Bob and his family had moved to Yakima 11 years ago and he was a vocational agriculture instructor and advisor of the Future Farmers of America at Eisenhower High School in that city. Prior to that he had taught school at Genesee for a number of years and was a well-known and respected member of Genesee commun-


