



Pink Eye Is Contagious

"Pink eye" is a term often used to describe an inflammation of the eye. It is most common in infants and small children, notes the Idaho Medical Association.

Pink eye causes a scratching sensation in the eye. The eyes burn and are bloodshot and the lids may be stuck together in the mornings. Usually it is not serious and not very difficult to cure, but it must be treated promptly.


Any time the eye is persistently inflamed, it should have medical attention.

Pink eye is contagious, and usual-ly the patient is isolated from others

in the family. Frequent washing out of the cyes with some mild solution and protection from strong light usually are prescribed. Inflamed eyes usually respond readily to treatment and the prob-
