Zucchini, that versatile vegetable that arrives in the garden early, bears abundantly all season long until the plant is nipped by frost in the fall, requires skill and imagination a homemaker has to keep it tempting and desirable for her family.

We had a good recipe last week, and now Mrs. Erna Nelson has shared with us two more marvelously sounding ways to utilize this remarkable produce.

Now we've all made Zucchini bread, but have you tried ...

**Zucchini Cookies**  
Beat together,  
2 cups brown sugar  
2 cups grated Zucchini  
2 tsp. vanilla  
1 cup salad oil  
2 eggs

Sift together,  
4 cups flour  
2 tps. soda  
2 tps. baking powder  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. nutmeg  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1 1/2 tps. ginger

Combine both mixtures and stir till smooth.  
Add:  
2 cups raisins  
1 cup walnuts

Drop by spoonful onto lightly oiled cookie sheet.  
Bake 350 degrees 10 to 15 minutes.  
Can be glazed while still warm.

For a "good enough for company" dish that combines our old friend, the

Zucchini, with the elegant Eggplant, Mrs. Nelson has opened up her recipe files to share with us her ...

**Garden Vegetable Casserole**  
1 cup sliced almonds (optional)  
1/2 lb. bacon cut in 1-inch lengths  
1 lb. Zucchini squash, sliced  
1 lb. eggplant, diced  
1 large onion, cut in wedges  
1 tbs. flour  
2 cups diced fresh tomatoes or 1 can (1 lb.) tomatoes undrained  
1 teas. minced garlic  
1 1/2 teas. salt  
1/4 teas. pepper  
1/4 teas. basil  
1 pkg. (6 oz.) sliced Swiss Cheese

1. Sauté almonds with bacon in 10 to 12 inch skillet. When almonds are lightly roasted and bacon crisp, remove from skillet with slotted spoon.  
2. Add Zucchini, egg plant an onion to skillet, cover and cook over medium-low heat for 15 minutes, shaking pan or stirring often to prevent sticking.

3. Mix in flour, then add tomatoes, breaking them up with spoon into chunks. Stir in garlic, salt, pepper and basil.  
4. Layer vegetable mixture, almonds and cheese slices in 2-qt. baking dish ending up with almond ring and bacon on top.

5. To serve right away, bake uncovered in preheated oven 400 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes, or until bubbly throughout.  
6. To serve later, cover and refrigerate. To heat, uncover and bake in pre-heated 400 degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes until bubbly throughout.

Makes 6 servings.  
NOTE: if you do not wish to use bacon, use 3 tbsps. vegetable oil instead.

## FHA 'Roots' Go Back 60 Years

In 1917 President Woodrow Wilson signed the first National Vocational Education Act into law. This act created federally supported, state-run programs of vocational education which included Home Economics. The establishment of Home Economics Education laid the foundation for the development of Future Homemakers of America as an integral part of the program. As early as 1920, high school Home Economics students belonged to clubs.

In 1945 a group selected a name for the proposed National Youth Organization of students studying Home Economics Education. The result: Future Homemakers of America. In 1946, Idaho was the 12th state to join this chartered association.

FHA is a national organization of students who have taken or are taking Home Ec. courses. There are two types of Future Homemakers of America Chapters F. H. A.—for consumer and homemaking students and HERO—for occupational and job training students.

Our local Kendrick Chapter is thriving with 26 members and, with initiation soon approaching, we will have even greater numbers and hopefully some boys may become involved.

F. H. A. is a true benefit for all those who join. People working for their degrees realize this even more than other chapter members. It enables the students to better understand themselves and how to relate to others. It improves family awareness and therefore helps communication within the family. F. H. A. also provides opportunities of responsibility through offices held within the Chapter, District, State or National levels. It also makes the student aware of jobs and careers awaiting them after school years.

## Genesee Council Met Sept. 12

The Mayor and Council approved the budget for the coming fiscal year in the amount of \$133,516. New water and sewer lines are being built to serve new homes in the area of Jackson and Hazel streets.

The Council will hold Public Hearings on two proposed ordinances on October 10th at 7:00 p. m. at City Hall. Requirements for mobile homes on private lots will be reviewed, and the second proposal addresses family dwellings as a permitted use in the C-1 and C-2 Zones.

The City election will be held at City hall, November 8. The terms of Mayor Sorensen and Councilmen Zenner and Merrill expire. Zenner will not seek re-election and nominating petitions are now available at the City Hall office. Petitions must contain the signatures of eight registered voters and be submitted to the City Clerk between September 29 and October 11 in order to be on the ballot. If you are eligible and have not registered you may do so at the office of the Clerk, Springer's Insurance on Walnut.

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
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**FFA HELD FIRST FALL MEETING SEPTEMBER 1**

Mr. Glen Utzman presented and reviewed the School District audit for the year ending June 30, 1977. The Board adopted the Audit.


The Board approved teacher contracts for Mrs. Eleanor Blume, 4th grade and Mr. John Coughlin, Music
