No Water—

The Department of Fish and Game soon will begin hauling water for game birds at its Jerome Game Bird Farm.

The canal, supplied by American Falls Reservoir and carrying water to the bird farm, is expected to be turned off August 22.

Nearly 10,000 birds are now in pens at the farm and would have to be watered twice daily.

Dick Norell, game bird supervisor, at the department said old tires will be cut in half and used as watering troughs for the 8,500 pheasants, 1,000 chukars and other miscellaneous species housed at the farm.

He said the water will be turned off until September 5, will be running until September 15 and then will be shut off again for the season. Norell said 7,500 pheasants are scheduled to be released this year from the farm, but the releases will not begin until early October.

The service opened with Mrs. Herman Schupfer playing several appropriate numbers on her organ. A color guard from Baker-Lind Post No. 3913 VFW composed of a Marine, Everett Farrington; a soldier, Ervin Halseh, and a sailor, Don Dammarell, raised the colors to half-mast, while David Coulter sounded "To The Colors," on his bugle. A prayer was then offered by the Rev. Paul Forsberg of Juliaetta followed by the singing of "America the Beautiful."

The pool was then formally presented by George F. Brocke, president of the Kendrick Commercial Club, acting in behalf of all donors of the Club and accepted on behalf of the town by Roy H. Ramey, Mayor pro-tem. Dr. Joseph H. Coulter made the statement of dedication and gave the Memorial address. He then read the list of local men to whose memory the pool is dedicated.

The Rev. Earl Gaskill then offered prayer which was following of "America" and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. Coulter. After the formal service was over Mrs. Schupfer played a number of selections on the organ and many people stayed in the park, visiting, picnicking and enjoying the pool all afternoon. Home Cookin'...

Everyone enjoys warm sweet rolls or spicy coffee cake. This recipe was sent to us some time ago from a Home Demonstration Agent and we think it's a very good one. An easy-to-handle kneaded dough for sweet rolls or coffee cake.

- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) margarine
- 1 1/2 cup warm water (105-115F)
- 2 packages or cake Fleischman's Yeast, active dry or compressed
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 4 1/2 cups unsifted flour (about)

Scald milk; stir in sugar, salt and margarine; cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large, warm bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, beaten eggs and half the flour; beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour to make a slightly stiff dough. Turn dough out on lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic, about eight minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Punch down; turn out on lightly floured board and shape as desired.

Latah County Employment Figures Are High

According to Phyllis Dunn, Moscow, local office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment, area employers are currently seeking qualified applicants for the following positions: a waitress, maintenance supervisor, secretary, licensed practical nurse, and several cooks, general office clerks, nurse aides and kitchen help. Interested persons may contact the Department at 221 E. Second, Moscow for details.

The Latah Co. unemployment insurance rolls dropped below the 300 mark for the first time this year. Only 299 persons were filing as of last week while a year ago during the same week nearly 45 percent more were listed unemployed. The last new claim count came to 21, representing separations from a variety of occupations, including food processing and armed services.

Most area unemployment totals remain stable, with the exception of Troy-Deary-Bovill and Potlatch both down 20 percent from last week's figures to 51 and 30, respectively. A year ago 96 Troy-Deary-Bovill and 54 Potlatch workers were receiving unemployment benefits.

Other community totals: Moscow 205 compared to 252 last year, Genesee 10 compared to 19 and Kendrick 3 compared to 18.

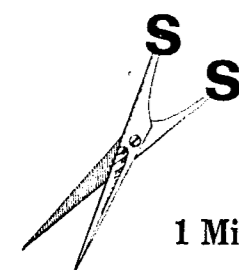

Search and Rescue Course Set at U of I

Persons interested in search and rescue work will have a chance to learn the techniques used and equipment required in search operations by taking a University of Idaho class this fall.

The course on search and rescue techniques will be offered through the UI office of Continuing Education with Charles Stratton, associate professor of English, and Gene L. Neff of the UI Army Officer Education program as instructors.

Stratton is a member of the Palouse/Clearwater Search and Rescue Unit and serves as chairman of the Latah County Search and Rescue Council. He has been active in search and rescue (SAR) for about 6 years. Neff is faculty advisor to the University Search and Rescue Unit.

Stratton said the class will emphasize land navigation with map and compass, radio communications, prediction of lost victim behavior, base camp organization and operation, wilderness first aid and evacuation, and special SAR techniques such as helicopter rescue, tracking, use of dogs and horses.

"We're patterning this after training offered through SAR units," Stratton said.

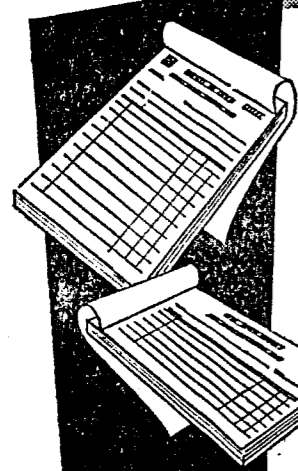
A \$10 charge will be made for the 2-credit class which will meet for 10 sessions from 7 to 8:40 p. m. in University Classroom Center room number 107 beginning Aug. 30. In addition to the classroom sessions, there will be two weekend field trips involving map and compass courses and a two-day practice search in connection with the County SAR Council. The class will be limited to 40 students.

Students will be expected to put together personal search gear such as suitable cold weather clothing, good boots and a 24-hour pack which would enable them to stay overnight in the wilderness.

Texts to be used for the course are "The Explorer Search and Rescue Training Manual" by Jon Wartes and "Mountain Search for the Lost Victim" by Dennis Kelly. Both will be available soon at the UI bookstore.

Further information and registration forms are available at the Latah County Sheriff's office and from the UI office of Continuing Education.

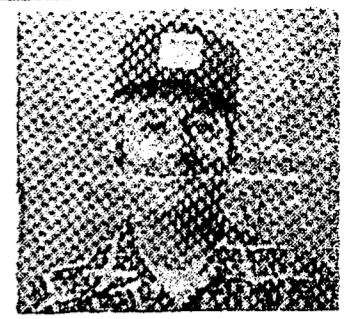

Permit Fees—

The notification mailed to controlled hunt permit winners is not the actual permit but a bill for that permit. The Department of Fish and Game reports that 1977 is the first year that a fee has been charged for the permits. The fees were put on permits after the department dropped the \$1 application fee this year. Hunt permit winners will find the fee for their permit on the card that notified them their name was drawn for one of the controlled hunts. 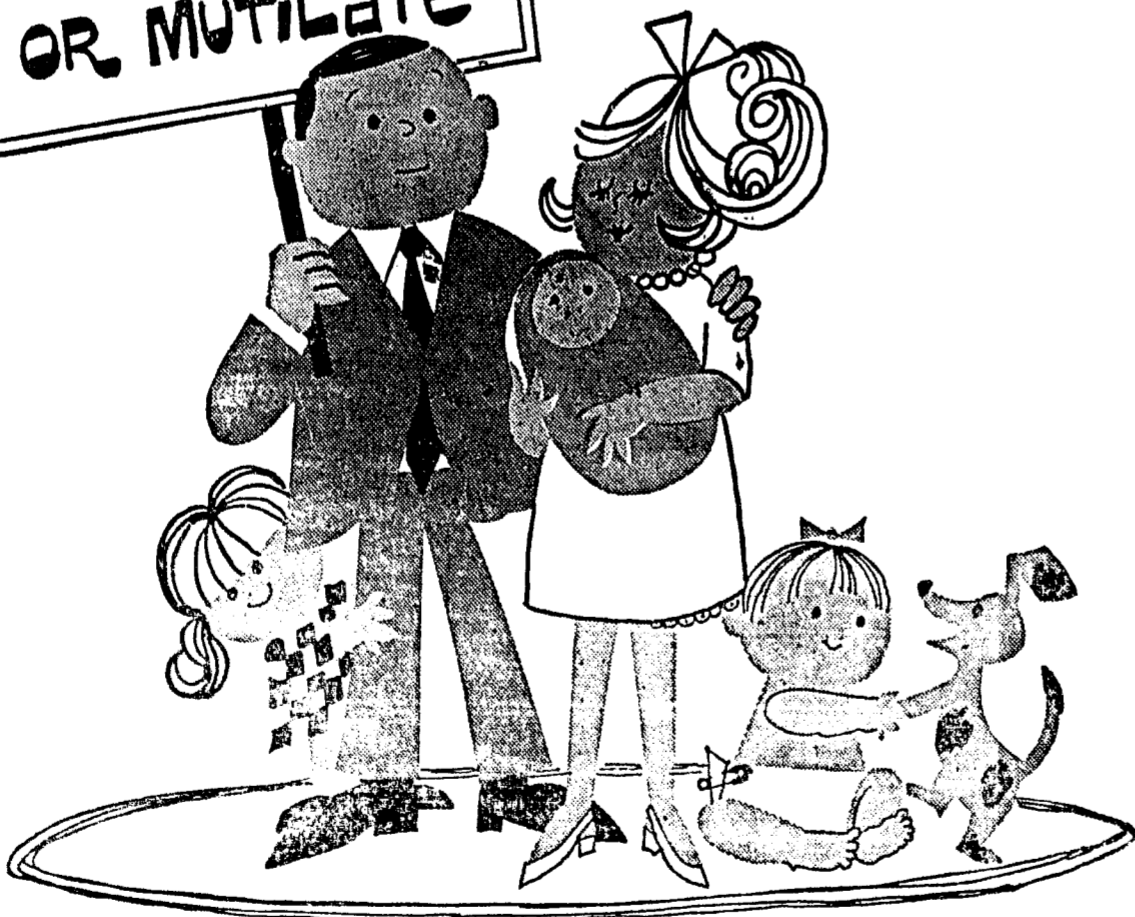

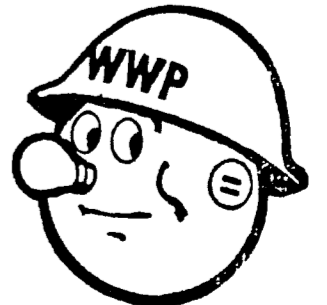


