IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

25 Latah Co. persons were placed on jobs this week through the Idaho Dept. of Employment Job Service, said Frank Hartstein, Moscow local office manager. 20 new positions were listed, while a total of 14 remain open at weekend. Included are opportunities for a qualified car salesman, brake and front end auto mechanic, experienced house painter, kitchen helper, cook, nurse aide, staff secretary, cosmetologist, maid, house cleaner and waitresses. Interested persons should contact the Job Service Office at 221 E. Second, Moscow, for details.
 Hartstein further reported that the county unemployment total continued to decline. He said 608 persons sought unemployment insurance benefits this past week compared to 624 the previous week and 671 a year ago. While 66 new claims were filed, compared to 48 a week ago, many were transitional claims for persons who have been reporting during past weeks. Actual new claims did rise slightly, however, as a result of continued layoffs by forest industry employers.
 Only 262 workers reported from Moscow, down slightly from 273 last week, while 291 were reporting at this time in 1976. Unemployment totals for most other communities remained relatively stable: Pocatello fell slightly to 202, compared to 105 and 139, while Genesee showed 10, 10 compared to 20 in 1976; Troy-Deary-Bovill 218, 220, slightly higher than 206 last year; and Kendrick 17, 16, and 18.

 ORDINANCE NO. 203

AN ORDINANCE TERMED "ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL" APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, LATAH COUNTY, STATE OF IDAHO, FOR THE FIRST NINE (9) MONTHS BEGINNING ON THE FIRST DAY OF JANUARY, 1977, AND ENDING ON THE THIRTY (30) DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1977 AND CREATING AND ALLOTING SAID APPROPRIATION TO CERTAIN FUNDS OUT OF WHICH SUCH EXPENSES SHALL BE PAID.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the treasury of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, not otherwise appropriated, and out of any revenue which the City of Juliaetta, by acquire between the first day of January, 1977, and the thirtieth day of September, 1977, the sum of \$165,612.50 for the purpose of defraying all necessary expenses and liabilities of such corporation for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January 1977, and ending on the thirtieth day of September, 1977.

SECTION 2. There are hereby created the following funds:

A. General Fund, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$40,000.00 out of the above appropriation for the general expenses of said City.

B. LIBRARY, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$350.00 out of the above appropriation for library utilities.

C. FIRE DEPT. FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$650.00 out of the above appropriation for the department purposes.

D. WATER AND SEWER EXPENDITURES, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$14,730.00 out of the above appropriation for the expenses, maintenance and improvement of the Water and Sewer system of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho.

E. WATER AND SEWER PROJECT C-160184, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$86,375.00 out of the above appropriation for the completion water and sewer system of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho.

F. WATER REVENUE BOND REDEMPTION FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$367.50 out of the above appropriation for the bond interest and redemption of bond number 16.

G. WATER AND SEWER BOND REDEMPTION FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$7,325.00 out of the above appropriation for the bond interest and redemption of bond.

H. RESERVE FOR WATER AND SEWER BOND REDEMPTION, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$4,500.00 out of the above appropriation for the reserve for water and sewer bond redemption.

I. FEDERAL REVENUE SHARING FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$11,315.00 out of the above appropriation of said City in accordance with the laws and procedures applicable for the spending of such funds.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and the first publication thereof.


**The Kendrick School

Sex Education Class—
Next week, Ruby Hawkins, School Nurse, will present a five-day sex education unit to Mr. Barker's Sophomore Biology classes as part of their study of human development and reproduction. Mrs. Hawkins, who taught the course last year at Kendrick, also provides other area schools with sex education instruction as part of our cooperative contracted services through the Latah County Health Department. A meeting was held Monday night at the High School so that parents of Biology students could meet with Mrs. Hawkins and Mr. Barker and learn more about the sex education class. Course content and materials were reviewed so that parents could become more informed about the class. I am pleased to have Mrs. Hawkins working with our kids in that area. I am also appreciative that she afforded the opportunity for parents to preview the materials and ask questions about this one week unit.

Elementary Talent Show—
Bob Pendergrast, Music Director, gave upper elementary students the opportunity to display their showmanship and talent at an Elementary Talent Show last Friday night. The participants performed musical numbers and other specialty acts which were learned outside of school. The most difficult task in organizing the program was trying to screen the performers so that a three-day talent marathon could be reduced to a one-hour show. It seemed that everyone wanted to participate. Through auditioning and by some very hard decision making, Mr. Pendergrast was able to select his company. Pianists, singers, a gymnast and several one act skits were included in the variety show. The evening was capped by the fourth and fifth grade chorus singing the cantata "100% Chance of Rain." This light hearted experience was enjoyed by the kids and was entertaining for the audience.

Good Learning Atmosphere
I have been visiting classrooms on a regular basis for the past 2 weeks making formal observations for second semester teacher evaluations. Something that has made me feel good all year is the atmosphere in our schools, which I feel, is conducive to optimum learning. Students are motivated to learn and there is evidence of the teachers effect on their work habits. Teachers' organization of planned activities to accomplish meaningful studies objectives is evident in every classroom.
