Within the first three days, 104 patrons made 232 loans. The patron to sign out the library's first books was Marie Grant; the books: Eleanor and Franklin and I Want to Be a Dairy Farmer.

The card had the class picture with a written greeting enclosed: "The Juliaetta sixth graders wish to be the first to welcome you to Juliaetta." ## Nez Perce Commissioners Explain Solid Waste Pickup Plans for County

A meeting with Nez Perce County Commissioners Steve McCoy and Charles Cline was held in the Leland Club on Tuesday, March 1 at 7:00 with approximately 30 present.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the solid waste disposal system planned by the Commissioners for the rural residents of Nez Perce County.

Commissioner Cline gave a short run-down of the proposal.

—There is a mandate from the State for each County to set up a solid waste disposal system.

—It will be funded through Revenue sharing until October 1, from then on funding will be on a household assessment basis.

—The cost will be \$3.90 per month. —A household can be exempted for certain reasons the commissioners are still working on the guidelines.

—It will not be a mailbox collection however. They are trying to work out an arrangement whereby those who are now serviced by Nadl Enterprises of Orofino will continue to be served by that firm.

—The county is obligated to provide service for those not now provided by Nadl Enterprises. Nadl is paid \$1500 per month to cover his cost of serving those who don't pay their fee.

—The Commissioners stressed the importance of the customers reporting any problems they see concerning garbage pick-up, litter around the boxes or anything else that makes the service less than satisfactory.

—The Commissioners expect that it will take about a year to work out the problems associated with the service.

—The boxes will be placed on County property in a proposed 27 locations.

—The contract has been let to a Kellogg-based firm which submitted the lowest bid.

## TIGERS TO STATE



Kendrick gained its second trip to the State Class A-3 basketball tournament last Wednesday night with a 48-46 upset win over Kamiah. The win sent the Tigers into the finals against Prairie, but win or lose, they were headed to the State competition. Prairie rolled over the tired Tigers 70-56 Friday night to win the District championship but both teams make the trip to Idaho Falls.

Kendrick is scheduled to meet Rimrock high school in the first round of the tournament at 1:00 p. m. MST (12:00 noon Kendrick time), Thursday, March 10. If the Tigers win they will play at 1:30 Friday afternoon. If they are losers the first game they will again play at 12 noon (Kendrick time).

Coach LaMunyan and his team left Tuesday for Idaho Falls while the cheerleaders and others will depart Wednesday. Many Tiger Boosters are also planning on making the trip to South Idaho to support the team.

## Tigers Upset Kubs

Kendrick hustled all the way last Wednesday night and used a good second and third quarter to outlast the Kamiah Kubs 48-46 and earn a state berth. Doug Lohman's 10-ft. jump from the side seconds after the opening tip put the Tigers ahead. KHS kept ahead most of the first quarter until Kamiah moved into the lead 8-6 just before the end of the first period. Doug Parks tied it 8-8 with two free throws. Kendrick picked up the lead again in the second quarter and stayed ahead the rest of the game, pacing the Kubs 22-18 at the half.

Kamiah closed the gap back to four points mid-way in the third period after the Tigers had lead by ten points at one time and then it was still Kendrick ahead 38-32 at the end of the third period.

Kendrick was constant along with a 6 to 8 point lead until about three minutes remained in the game and then Kamiah rallied and with a full-court closed the gap to a single point 45-44 with 46 seconds on the clock. Then two free throws by Tony Snyder and another by Tim Eichner gave the Tigers the margin they needed.

Doug Parks had 15 points, Lohman 10, Eichner 9, Doug Silflow 8, and Rob Maynard, Jason Meyer and Tony Snyder each had 2.

**Prairie Rolls**  
Undoubtedly the Tigers were tired from the previous ball game, but the Prairie Pirates showed why they were the number 1 team in the district Friday night disposing of the Tigers 70-56 in easy fashion. Kendrick had trouble getting untracked at the start, and it wasn't until Rob Maynard hit a jump shot from the top of the key with 4:44 left in the first quarter that Kendrick got on the board. The score was tied at 3-3 all once and that was the last time the Tigers were really in the game. Prairie went on to outscore the Tigers 14-7 in the first quarter and were ahead 40-25 at the half. Kendrick came back in the third quarter and actually outscored the Pirates 16-14 in that period.

Kendrick, never giving up, closed to within 10 points of the Pirates in the final period on a three point play by Doug Lohman, but then the Pirates put on a showing exhibition of their own and rolled up a lead the Tigers couldn't catch.

Jason Meyer, playing a great game for the Tigers collected 14 points. Park Maynard had 10, Lohman and Parks 7 each, Tony Snyder 6, Silflow and Ron Maynard 4 each and Tim Eichner and Gary Brammer 2 each.

#### LIGHTNING

More than 100 people are killed in the United States each year because of lightning most of them outdoors on farms, golf courses or in recreational areas, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

Thunderstorm clouds discharge a great electrical force which is released upon contact with a metal object, such as a rod or golf club, or an object imbedded in the earth, such as a tree.

A lightning strike current contains between 12,000 and 200,000 amperes. The current of a 100-watt electric bulb is less than one ampere.

The cause of death in lightning fatalities is usually sudden cardiac arrest or severe injury to the nervous system. A fatal outcome will invariably occur suddenly or within a few hours. If the victim survives 24 hours, a return to normal is likely.

If you are outside during a thunderstorm, take these measures to protect yourself:

Do not raise any metal object, even an umbrella, above your head.

Avoid hilltops, open spaces and isolated areas.

**Mike Johnson Graduated From Officers Training Academy February 11**

Officer Mike Johnson of the Genesee Police Department graduated Fri., Feb. 11 from the Idaho Peace Officers Training Academy at Idaho State University in Pocatello.

The 5-week course attended by Officer Johnson consists of some forty police-related subjects. Their day starts at 5:50 a. m. with physical exercises and defensive tactics, then to the class room from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. After the evening meal several hours are spent typing their daily notes and preparing for the next day.

Each officer receives training in the proper use of the pistol and shotgun, and the efficient handling of a police vehicle during pursuit driving situation. Several hours are spent in the classroom studying Idaho criminal laws, writing and preparing reports, studying human behavior, investigating accidents, learning the importance of fingerprints at the crime scene, and formulating and participating in a moot court procedure. The trainees must earn a standard First Aid card and practice the cardio-pulmonary resuscitation method. Each officer must pass several qualifying academic examinations before graduation.

Notice of course completion certificates were awarded by Chief John Perkins of the Pocatello Police Department, the Chairman of the POST Advisory Council. This completion certificate will be replaced with the Basic Certificate upon completion of the probationary period of one year with the officer's employing department.

Chill; cut into small bars. Yield: 28 bars.

1 1/2 cups brown sugar  
1 cup shortening  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 1/2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 cups chopped dates  
1/2 pound candied cherries  
2 slices candied pineapple, chopped  
1 pound walnuts  
1/2 pound almonds  
1/2 pound Brazil nuts  
Chop all nuts  
Cream sugar and shortening.  
Add eggs, beat.  
Add sifted dry ingredients, mix well. Add fruit, nuts and vanilla.  
Drop by teaspoon on greased pan, enough dough about the size of a large walnut.  
Make no attempt to spread dough, leave it mounded.  
Bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

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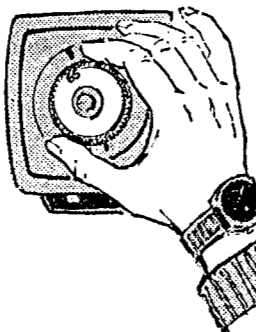

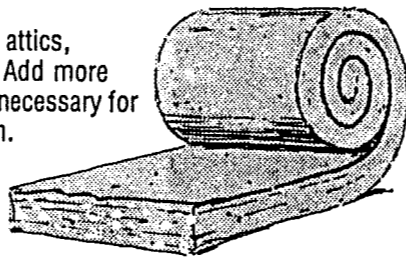

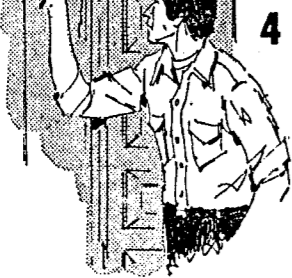

**2 Check insulation** in attics, ceilings, and walls. Add more insulation wherever necessary for maximum protection.



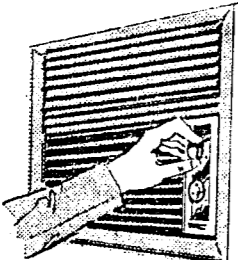
**3 It takes electricity to have hot water** available when you need it. Take showers instead of tub baths and cut the time you usually stand under the shower. Don't leave water running when washing or rinsing your hair.



**4 Add weatherstripping** to doors and windows to stop that leakage. The use of storm windows is most effective because a high percentage of heat loss is through single glass panes.



**5 Save electricity in the laundry room** with more efficient use of your washer and dryer. Wash only full loads and use warm to cool water whenever possible. Use the dryer with full loads but don't overload. Supplement with clothesline drying if you can.



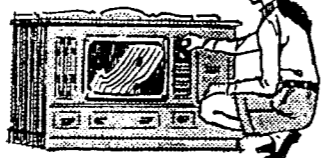
**6 Keep air conditioner filters clean.** Set the thermostat at about 80 degrees. You can save a lot of electricity by using your air conditioner only during the hottest weather.



**Automatic dishwashers** use a lot of hot water. Wash only full loads. Open the door and let the dishes air-dry with the dry cycle turned off.

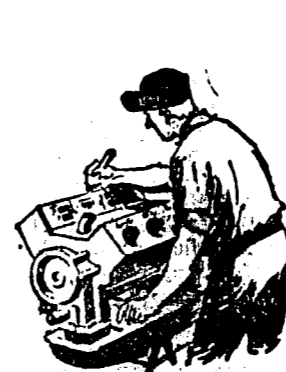


**8 Turn off television and radios** and other such equipment when not in use.

**Employment Indicates Economic Strength Good, Says Bank Newsletter**

Employment conditions generally reflect overall strength of the economy; accordingly, business conditions in Idaho in 1977 appear satisfactory. This is according to the quarterly First Security Bank Newsletter being distributed this week said James Hoogland, Jr., manager Kendrick and Orrin S. Merrill, manager, Genesee. Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist is editor of the Newsletter.

Non-agricultural wage and salary employment is expected to increase 5 to 6 percent in 1977 and the rate of unemployment should adjust gradually downward.

Near the end of 1976, non-agricultural employment was 21,000 jobs ahead of the previous year and the unemployment rate had declined to 6.7 percent.

Recent employment gains, particularly evident in the lumber, food processing and contract construction industries are important factor in

maintaining a vigorous 1977 business climate.

High production levels in 1977 will characterize major Idaho industries. Lumber production, up 16 percent in 1976, should be favorably influenced this year by reasonably strong prices and additional expansion in residential construction activity in Idaho and across the nation.

Above-average gains in Idaho's construction industry are anticipated in 1977, on top of a banner year in 1976.

The agricultural industry in Idaho is currently suffering from depressed crop prices. At year-end, the price of wheat remained 30 percent below last year, while the price of potatoes was down 20 percent.

Mineral production in Idaho in 1976 dropped 6 percent below the 1975 total. The phosphate industry faces a national over-supply and, accordingly the price of phosphate fertilizer is low. A reasonably strong demand is anticipated in 1977, but price increases will probably be minor.

Retail sales in fiscal 1977 are expected to continue the increase recorded in 1976, with an expected gain of 16 percent.

Automobile unit sales, which increased about 15 percent in 1976, slipped downward in the fourth quarter. Recent income and employment gains in Idaho and a more vigorous business climate nationwide indicate renewed strength in Idaho retail sales during the first part of '77.

On the national scene the letter suggests that business conditions nationwide in 1977 should be favorable with the pace of economic activity increasing as the year progresses.

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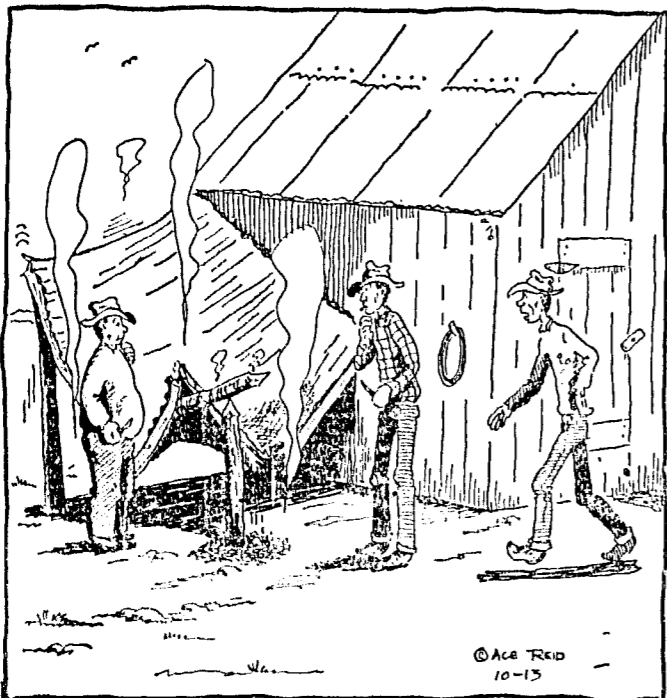

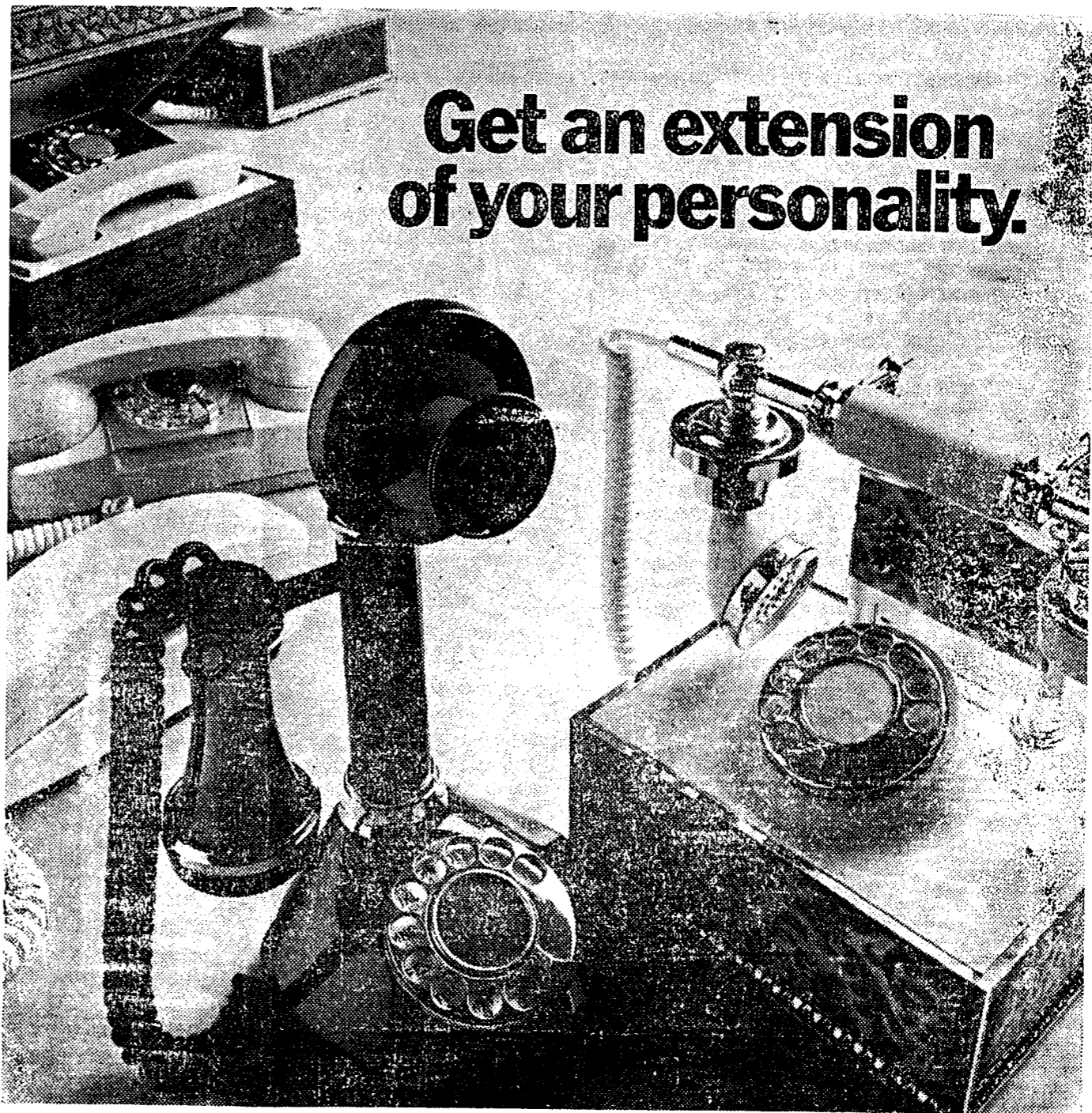

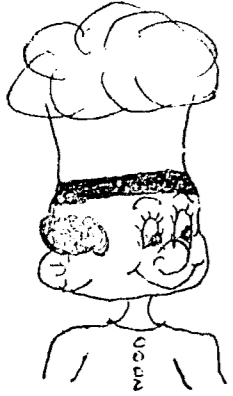
