DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Eighteen persons were placed on jobs this week through the assistance of the Moscow Office of the Department of Employment said Frank Hartstein, Moscow local office manager. Hartstein said that notices of 14 new job availabilities were received and that 5 remain unfilled at week end. Included are openings for a qualified institutional cook, charge nurse, journeyman mechanic, teacher's aide, and a police officer. Interested persons should contact the Moscow Local Office at 221 E. 2nd, Moscow.

Hartstein also reported that the Latah County unemployment figure

climbed to 519 this week, slightly higher than last week's 510, while 598 persons were receiving jobless benefits at this time a year ago. He attributed the increase to continued layoffs in the construction, forest-related and agricultural industries. Moscow's unemployment total reached 302, an increase of 14 over last week's figure, Hartstein said, while 314 Moscow workers were unemployed during the same week in 1976. The number of persons in other Latah county areas receiving unemployment insurance benefits remained fairly stable. Area totals—Genesee; 17, 19 last week, 20 a year ago; Troy-Deary-Bovill; 106, 104 and 125; Kendrick; 18, 22, compared to 26 in 1976, and Potlatch with 76, 77 and 85.

AN ORDINANCE TERMED "ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL, APPROPRIATING MONEY IN SUCH SUM AND Sums AS ARE DEEMED NECESSARY TO DEFRAID ALL PROPER EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF GENESEEE, IDAHO, NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED FOR, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING THE FIRST DAY OF JANUARY, 1977, PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 50-1003, IDAHO CODE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Genesee, Idaho:

Section 1. That there is appropriated out of any money in the City Treasury, for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses and liabilities of the City of Genesee, Idaho for the fiscal year beginning the first day of January, 1977 the sum and sums of money or so much thereof as may be necessary for the following amount, to-wit:

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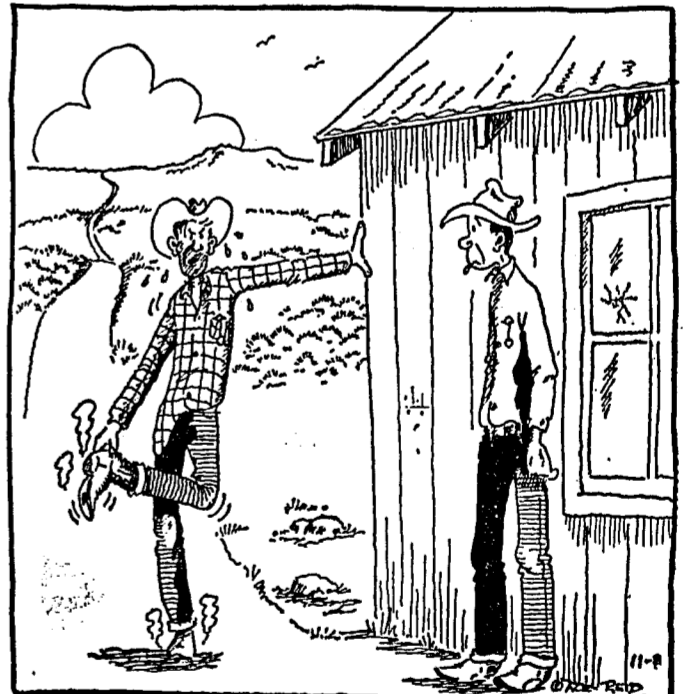
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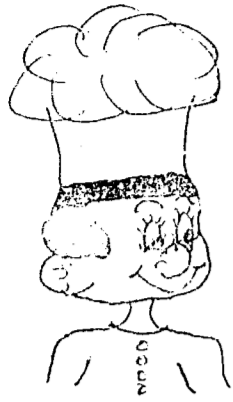

Open House Fair and Pancake Feed

Two weeks ago I met with the secondary teachers to discuss what plans, if any, we should make for a parent-teacher conference night at the Jr.-Sr. high school this year. After the groans and grumbles had subsided, I was able to discern a few comments about past attempts to get parents and teachers together. One teacher said, "Only a few parents ever come, usually just those of good students." — "We never get to see the parents of students we really need to talk with." Someone else remarked, "Many of us that have been here for awhile know all the parents and we see and talk with them alot at school activities already." Another person added, "If we do have an open house this year, let's try something different!" "We're as tired, as I'm sure the parents are, of doing the same thing." At this point, I was starting to regret having brought up the subject. However, as the discussion progressed, some good ideas were beginning to generate. The benefits of parent-teacher communications and the probable success of an informative well organized open house were beginning to overcome the initial feelings of apathy. As the enthusiasm built, more and more reasons were becoming evident why we should try hard to get parents involved with our school and the education of their children. Some of the more obvious benefits for having an open house that were brought up are as follows: (1) Provide an opportunity for the new teachers and parents to meet each other. (2) Explain to parents what teachers have been doing in their classes and display some student accomplishments and class project. (3) Discuss individual student progress with concerned parents. (4) Establish an attitude of working together to improve the education of our kids. Our meeting culminated with the decision to have an Open House Fair in the gymnasium early in March in conjunction with a pancake feed. This informal type meeting will hopefully provide an atmosphere conducive to the betterment of school-community relations.

Speech Therapists Returns—

Beth Ologg, our speech and hearing specialist whose services we share with other local school districts, will be back with us for six weeks to continue her therapy work with kids at Kendrick. Miss Ologg works primarily with children at the elementary, but does see a few students at the Jr. Sr. High School. After working a six-week block last fall at Kendrick, I was please to learn that Miss Ologg contacted the parents of her students to inform them of therapy methods they could use at home until she could return. As the elementary children would say, "Welcome back, Miss 'O'".

Field Trips—

I would like to mention a few of the field trips that some of our kids have gone on or will be taking in the near future.

Mr. Blake took his sixth grade class to the WSU Planetarium last

week as part of their astronomy unit in science. This was a good learning experience and the kids, as usual, had a great time. The eighth grade science classes and the Advanced Science class will repeat the sixth grade's trip to the W. S. U Planetarium this week, but will also visit the observatory and nuclear reactor. These classes will be accompanied by their instructors Mr. Barker and Mrs. Thomas.

Mrs. Reideringer's Bookkeeping Classes will visit the Computer Center at the University of Idaho next week. This should be a fascinating and informative adventure for those who have never been exposed to computer programming.

The FPA is planning on a sleigh riding party or a roller skating trip depending on whether or not some of that white stuff falls within the next few weeks.

We will also be having our third National School Assembly next week featuring a trampoline exhibition.

The possibilities that exist outside the 2x4 (two covers of the textbook and four walls of the classroom) are extremely exciting as well as educational for the students.

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
