There is the ever present problems with dogs. All dogs taken up for running at large will be confined. If the dog owner is known he will be notified. Charges will be \$2.00 per day for food and care and an impounding fee of \$15.00 will be charged. If a dog is not licensed, the license fee must be paid before the dog is released. Dogs will be impounded no longer than five days. Any person may take up any dog running at large and deliver same to the Dog Catcher and will receive a certificate entitling him to receive remuneration for such services. If you have any questions regarding our Ordinance dealing with dogs, please contact the Clerk.

Kendrick's Tiger basketball team scored a major upset last Tuesday night by defeating the visiting Troy Trojans 60-46. Friday night the top-ranked Prairie Pirates came up to Kendrick and knocked off the KHS team 56-46.

Troy, highly regarded among both district and state A-3 teams fell behind in the first quarter and couldn't catch up last Tuesday. Coach Bill LaMunyan said this was one of the few balanced games his team had played. "We had only 7 turnovers and shot 44 percent from the field", he said.

Kendrick was ahead 25-23 at the half and closed with a 19 point final quarter to nail down the win. Doug Silflow paced the winners with 14 points, Rob Maynard had 10, Tim Eichner 13, Doug Parks 8, Doug Lohman 4, Tony Snyder 9 and Brockie 2.

Troy took the JV game 62-53. Prairie closed with rush Friday night to defeat the Tigers 56-46 despite the 21-point effort of Doug Silflow. The Tigers were trailing 16-11 at the end of the first quarter and 26-24 at the half. A big 20 point outburst by the Pirates in the fourth quarter ended Kendrick's hopes of another upset.

Potlatch will be in Kendrick Friday night for the last home game of the season. Members of the KHS drill team will perform at intermission.

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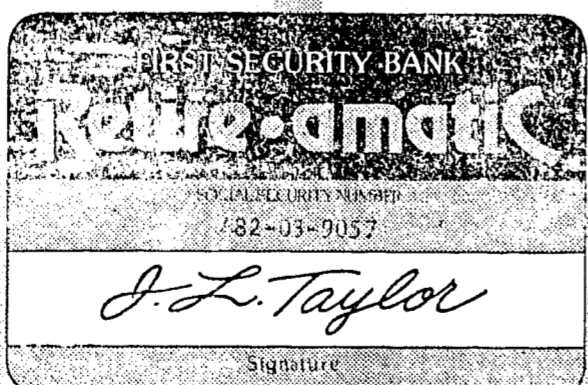

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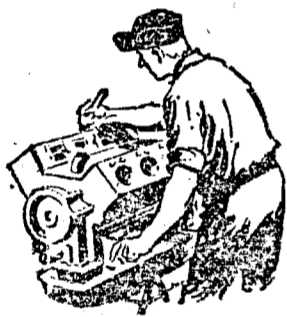

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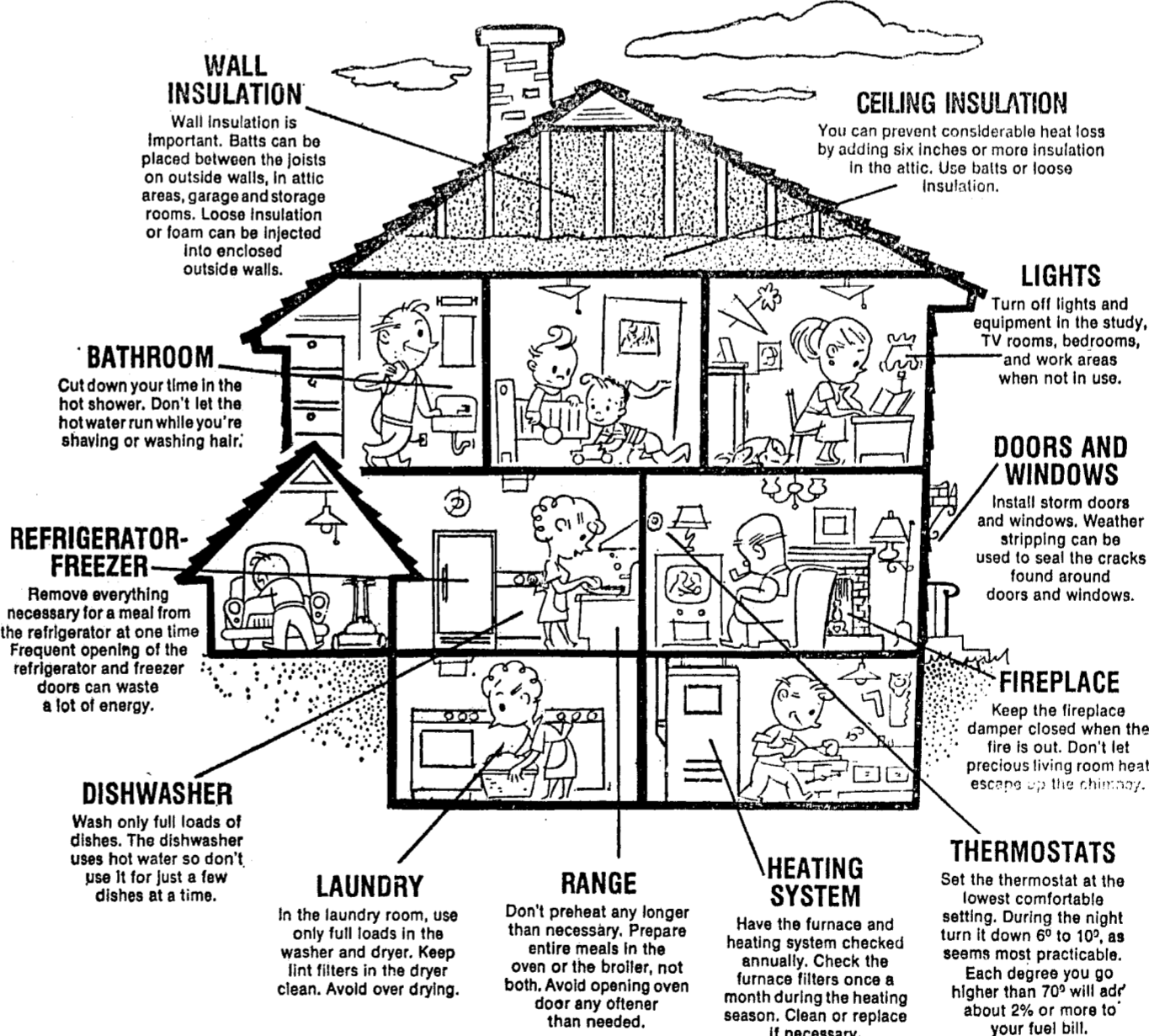
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**Conserving energy is a good family habit**




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**Collages To Be Made By Garden Club**

**RIRIE FISHING CLOSED**

Due to high catch rates and heavy fishing pressure, the Department of Fish and Game is closing Ririe Reservoir to fishing.

The emergency closure is effective January 31 and will continue until May 27, the department said.

**Home Cookin'...**

The recipes this week are some I found while looking through some recipes that had been sent to me several years ago in Genesee. They have been published once and I can't recall who sent them in. They are excellent ones for I have tried them.

**Apricot Pineapple Salad**  
2 pkg. lemon jello (let set till thickens)  
—9-oz. can crushed pineapple (drained)  
1 large can apricots (strained)  
Add the three above ingredients to jello—let set till firm.

**Topping—**  
¼ cup lemon juice  
1 cup pineapple juice  
½ cup sugar  
1 egg, 3 tablespoons flour,  
¼ teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon butter.  
Cook until thick in double boiler. Let cool.  
Fold 1 cup whipped cream into topping. Spread on set lemon jello mixture. Then sprinkle top with grated cheese (mild kind).  
large recipe.

**All-Purpose Sweet Rolls**  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup shortening  
¾ cup sugar  
2 teaspoon salt  
1½ cups cold water  
4 eggs  
¾ cups flour  
2 pkgs. dry yeast

Mix together in boiling water, shortening, sugar and salt. Add rest of ingredients and blend. Place in refrigerator over night. This yields a substantial amount of dough which may be made into dinner rolls, cinnamon rolls, etc.

This is a sticky dough, but when it sets overnight it is all right to handle. Bake 350 degree oven 20-25 minutes. This dough is good for several days.

**Hermits (cookies)**  
1 cup butter or margarine  
1½ cups sugar  
3 eggs, beaten  
½ teaspoon soda in enough sour milk to wet it good.  
1 teaspoon cloves and all spice  
1 cup raisins, ground.  
Flour to roll  
Cream butter and sugar, add well beaten eggs. Sift flour and spices. Bake at 375 degrees, 8 to 10 min.

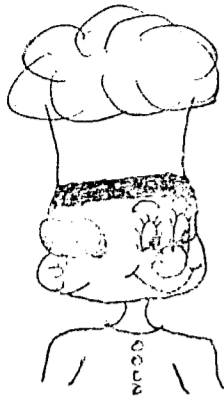

Mrs. Denner prepared some great materials for her instruction that will be a fine supplement to our math program.
