The council said if this action does not reduce water usage, more drastic action will have to be taken. These water rates will remain in effect un-

til further notice. Kendrick Set Times

Kendrick took a different approach to water conservation. The Kendrick council passed a strongly worded or-dinance setting times for sprinkling or irrigation. Using the State High-way as a dividing line, the residents south of the highway may water on Monday, Wednesdays, and Fridays only. Those on the North side of the highway may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. No Sunday watering is allowed. The Kendrick ordinance also sets forth fines for violations and even provides for shutting off water service to those who repeatedly violate the ordinance.

Genesee Asks Reduction The Genesee city council took the least stringent action of the three towns, but it did ask the citizens to reduce water use by 25 percent during the period of shortage both on water and electricity. This is the same reduction asked by Idaho Gov.







Fifteen Placed On Jobs In Latah County

Turning to Latah County unemployment totals, Mrs. Dunn reported that 424 persons were filing for unemployment insurance benefits compared to 449 last week and 505 during the same week in 1976. Only 39 new claims were filed down from the previous week's figure at 48 and last year's total at 47.

Again the Troy-Deary-Bovill showed the most significant change in unemployment. This week 104 persons were receiving benefits compared to 115 last week and 124 a year ago. The decrease can be attributed to a number of workers returning to forest-related jobs. Potlatch, too, saw a relative change from 64 to 55 unemployed. Last year at this time 77 persons were reported jobless. In Moscow 247 persons were filing for benefits generated to 250 last week benefits compared to 250 last week and 266 in 1976, while Genesee remained fairly stable at 10 compared to 11 and 18 and Kendrick at 8, 9,


