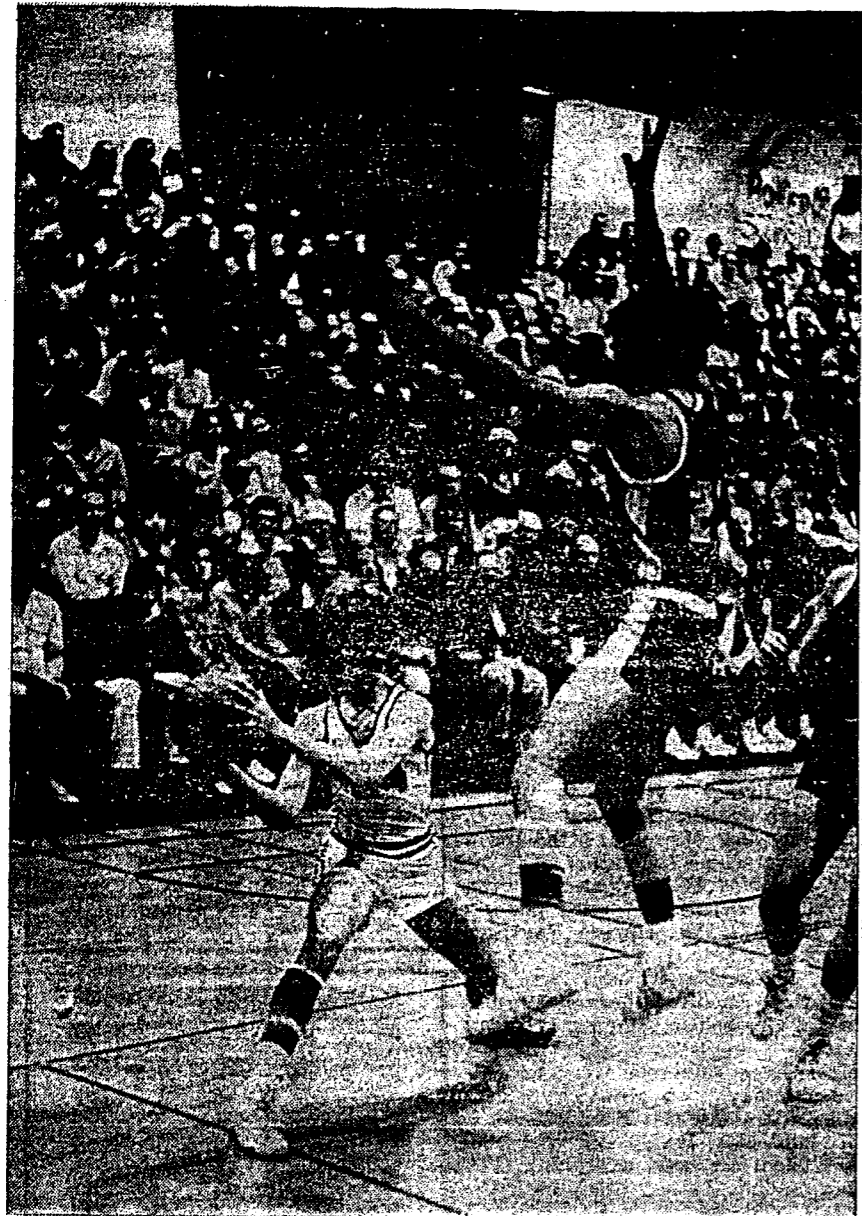


Bulldogs Bow Out of Tournament—

Juliaetta Community Library Opens Thursday

Months of effort and planning culminate Thursday morning, March 3 when the Juliaetta Community Library opens for the first time. Housed in the Juliaetta Rebekah Lodge Hall, the library is a result of cooperation between the State Library, Moscow-Latah County Library, the City of Juliaetta and individual effort by many private citizens.

Carolyn Gravelle, who will be librarian of the facility, said the hours will be from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. on Thursdays and from 10 a. m. to 12 noon Friday and Saturday. Beginning Wednesday, March 9 the library will be open Wednesday evenings from 5 to 8 p. m.

Mrs. Gravelle indicated Monday morning that these hours are a sort of "trial run" and may be changed or added to if the community feels it needs more or different hours.

Carolyn also stressed that the library is not just for Juliaetta, but is for the use and benefit of Kendrick and the surrounding area, too. The Juliaetta facility will also be in charge of maintaining a supply of books at Johnson Manor.

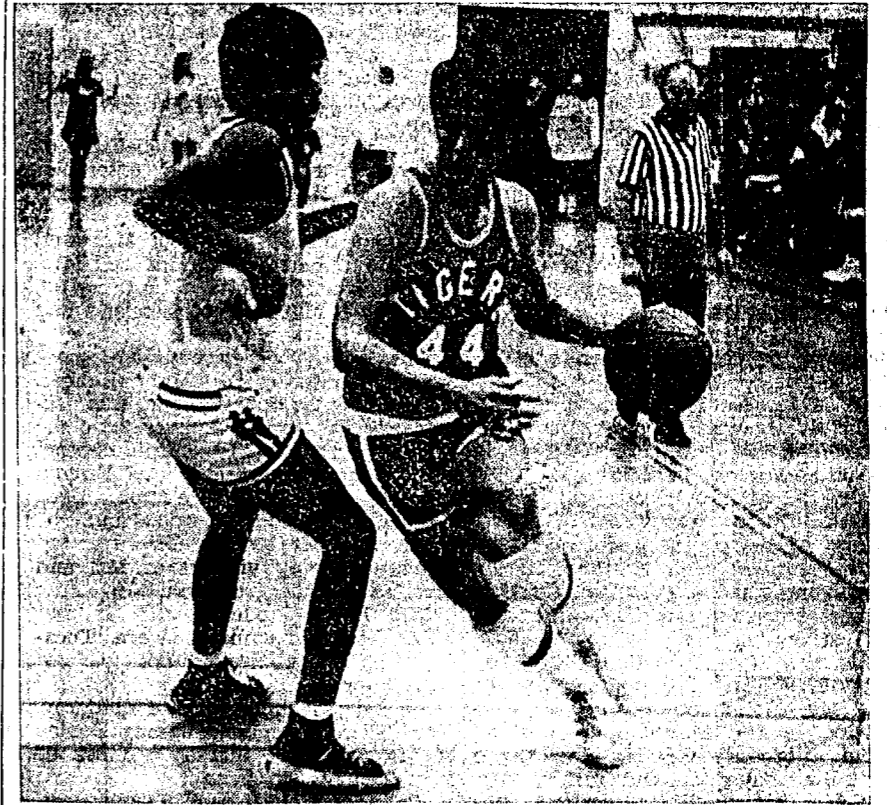

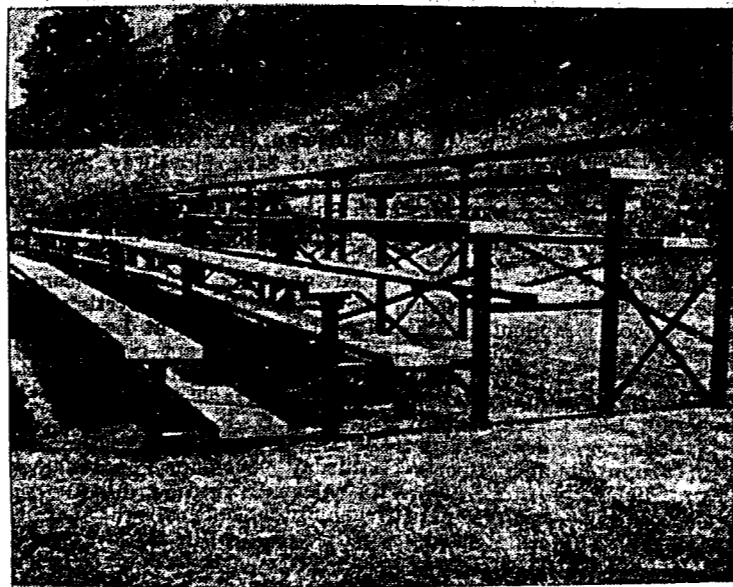

The Kendrick FFA Chapter is in the process of completing this BOAC project. The chapter has worked hard and spent a great deal of its own spare time to help Build Our American Community.

The purpose of the FFA Community Development Activity, Building Our American Communities (BOAC) Program is to: (1) Develop active, experienced and knowledgeable community leaders and citizens. (2) Develop a rural-urban balance by expanding and creating job opportunities, community services and a better quality of living in rural communities, and (3) Improve the social and physical environment in the cities, towns, villages and farm communities of rural America.

The BOAC committee, under the direction of chairman Lyle Deobald, has developed a long-range plan to repair and replace the existing recreational facilities in Kendrick and Juliaetta and then proceed in creating new facilities. School Board Holds Special Meeting Friday
The Genesee School Board held a special board meeting Friday, February 25th. The board adopted a revised policy dealing with student use and parking of motor vehicles. The policy will go into effect Thursday, March 3, 1977. The policy is as follows:

- Students will be allowed to drive motor vehicles to and from school, but once arriving at school must park motor vehicles in the parking lot located at the west end of the gymnasium, and once parked will not be removed until the end of the school day unless permission is secured from the Principal's office. Permission will be granted only in the following situations:
 - Illness of the student (if capable to drive—if not, parent will be notified).
 - Emergencies at home (request coming from parents).
 - Remedial health appointments with doctor, dentists, or other health advisors.
 - Leaving school for the remainder of the day.

Appropriate disciplinary action will be taken on students who fail to comply with this policy. Repeated violations may result in suspension from school.

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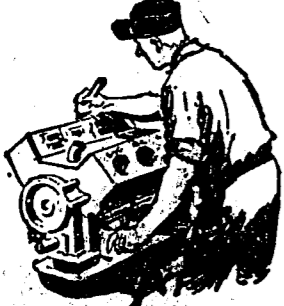
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Kendrick Grange Members Visited In Troy Saturday

Teton Dam Disaster Slides Viewed by Grange Members

dozers to giant helicopters to lift large loads from the debris. 3600 head of cattle were lost by one feed lot company. One picture showed where the force of the water had twisted the railroad tracks and ties into spirals. Farms, streets, stores and homes in a vast area were filled and damaged by mud and debris. The second port was San Juan, Puerto Rico which was very much like a town in the States. The town has two parts, Old San Juan and Santurce or New San Juan. Also the oldest church in the northern hemisphere is located here and somewhat in need of repair. The third port was St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands. Tourists were encouraged to do their shopping here because twice as much merchandise was duty free. If one were interested in leather goods, fine china, fine glassware, jewelry, alcohol and tobacco, etc., it was a good place to shop. A short trip to St. John's Island from there gave one an opportunity to see and play on beautiful beaches and go snorkeling in the Atlantic. Of course, if you had never been snorkeling, a ten-minute lesson was provided. On the way to the fourth port the weather was quite cold and the ocean was rough and so no one was on deck. We liked Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic the best, probably because of its open landscape, lack of hustle and bustle and yet not demonstrating the poverty of Haiti.

At Puerto Plata we were treated to a beach party, an island banquet and island entertainment which included the dance called the Merengue which we had an opportunity to learn aboard ship if we chose. The ocean was tepid and beautiful. From Puerto Plata it took 36 hours to return to Miami which had just experienced its snowstorm and frost. It was only 9 degrees cooler in Billings than in Miami the morning of the 22nd. We were very happy to be able to participate in this winter vacation and felt that the cruise line chosen could not be excelled for its gourmet food, program and entertainment, and planning for comfort, cleanliness and safety of its passengers. —Ruth Hoffman.

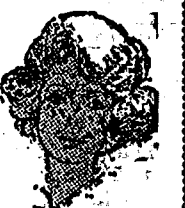
