Give As Much Information As Possible When Reporting An Accident, Is Request

The recent number of calls answered by the Kendrick-Juliaetta Service has prompted on Friday, Aug. 12. Ambulance members of the Ambulance Crew to request persons reporting an acci- Gertjedent and requesting ambulance help, to please give as much information about the accident as they can.

First, the most important, is the exact location of the accident. Time lost when the crew must search for the scene could mean life or death to the victims.

Some details concerning the accident or need for the ambulance is invaluable. This enables the crew to determine how much help might be needed, special equipment could morning several miles out of Juliabe brought along and the ambulance crews would have a better idea of what they could expect.

Also it might be helpful if the person reporting the emergency would indicate if there was possible fire danger, this would enable crew to alert or bring along the fire truck.
