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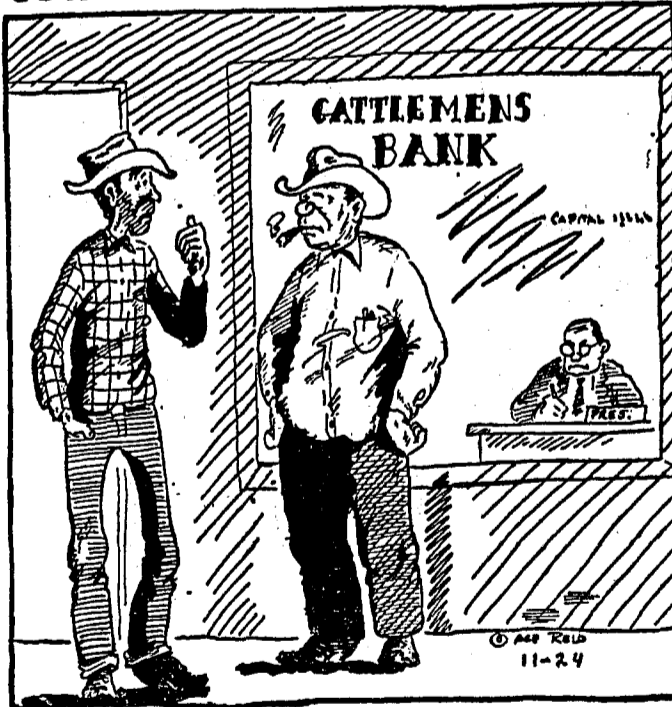

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AREA FIRE PROTECTION AGENCY GEAR UP FOR FIRE SEASON

Persons visiting or camping in forested areas in north central Idaho are being urged to use caution and common sense when using open fire, trail hikes, chain saws, or other tools, vehicles or equipment with fire-starting potential.

The closed fire season, which normally begins about May 10, is now



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in effect throughout the state because of dry conditions and resulting fire danger. Permits are now required for open burning. Logging operations must be equipped with tools, spark arresters, and other equipment as required by closed season fire rules. Permits are not required for campfires, but persons in the forest are required by state law to carry a shovel, axe, and bucket for fire safety.

A fire coordination group has been formed by north central Idaho land management and protection agencies to organize and carry out as necessary a cooperative plan for fire emergencies. In the event of severe burning conditions or multiple wildfires in the area, the agencies will coordinate all fire-fighting activity and resources to meet overload situations which may occur.

The group includes Mick Koppang,

chief fire warden with Clearwater-Potlatch Timber Protective Association; John Preston, assistant area fire control supervisor with the State Department of Lands; Richard Knowles, resource manager with the Army Corps of Engineers; and Bob Adams, fire management officer on the Clearwater National Forest.

The interagency group is urging that forest users keep abreast of changing weather conditions and fire dangers and use discretion with fire during the remainder of the season. The group pointed out there were more than 15 man-caused fires during the past week. One burned more than 50 acres. The agencies will call upon the public for even more consideration and cooperation as the fire season increases.

Questions regarding travel through or use of forest lands should be directed to one of the cooperating agencies.

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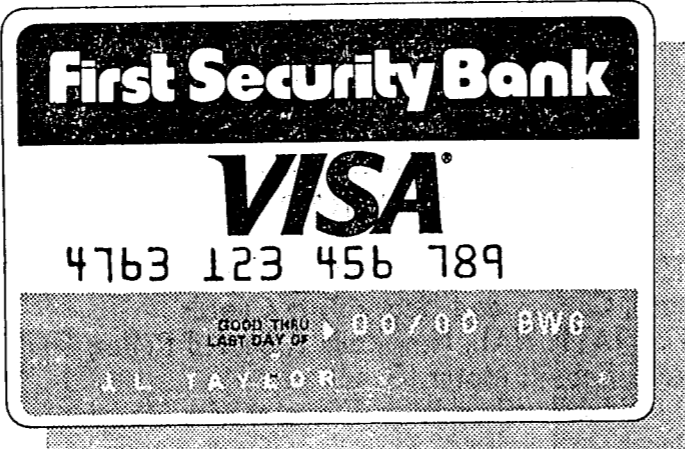
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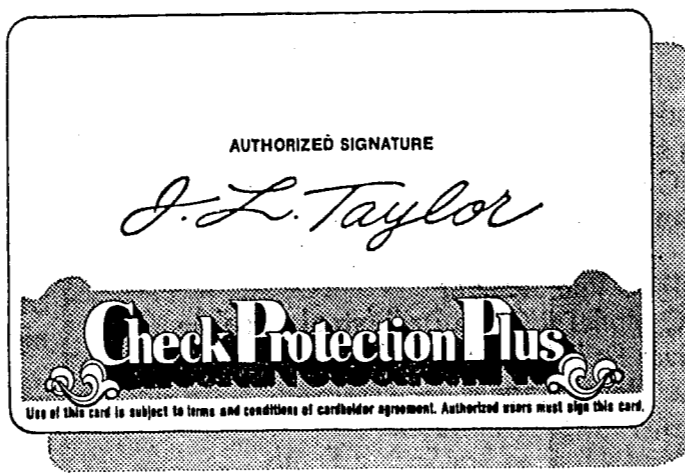


