

M&O Levies Pass; Trustees Chosen— STOUT AND HAXTON ELECTED

Taxpayers in Joint School District 282, Genesee, went to the polls Tuesday and passed a 3-mill Maintenance and Operation over-ride levy by a 74 percent margin. Voters also returned Ray Stout as trustee from Zone 4 for a three year term and elected Wm. O. Haxton as a trustee from Zone 3.

The M&O mill levy won approval handsily with 140 "yes" votes cast and 49 "no" votes. A total of 189 ballots were cast, reported Supt. of Schools John Schwartz, Tuesday evening.

Bill Haxton was elected to the trustee position vacated by Tom Boyd

in Zone 3. Haxton polled 21 votes. His opponent in this contest was Harold Harmon who received 9 votes. Jay Nelson received 2 write-in votes.

There was also a contest for the trustee position in Zone 4 with Ray Stout being returned for another three years as he gathered 3 more votes than the 18 cast for Wade Hampton, who was making his first bid for elective office. A total of 39 ballots were cast in the Zone 4 contest.

Irma Egland, Dick Howell and Marion Holben are the hold-over trustees this year.

HARRIS AND PARSLEY UNOPPOSED

The School District elections held Tuesday saw Doug Harris and Jack Parsley representing School Board Zones No. 3 and No. 4 respectively returned to their posts for another three year term. The 5 mill over-ride issue before the voters were settled with 87 in favor and 3 opposed.

At the May meeting, the Kendrick School Board accepted the Magnuson Insurance Agency's Bid of \$6,365 for the 1977-78 insurance on vehicle and properties. The Board considered staff assignments for the upcoming year with no major changes being

adopted. Members of the Senior Class presented and the Board adopted a proposal for a class trip to Montana's Fairmont Hot Springs Resort on May 24-27. A school calendar for the 1977-78 school year was adopted which calls for school to begin on August 29th and end on May 25th.

The next regular Board meeting will be held in the High School on June 9th at 8:00 p. m. This meeting will be the annual Budget Hearing for review of the budget proposed for the 1977-78 school year.

Hold Permits
Steelhead permits bought by fishermen for this spring's steelhead season should be kept for use this fall if there is a season set.

The Department of Fish and Game reports there is some misunderstanding among fishermen about the 3-fish per season limit on steelhead. This limit applies to the season from January 1 to April 30.

**Drought Is New
Problem for Palouse**

The drought is something new to most of us in the Palouse. Gordon Dealey, Co. Extension Agent, has received a good deal of information on saving energy and water. Nationally citizens are under a presidential mandate to conserve energy. In turn, it takes energy to pump water.

Tony Horn, Extension Horticulturist, Boise, gives us a good deal of help on the question of water being re-used. You can safely use dish-water, bath water or laundry wash water for outdoor plantings. Don't use on edible garden root crops. Don't use the water with liquid or powder bleaches especially to wet foliage as chlorine is toxic. Chlorine will dissipate if left standing overnight. Those containing boron or borax may build up a toxic condition if used.

House plants in small pots have such a limited amount of soil and roots that they will more sensitive, so use another source. Phosphates in detergents cause no problem in soil.

Rain barrels are becoming popular again in rationed areas or where water is scarce. If it does rain the roof sheds a surprising amount of water.

DROUGHT WON'T STOP WEEDS
 Twin Falls—Growing weeds is all too easy because weed seed germinates readily under soil conditions too dry to promote good germination of crop seed, says Robert E. Higgins, UI weed specialist.
 "Planting depth of crops is most critical when moisture is limited. When the surface of the soil is dry, increased moisture will be found at the 2- to 3-inch depth. Crop seeds must have moisture if they are to germinate," Higgins said.
 Crops need to get off to a good start in order to compete against weeds in a dry year.

Yellow Star Thistle Program Expanded
 Latah County's yellow star thistle control program has been expanded with assistance available from the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. A cost-share program has been prepared by the county committee that includes 50% of the cost of aerial application and 50% of the cost of the herbicide. Also the program provides for 50% of the cost of the herbicide only for ground application. The program is available to growers on a priority basis to be determined by Latah Co. Weed Control and the applicator. This is to be a continuing program and growers are encouraged to budget for the assistance of the future. Funds and the availability of an aerial applicator will limit the number of acres to be treated in a given year. The total cost per acre for aerial application is \$13.50 half of which must be paid by the land owner. Interested persons must sign up with the County Weed Supervisor, Jim Sterling, Room 209 of the Latah Co. Courthouse, Moscow.
