First, with the youngster seated, have him or her blow out all blood and clotted material. Then insert into the bleeding nostril a wedge of cotton moistened with clean water or with hydrogen peroxide.

With a finger against the outside of the injured nostril, apply firm pressure for five minutes.

If bleeding stops, leave the packing in place and check with your family physician. If bleeding persists, secure medical care.

attention. Cleaning up clutter, organizing tools, having and using the right tool, having eye protection easily available and using it, planning how you are going to do things are ways which can help get repair work done, quicker, better and safer. Fisher recommends fixing things now, but urges taking time to do it right and safe.

Each square inch contains 78 nerves to record pain, 650 sweat glands, 20 blood vessels, 78 sensory heat regulators, 13 sensory cold regulators, 1,300 nerve endings, 19,500 sensory cells at the ends of nerve fibers, 160 pressure apparatus for the sense of touch, 100 sebaceous glands, 65 hairs and muscles, and 19,500,000 cells.

All of these work together to perform the six essential functions of the skin: protection, temperature regulation, sensation, secretion, excretion and respiration.

Considering the countless insults it is subjected to, the skin's uncomplaining and continuing function is amazing, but it does rebel at times.

There is a long and growing list of substances that can cause problems for some people—cosmetics, leather, synthetic fibers, plastics, wool various chemicals, base metals, rubber, animal dander, certain plants, fur, feathers, and other things.

In adolescence the skin rebels at temporary overactivity of the oil glands of the face and the result is acne, which does need treatment. At other times the hair, which is part of the skin, may produce dandruff, fall out, or grow in the wrong places.

The skin must last a lifetime. If problems arise, see your physician. Don't gamble that they will go away.

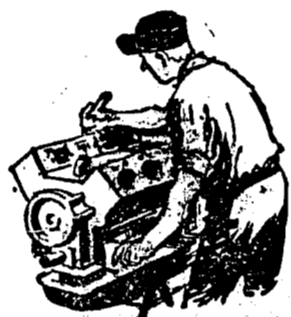

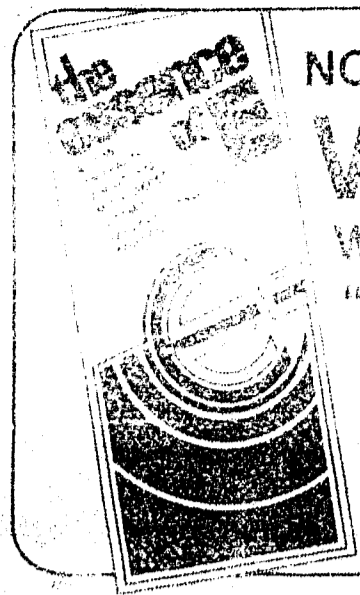

**State Rep. Lester Clemm
Attends House Hearings**

State Representative Lester Clemm reports he has attended the House hearings on Revenue Projections, which are forthcoming for the 1977 session, which started Monday in Boise.

He reports that the economic indicators reflect a good climate for Idaho, he said. All of the information reported to the committee would indicate a revenue of about \$277 million to \$81 million, which is up from the 1977 fiscal year of about \$252 million.

The obvious weak spot, Clemm said, is the agricultural producers, i.e., the potato, beet, wheat and cattle people, who are in a real bind with low prices and high costs. However personal income in manufacturing and wholesales in Idaho is the bright spot in our economic picture, he noted. The Carter administration's stimulus should be added strength to the outlook.

Statistics are showing very clearly that Idaho is no longer dependent upon the personal income of agricultural producers, but is now a broad based economic unit capable of good growth where farm income is down. However, if there is prolonged adverse conditions in agriculture it is bound to reduce the state income.

The Revenue Projection Committee and the Joint Finance Appropriations committee are of the opinion we can meet our obligations without increased taxes.

Talk on Nutrition and Diet**

The Lewis-Clark Group of the National Association of Bank Women, Inc., gathered at the Helm Restaurant on Tuesday, January 11 for a dinner and meeting. Following the dinner, Christine Bjornstad, M. D. spoke to the group on diet and care of the human body. She explained how to maintain one's body health and at the same time the desired weight. Fad diets were disclaimed and described as fads only and weight losses are short term only.

Dr. Bjornstad recommended a combination of "behavior modification" practices, a sensible balanced diet, and regular exercise for long term weight control and good health. She explained "behavior modification" as determining what and why we eat, and then shopping habits and association habits to correct eating habits.

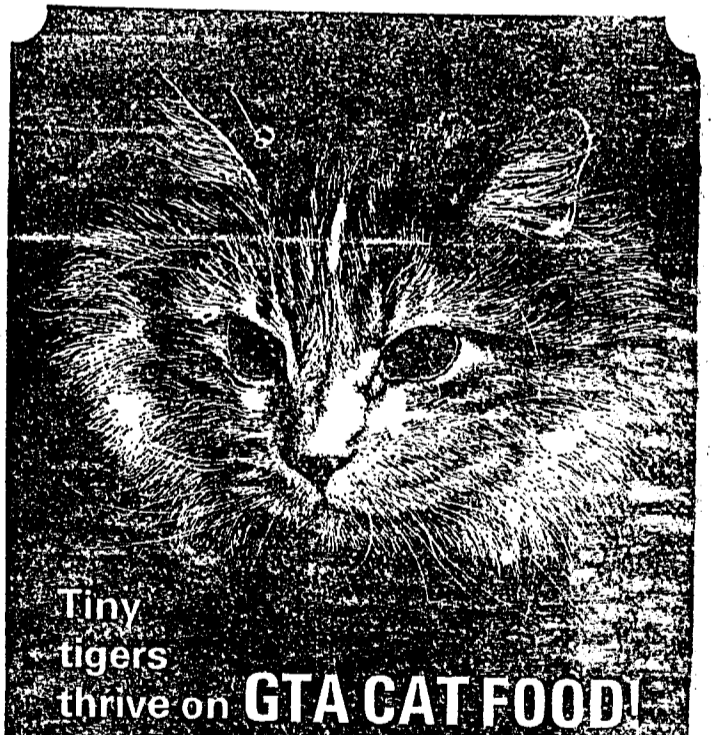

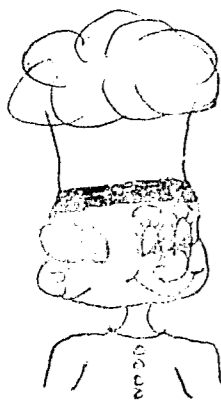
