Many Awards Given At Genesee HS Commencement

Commencement exercises for thirty-one graduates of Genesee high school was well attended Friday evening at the school gymnasium. Principal Roger Woehl welcomed all attending and announced that this commencement "marks the 98th year of recorded public education in Genesee." Woehl presented the awards and scholarships to the following seniors:

Stephanie Kambitsch, class valedictorian, received the Wm. J. Gray Athletic scholarship for \$1,000.00; the Alumni Association Award for \$100; the University of Idaho Honor Award, \$400; Elk's scholarship, \$100; Kiwanis Education Award, \$250; Jr. Miss Awards, \$450; Soroptimist Award, \$10.

Class salutatorian, Kevin Odenborg received one of the three Fred and Emma Shirrod scholarships for \$1,000; also a Lions Club scholarship for \$50; and a \$75 Honor Society scholarship.

Mark Lee and Anita AlLee received the other two Shirrod scholarships for \$1,000 each. Anita's other awards were Associated Student, UI Bookstore, \$300; Women in Engineering, \$300; and a Basic Education Opportunity Grant in the amount of \$800.

Besides Mark's scholarship from the Shirrods he was also the recipient of the David E. Blume scholarship for \$150. This is the first year this award has been offered.

Gary Bennett received the Basic Education Opportunity Grant for \$1,000; and Tammy Purcell received two \$700 awards, one from Potlatch Foundation scholarship and Basic Education Opportunity Grant.

Thom Shirley and Cheryl Esser each received a \$75 Catholic Daughters of America Financial aid award.

Guest speaker was Ed. Davis, superintendent of Potlatch schools, and former instructor at Genesee high school. In his address he urged the seniors to set the challenge to be one of those few people who make things happen. His favorite sport was football. Mulalley also enjoyed working in his yard and traveling.

He was born Sept. 23, 1908 at Genesee to Pat and Ida Mulalley. He lived there until 1935 when he moved to Moscow. He moved to Lewiston in 1943. He and his wife, the former Pearl Hesel whom he married in Moscow Dec. 26, 1936 lived at 1618 14th Ave.

He is survived by his widow, a son, David Mulalley of Yakima; a daughter, Linda Mulalley of Lewiston; three sisters, Irene Berger and Olive Wardrobe, both of Lewiston; and Mary Kane of Spokane and a granddaughter.

Funeral services were held Friday at 2 p. m. at Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home with the Rev. J. Stanley Lyman officiating.

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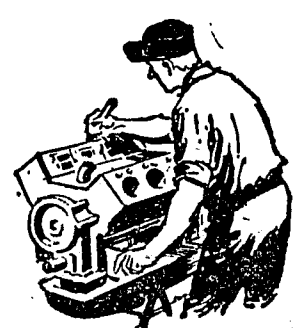
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M. K. 'Kelly' Cline Retires as Latah County Auditor-Recorder

M. K. (Kelly) Cline, Latah County Auditor since 1962, retired last week. The 15 years of Mr. Cline's service to the county have been years of tremendous change and growth. He has served well and the Gazette joins with others in saying "well done" and wishing both he and his wife many happy and rewarding years of health and contentment.

As he left office, Kelly reviewed and few of the changes and discussed his accomplishments as a public servant.

When I was elected in 1962 as your Clerk of the District Court, Ex-Officio Auditor-Recorder and Clerk of the County Commissioners there were several things which I hoped to accomplish, before leaving office.

As time has gone by, other developments have taken place and it is with a sense of pride that I point these out to you.

I hoped to see the day when there would be no county bonded indebtedness. On the second Monday of January 1963, when I was sworn in, there were \$303,000.00 in courthouse outstanding bonds. I was instrumental in convincing the commissioners to refinance those bonds which were demanding 3.75% and 4.25% interest to a new rate of 3.00% and 3.5%.

All bonds have been paid off and the county is free of indebtedness and I hope will continue bond free.

After conducting a survey, I found there were surplus funds on deposit in various banks but were drawing no interest. I recommended to the board that some of these funds should be invested in short term CDs (Certificates of Deposit) and this practice has been continued. The interest derived has amounted to thousands of dollars.

In 1963 there was no air-conditioning in any of the courthouses. The auditor's office has a west exposure, all of glass. There was a period of over a week that the temperature was never under 90°. Because of the budget, only a circulating fan and duck work was installed that year. The following year saw the installation of the compressor. Now nearly every office is air-conditioned.

I suggested, in order to help keep the main corridor cooler that a canopy be placed on the west side of the courthouse. This proved so acceptable that the following year the same type was installed on the east side. Now courthouse patrons are protected from the rain, snow, and weather on entering from either side.

Records used to be kept by photography but space requirements became critical. Now all current records are microfilmed and we have started on the old records. This will take a long time and be quite expensive but is necessary.

Many of you will remember that there have been many election changes. In 1971 the state required a complete new re-registration and Latah County was the pioneer county for punch card voting in the state. Now the census bureau has dictated reprecincting and reassignment of precinct boundaries.

When the Cornwall estate, directly across the street from the courthouse parking lot, was being settled, I talked the commissioners in purchasing the property to be converted into additional parking. Both usually are filled to capacity.

January 1, 1971 was the date when Justice of the Peace; Police Courts; and Probate Courts were abolished and all court work has been the responsibility of this office. I have not been too pleased with this consolidation for the individual, personalized understanding and convenience seems to have been lost. This I have also heard from various parts of the state and that a centralized dynasty is being created.

Although the Latah Convalescent Center has not been any responsibility of this office, I have been interested in its operation and have a kind spot in my heart for it. Just east of the facility was an old, rundown house back in 1966. I was able to talk the commissioners in purchasing that property, with the thought in mind for future expansion. I was thinking especially of those who are too well to be in the hospital but not needing the facility care. Either small cottages or duplexes would serve a real need where a couple would be together, near medication and food if necessary, but able to take care of themselves, to a great extent.

In connection with the center, in 1973 I was instrumental in the formation of a perpetual fund for the comfort and convenience of the residents of the center. Legal papers were drawn up making the three trustees of the fund the manager of the First Federal Savings and Loan; the Auditor of Latah County; and the Director of Nurses of the Center. Provision is made that not more than 80% of the interest may be withdrawn each year. From a small start, the fund has and continues to grow and contributions are always appreciated.

There have been and probably will continue to be injustices in the compensation allowed some elected and appointed officials in comparison to the duties and responsibilities. I have tried to run an economical, accommodating office and to stand up for what was fair.

It has been my privilege to have enjoyed the support of Republicans, Democrats and Independents and in each election to have been the leader in getting votes.

I should like to thank one and all with whom it has been my pleasure to have worked and served and for those who supported not only my candidacy but of those who ran against me. A two party system is essential for the survival of this coun-

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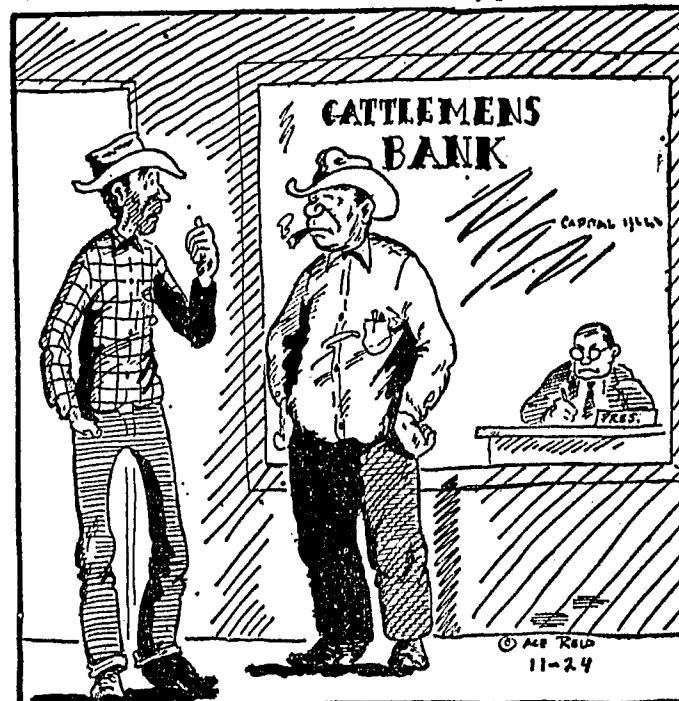
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IT HAPPENED WAY BACK WHEN

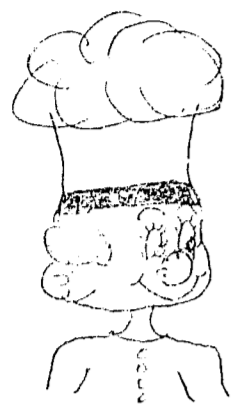
