You can safely use dishwater, bath water or laundry wash water for outdoor plantings. Don't use on edible garden root crops. Don't use the water with liquid or point use the water with figure of powder bleaches especially to wet foliage as chlorine is toxic. Chrlor-ine will dissipate if left standing op-en overnight. Those containing bo-ron or borax may build up a toxic condition if used.

House plants in small pots have such a limited amount of soil and roots that they will more sensitive, so use another source. Phosphates in detergents cause no problem in soil

Rain barrels are becoming popular again in rationed areas or where water is scarce. If it does rain the roof sheds a surprising amount of water.


"Early crops like lettuce and radishes may mature and be caten before it is necessary to water them. You can avoid late-season watering problems by planting early-maturing varieties of sweet corn, tomatoes

From a garden plot 50 feet by 200 feet, Idaho gardeners should be able to harvest \$500 to \$800 worth of ve-

"A home vegetable garden will take about the same amount of water as a lawn. If you want a good garden throughout the saeson, 24 inches of water will be needed. But a garden that gives good yields eary and only fair returns later can be grown with less water," he said.




