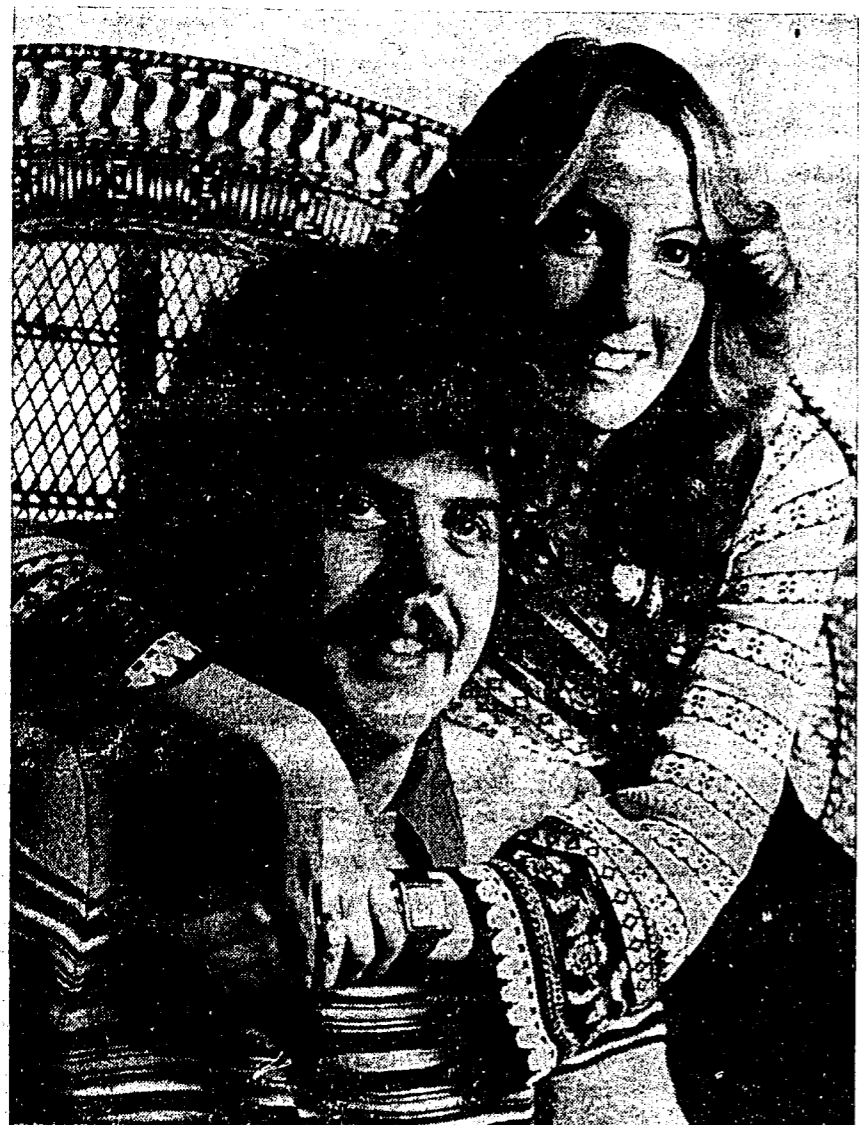

## 31st Annual Kendrick Farm Institute a Success

The 31st annual Farm Institute was held in Kendrick last Wednesday and drew an attendance of 120 from a wide area. The yearly event is sponsored by the Extension Services of Latah and Nez Perce Counties, the Kendrick Grange and the Kendrick Lions Club.

Gerald Ingle, Bear Ridge farmer, served as master of ceremonies of the session.

The day began with a film, "Idaho Beyond Its Image". There were also informative talks on farm wood lots and the Forest Products Act by Jim Rickert of the State Department of Lands and a discussion of estate and gift tax changes by Wayne Schultz, a Certified Public Accountant from Lewiston.

Both the men and women enjoyed a free lunch prepared and served by the Grange and Lions Club.

Following lunch the women reconvened at the fire hall for an afternoon series of programs and topics and the men continued their part of the Institute at the Grange Hall.

Pea Insects was the topic of a lecture by Larry O'Keefe of the University of Idaho. Sheraz Vira of the Moscow SCS office talked on water quality. Winter Wheat varieties and new releases coming up were the subject of talks by Loren Kamitsch of the Nez Perce Extension office and George Brocke, Kendrick seedman.

Energy in Agriculture was the subject discussed by Rod Taylor, Extension Ag Engineer.

Sparkling with some of the top college basketball talent in the Northwest, the 7th annual Kendrick Cut-Throat Basketball Tournament begins its second week of action, this week in the Class 'A' division on Thursday evening, March 24. The Thursday game was added when other teams entered the tourney.

Nine teams, as far away as Twisp, Washington, will be competing for the \$400 in trophies offered by the Kendrick Athletic Booster Club, the sponsors of the tournament.

Action begins at 7:30 Thursday evening as Twisp goes against P & E Athletics of Moscow.

Friday at 7:00 it will be Widman's Sports Center vs Pullman and at 8:30 The Corner Club of Moscow (last year's winners) will be paired with the Baker's Truckers of Lewiston.

Saturday afternoon at 1:00 the winner of the Twisp-P&E game will meet LCSC No. 1. At 2:30 it will be LCSC No. 2 against Little Big Man Plaza of Coeur d'Alene.

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**Home Cookin' ...**

Our recipes for this week's column were sent in by Mrs. Robert Luedke, and we sincerely thank her. The Luedkes live on the late Clara Miller home place. She gives us two ways to prepare two old favorites, pork chops and chicken. She says to try them (they're easy), then sit back for compliments from the kitchen of Mrs. Robert Luedke.

**Pork Chops Supreme**

Trim excess fat from 1" thick, lean chops. Place chops in baking dish and salt well. Top each with a squirt of lemon juice, a thin slice of onion; sprinkle generously with brown sugar. Pour 1 heaping TB catsup over each chop and spread to cover.

Cover baking dish and bake one hour at 350d. Uncover, and bake 30 minutes more, basting occasionally.

**Sesame Chicken**

1 egg, slightly beaten  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup flour  
1/4 cup sesame seeds  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. ground pepper  
1/4 cup butter  
1 broiler-fryer chicken (2-3 lbs) cut up

Combine egg and milk. In another bowl, mix flour, sesame seeds, salt and pepper. Melt butter in baking pan. Dip chickens parts first in milk-egg mixture, then in flour; then in baking pan so that butter coats all sides of chicken well. Bake uncovered 1 hour—1 1/2 hours at 350d, or until tender, brown and crisp.

Mrs. Luedke adds that her graham cracker brownies are something different that the kids will love.

**Graham Cracker Brownies**

2 eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
dash of salt  
14 graham crackers, crushed  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1/2 tsp vanilla  
Beat eggs well.

Mix next 5 ingredients, add to eggs, mixing well. Spread in greased 8" square pan and bake 25-30 minutes at 350d. While still warm, cut into 2" squares.

**Peanut Butter Bread**

2 cups sifted flour  
4 tsp. baking powder  
1/3 cup sugar  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
1 1/2 cups milk  
Sift together first 4 ingredients 2 times. Gently mix in peanut butter. Add milk and beat until smooth.

Word from your paper of the death of Amy Woodward Fisher brought a flood of rich memories. What a beautiful lady she was! I found her first when my brother and I were delivering milk to the Woodwards. There were just two girls then, Thelma and Bonnie, and they lived in the house where the Clarence Trails now live, or did last time I campaigned that way.

Later they moved and lived for many years in the house which was Lloyd and Flossie Hollingsworth Esser's home "down on the flat". There we children had fun in the two big swings Mr. Woodward, Jack, put up for us to enjoy. Upstairs was a room empty except for chairs and a curtain, our theater. With Mrs. Woodward's encouragement we put on skits and our own kind of plays, etc. There was plenty of stuff to dress up in including high-heeled shoes which we had to wear with our shoes on to properly fill so we could walk. We even had a little red crepe paper to use as rouge and lipstick and pencils for eyebrows. Cookies and punch were often supplied. It was wonderful.

At one point, Mrs. Woodward rented the old Opera House and with her daughters gave an evening's entertainment for a modest fee. The girls, (by that time Patricia had been born) played the piano, sang and spoke pieces while their mother did some excellent reading. Beautiful new dresses were made for the occasion and since every performer was handsome and well rehearsed, the evening went well.

The obituary says she still was chairman of the Washington State Poetry Day and had been since 1953 and that she was 93. She published not one book of poems but three plus an historical novel. Her bright spirit would give such output lust.

The world is the poorer for her passing, but the richer for her having lived.

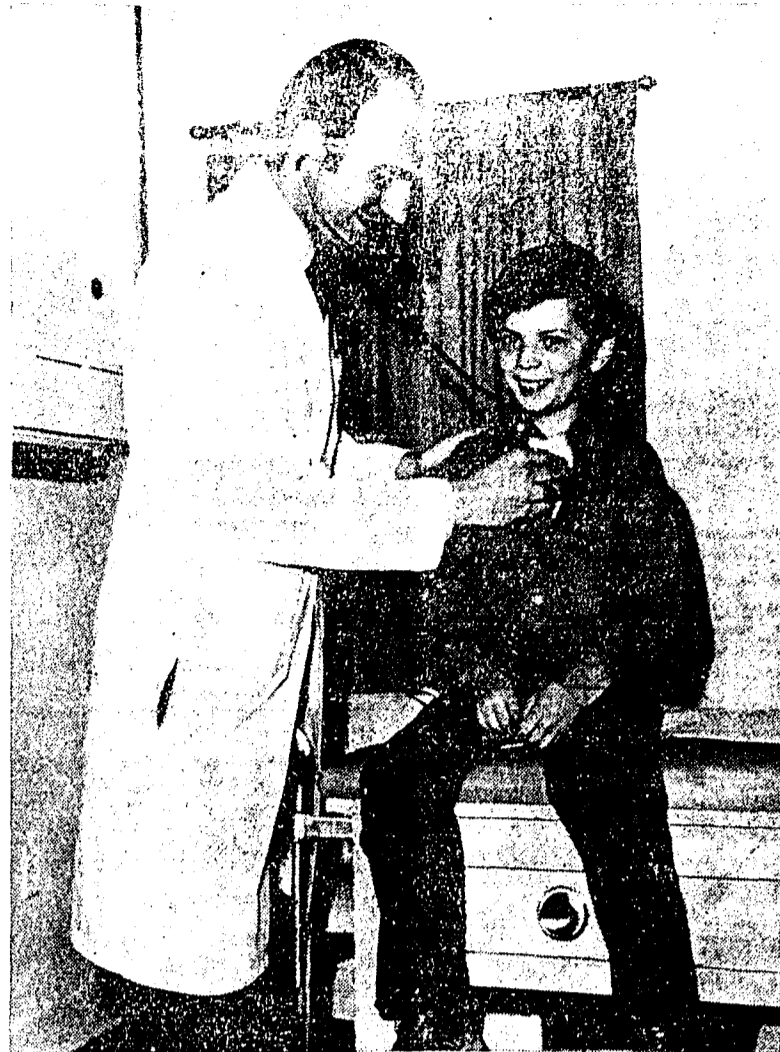
**Mel Moser, PCA Director Attends Orientation**

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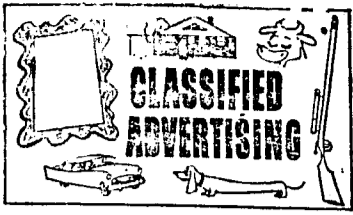


