Members of the department and wives of firemen will begin the task of preparing the potato salad Saturday morning.

Prices this year are \$5 per adult; \$2.50 for children up through the sixth grade. Pre-school children are admitted free.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, ADOPTING THE AMERICAN NATIONAL STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS FOR MAKING BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES ACCESSIBLE TO, AND USABLE BY THE PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED, 1961 EDITION (REAFFIRMED, 1971) THEREOF, PROVIDING THAT THREE COPIES OF THE MANUAL AND AMENDMENTS THERETO SHALL REMAIN ON FILE IN THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, AND FIXING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

Section 1. There is hereby adopted for the purpose of regulating and controlling building in the City of Genesee, Idaho, the American National Standard Specifications for making building and facilities accessible to, and usable by, the physically handicapped, 1961 (reaffirmed 1971), thereof and as the same may hereafter be revised or amended. And the same is hereby adopted and incorporated as an Ordinance of the City as fully as though set forth at length herein.

Section 2. Three copies of the American National Standard Specifications for making buildings and facilities accessible to, and usable by, the physically handicapped of 1961 (reaffirmed 1971) together with all amendments thereto, duly certified by the City Clerk, is on file, and shall remain on file, at his or her office for use and examination of and by the public.

Section 3. All ordinances of the City of Genesee, Idaho, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, ADOPTING THE LIFE SAFETY CODE, 1973 EDITION THEREOF, PROVIDING THAT THREE COPIES OF THE MANUAL AND AMENDMENTS THERETO SHALL REMAIN ON FILE IN THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, AND FIXING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

Section 1. There is hereby adopted for the purpose of regulating and controlling building in the City of Genesee, Idaho, the Life Safety Code, 1973 edition, thereof and as the same is hereby adopted and incorporated as an Ordinance of the City as fully as though set forth at length herein.

Section 2. Three copies of the Life Safety Code of 1971 together with all amendments thereto, duly certified by the City Clerk, is on file, and shall remain on file, at his or her office for use and examination of and by the public.

Section 3. All ordinances of the City of Genesee, Idaho, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

ORDINANCE 235

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 230 TO PROVIDE FOR MINI-STORAGE WAREHOUSE AS A PERMITTED USE IN THE C1 AND C2 COMMERCIAL DISTRICT, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

Section 1. Amendment

That Section 8, Schedule of District Requirements, be amended by the following addition under Commercial Districts:

(4) mini-storage warehouse P P

That Section 4, (B) Words and Terms have added to it a definition of mini-storage warehouse: **MINI-STORAGE-WAREHOUSE.** A structure designed for the purpose of renting space to others for the storage of property and operated as a commercial business. Storage shall be within an enclosed building with interior space compartmentalized into individual units of rental space.

Section 2. Effective Date

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon publication following passage and approval. Passed under suspension of all rules and regulations upon which a roll call vote was taken and duly enacted and approved by the City Council of Genesee, Idaho, on this 7th day of Feb. 1977.

ORDINANCE NO. 236

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, ADOPTING THE LIFE SAFETY CODE, 1973 EDITION THEREOF, PROVIDING THAT THREE COPIES OF THE MANUAL AND AMENDMENTS THERETO SHALL REMAIN ON FILE IN THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, AND FIXING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

Section 1. There is hereby adopted for the purpose of regulating and controlling building in the City of Genesee, Idaho, the Life Safety Code, 1973 edition, thereof and as the same is hereby adopted and incorporated as an Ordinance of the City as fully as though set forth at length herein.

Section 2. Three copies of the Life Safety Code of 1971 together with all amendments thereto, duly certified by the City Clerk, is on file, and shall remain on file, at his or her office for use and examination of and by the public.

Section 3. All ordinances of the City of Genesee, Idaho, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

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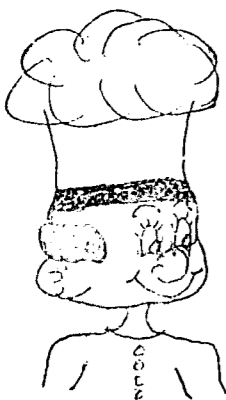
