The pattern for the doll house the club has decided to build for a Christmas raffle project has been ordered but has not yet arrived.

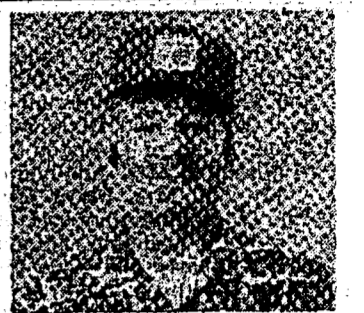

LEGAL NOTICE

NOXIOUS WEEDS
Notice is hereby given this 12 day of March, 1977 pursuant to the Idaho Noxious Weed Law Section 22-2444, Idaho Code, to every person who owns or controls land in Latah County, Idaho, that noxious weeds standing, being or growing on such land shall be destroyed or eradicated by effective cutting, tilling, cropping, pasturing, or treating with chemicals or other effective methods, or combination thereof, approved by the County Weed Superintendent, as often as may be required to prevent the weed from blooming and maturing seeds, or spreading by root, root stalks or other means.

Violations—Penalties. Any person knowing of the existence of any noxious weeds on land owned or controlled by him who fails to control or eradicate such weeds in accordance with this act and rules and regulations prescribed thereunder, and any person who intrudes upon any land under quarantine or who moves or causes to be moved any article covered by this act as provided in this act, or who interferes with the carrying out of the provisions of this act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) on account of each violation.

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

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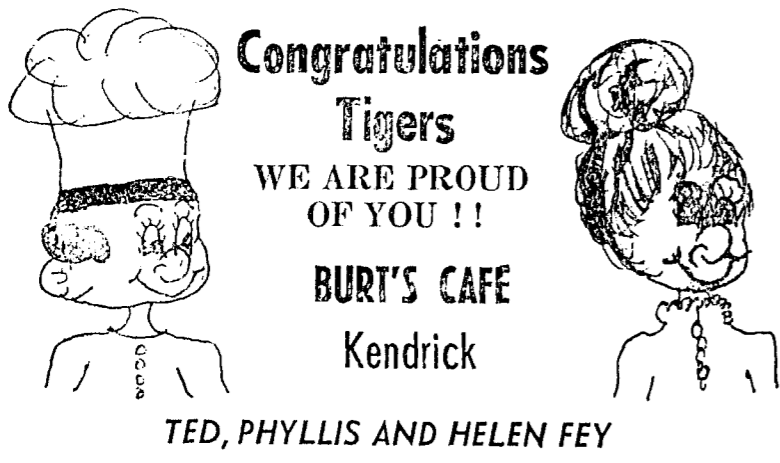

The Kendrick School 'Principal's Corner'

Tigers End Season Strong—

The Kendrick Basketball fans witnessed a super come-from-behind effort and one of the best performances this year by their team in the Tiger's final game of the State Tournament in Idaho Falls last Saturday against a strong Glenns Ferry. The Pilots hit the final shot of the game to out-point Kendrick by two but the disappointment of losing was absent from the minds of everyone. The Tigers achieved success by proving to themselves and to the rest of the State that Kendrick was a playoff team and deserved to be represented in the Idaho Falls tournament. Their first round victory over Rimrock proved to be costly with the loss of starting forward Doug Lehman with an ankle injury. This loss in addition to the depressed spirits of the team and combined with the foul trouble encountered against West Jefferson proved to be disastrous on the second day of the tournament. Optimum conditions had to prevail in order for Kendrick to challenge the powerful Panthers but everything was stacked against the Tigers and the loss appeared to be demoralizing. On the final night against Glenns Ferry, starting center Tim Eichner, left the game early with stomach cramps and the Tigers found themselves down by twelve. Little hope remained for a serious challenge to the tall and overpowering Pilots. However, as if to say, "Don't give up on us people we've come to play ball!", the Tigers came roaring back. They hammered in 15 unanswered points to snatch the lead at halftime by three. The Tigers continued their dominance through the second half but were turned back in the final moments by a hot shooting streak from the Glenns Ferry team. Leading this valiant effort for Kendrick were 2 sophomores Doug Parks and Tony Snyder, both turning in impressive performances. Three seniors, Rob Maynard, Doug Sillow and Ron Maynard proved to be the right combination for some of the best basketball seen by the Kendrick crowd this year.

The support from our community at the state tournament was overwhelming. I would estimate at least 100 persons traveled the 500 miles to unite behind our team. Many others were cheering us on at home. All of us are proud of the way our kids performed and are appreciative of the thrills we received by watching them play this year.

Magazine Sale Success—
The fifth and sixth grade classes sold \$4087 in subscriptions during their 2 1/2 week magazine subscription sale, beating last year's mark by \$200. These young salesmen worked hard and were well-received by the parents and school patrons. This year's goal was set at \$4000 which was achieved on the final day of the sale.
