Don't Be a Doormat; Your Feelings Count

Some advertisers try to sell a product by saying "Be Good to Yourself, Buy . . ." or they say "You Owe it to Yourself." Whether or not you buy the product, the idea of being good to yourself might be a refreshing one.

Most of us were brought up with the idea that its improper, crude, selfish, impolite or even unChristian to think of ourselves first. We learn to begin sentences with "I" and not to start a letter that way, either.

But, in family situations, feeling that you don't matter over a long period spells trouble. A woman, particularly may be brought up to put the needs of her husband and children first—to always submerge her personal self.

But being unselfish doesn't mean being a nothing. When this woman does have a husband and children, she often feels resentful and rebellious. She can't quite pull off this saintly act and be healthy inside. But, to have family peace, she ignores her own needs. Then others in the family ignore her needs, too.

That means she's literally a martyr. Inside, she rebels; outside, she's a doormat.

One woman, totally in charge of her family's finances, thought she was unbearably selfish. Why? Because she occasionally bought herself a pretty scarf or a bar of fancy soap. She felt she should have spent the money on her family.

Although her family wasn't lacking life's necessities, she felt guilty for spending money on her self.

This kind of feeling is balogna. Every family member has a right to some self expression, mother included. Of course, some other family members may have this same kind of feeling—that only the others

Employment Remains Stable In Latach County, Says Report

Latach county unemployment remained stable over the last week, said Phyllis Dunn, Idaho Department of Employment Moscow Local Office manager. Only 282 persons were filing for benefits compared to 446 a year ago, while new claims rose slightly to 33, identical to last year's figure for the same week.

Mrs. Dunn indicated that end-of-summer layoffs are expected to swell unemployment insurance rolls slightly over the next few weeks, though concurrent new job availabilities



District II FHA Leadership Meeting Held in Lapwai

The District II Leadership meeting was held August 25th at 4:00 p. m. at the Lapwai high school. Chapters from Kendrick, Lapwai, Deary and Highland attended.

Discussion was opened and the date September 27th or 26th was made for the leadership program. "Career Day" was another topic and the Kendrick chapter volunteered to find and set a date for it.

The District theme for this year is "The Age of Change" and the state theme is "Our Changing Image." These conventions will be held later in the year.

We are glad to hear that Riggins, Idaho is forming an FHA program. And District II encourages them to face the future with warm courage and high hope.

Forest System, Northern Region, Payments to States

Missoula, Mt.—Payments from the Forest Service to States in the Northern Region (Montana, northern Idaho, western South Dakota) in fiscal year 1977 (October 1, 1976, to September 30, 1977) are estimated to be up 104 percent over the previous year, reports George Fleming, Director of Fiscal Management for the Northern Region.

Fleming explained that the money is 25 percent of the revenue the U. S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service estimates it will collect from the sale of timber and from grazing, recreation, minerals, and other land-use charges on the 15 National Forests of the Northern Region. By law, 25 percent of those receipts are returned to states where the lands are located to be used for public schools and roads.

Last year, 34 counties in the Northern Region were paid \$5,120,790.41.

The National Forest Management Act of 1976 requires the Secretary of Agriculture to provide the States with advance estimates of revenues they will receive as 25 percent payments for use in planning local budgets.

Payments of the State shares of National Forest land receipts will be made on or about December 1st. State shares of National Grasslands and land utilization area receipts will be paid on or about March 1, 1978, based on revenues collected during calendar year 1977.

Payments to States and counties will be based on actual receipts collected and thus may vary from the estimates announced today.

Many Conditions Contribute To Backache Ailments

Oh, my aching back! How many times have you heard someone say that? Or said it yourself?

Backache is such a common ailment among civilized man that there are very few adults who haven't had a touch of it now and then.

Some physicians credit soft beds, soft chairs and other comforts of modern civilization with an increase in the number of persons suffering from low back pain, the American Medical Association points out.

Once called lumbago, back pain is often caused by poor posture, obesity, ill-fitting or inappropriate shoes, a sedentary life, overly strenuous work, or participating in sports. It may also be caused by disease not directly relating to the back, or to injury or strain.

Low back pain may occur at any age, but it seems to bother middle-aged persons most. It occurs in both sexes and in all races, and is more common among people who do work that requires stooping or lifting.

Good posture of the entire body is important in preventing low back pain. Sit with head, shoulders and trunk erect. Stand straight. Not the military ramrod posture, but straight.

A soft, saggy bed and low, soft chairs contribute to backache. Chairs ideally should be firm, straight and have the contour of a normal back.

A low-heeled shoe is best for standing or walking. High-heeled shoes throw the posture off balance and increase strain on the lower back. Loafers, ballet slippers or sneakers may contribute to backache if worn extensively.

In lifting heavy objects, keep the back straight and lift with the knees and thigh muscles, rather than bending over and straining the spine.

Like most other ailments, backache may be aggravated by emotional tension or anxiety.

Treatment of backache varies with the cause. When it's due to strain usually rest, heat and a pain reliever will help. Massage in moderation may relieve discomfort. Your doctor also may recommend exercise to strengthen the muscles of the back and to improve posture.

Special Chukar Hunts

The special chukar hunting season which opened August 1 along the roadless portion of the Salmon River and the Middle Fork of the Salmon has apparently not attracted much attention from hunters.

Department spokesmen in the Salmon City area report they have heard nothing about hunting activity this summer during the early season that has been set annually for several years. Chukar populations have been rated very good in the special hunt area.

The season runs until September 17 when the regular chukar hunting season begins.

Daily bag limit is eight chukars and possession limit is 16 during both the early hunt and the regular season.

The hunting area parallels the Salmon River, taking in a half mile on either side, from the mouth of Sheep Creek above Riggins upstream to the mouth of Horse Creek, and the Middle Fork of the Salmon, a half mile on either side, from its mouth upstream to the mouth of Indian Creek. Normally hunting activity is by float parties on the rivers, but floating has been slower than usual this year due to the drought.

In any event, eager bird hunters with horses or ability to walk long distances should find excellent chukar hunting in these two remote areas.

Elk Tag Sales End Sept. 27

The Department of Fish & Game reminded elk hunters this week that elk tags will not be sold in Idaho after midnight September 27.

Some parts of the state also will stop selling deer tags on the same date. Midnight September 7 is the cutoff time for the sale of deer tags in Idaho and all counties north. In the counties south of Idaho after the cutoff date.

County tags will be sold until midnight October 11.

There are three exceptions to the cutoff dates:

- Children who become 12 years of age after the cutoff dates.
- Persons who have acquired their 6-month residency after the cutoff dates.
- Idaho servicemen on leave and arriving in Idaho after the cutoff date.




