IDAHO'S ECONOMY
 Idaho's economy should continue to expand despite agricultural uncertainties caused by a critical water shortage, according to the quarterly First Security Bank Newsletter released this week, said James Hoogland, Jr. manager and Stan Merrill, manager. Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist is editor of the newsletter.

Favorable employment growth and job opportunities are expected during the second quarter. During the first three months of 1977, non-agricultural wage and salary employment growth remained at 7 percent or 19,000 jobs ahead of last year.

Construction outlook is excellent for the second quarter. The newsletter predicts that stable mortgage rates and adequate funds available to mortgage granting institutions will be a major factor in construction industry growth.

This favorable construction market in Idaho and other Western States will have a definite positive effect on lumber production in the state. First quarter lumber production was 10 percent above the same period last year. After midyear, however, dry timber conditions could impede logging efforts.

Merchandising activity was strong in the first quarter and the retail sales outlook for the April-June period is good. Automobile sales were particularly strong.

The newsletter reported an increased demand for credit over the first quarter last year and predicted that all segments of credit demand should increase during the second quarter.

With Idaho's water supply at 40 percent of normal, the newsletter predicted that a combination of the

drought and unfavorable prices will reduce agricultural production and income in 1977. While most agricultural commodity prices in the first quarter remained sharply below a year ago, moderate price improvement in the cattle and wheat markets is anticipated in the second half of 1977.

On the national scene, the letter predicts that business activity will accelerate sharply, establishing an above-average growth pattern that will probably continue throughout the summer.

The rate of inflation should reach 6 percent during 1977, despite the Carter Administration's announced anti-inflationary policy. The rate of real economic expansion in the April-to-June period will reach an annual rate of 7-8 percent.

Interest rates will remain relatively stable during the second quarter but higher inflation and rising demands for credit will push interest rates upward in the second half of 1977.

Business spending for plant and equipment is also anticipated to increase in the next summer.



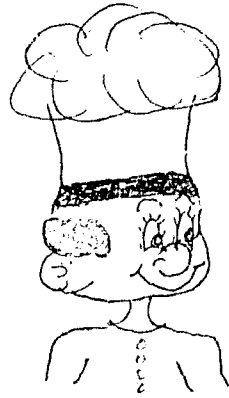

Fifteen Placed On Jobs In Latah County

15 persons were placed on jobs this week through the Idaho Department of Employment Job Service, said Phyllis Dunn, Moscow, office manager. Notices of 6 new positions for a qualified bookkeeper, journeyman auto mechanic, saleslady (permanent), part-time cook, permanent office manager, registered nurse, and a part-time kitchen helper. Interested persons should contact the Dept. of Employment at 221 E. Second, Moscow, for details.

Turning to Latah County unemployment totals, Mrs. Dunn reported that 424 persons were filing for unemployment insurance benefits compared to 419 last week and 505 during the same week in 1976. Only 39 new claims were filed down from the previous week's figure at 48 and last year's total at 47.

Again the Troy-Deary-Bovill showed the most significant change in unemployment. This week 104 persons were receiving benefits compared to 115 last week and 124 a year ago. The decrease can be attributed to a number of workers returning to forest-related jobs. Potlatch, too, saw a relative change from 61 to 55 unemployed. Last year at this time 77 persons were reported jobless. In Moscow 247 persons were filing for benefits compared to 250 last week and 266 in 1976, while Genesee remained fairly stable at 10 compared to 11 and 18 and Kendrick at 8, 9, and 14.

McDonald Named New CETA Administrator

(Boise) Glenn W. Nichols, Director of the Idaho Department of Employment, announced this week the appointment of Scott B. McDonald of Pocatello as Administrator of the Department's CETA Division.

The 31-year-old McDonald is currently the Executive Director of the Southeast Idaho Council of Government, and will take over his new job on the first of July.

"Scott brings an ideal combination of talent to this job," according to Nichols. "He has the combination of skills needed to head up the complex Idaho CETA program in that he has management expertise, the ability to understand and deal with federal regulations, and a sensitivity for the needs of local government," Nichols said.
