Troy Defeats Bulldogs 36-6

The Genesee Bulldogs offense, riddled by injuries scored first against the Troy Trojans last Friday night at Troy, but then saw the Trojans come bouncing back to score in all four quarters and take a 36-6 victory in a White Pine League contest.
Mike Charvara opened the game with a 38-yard run to put the Bulldogs out in front 6-0, but the Trojans came roaring back with two answering touchdowns in the first quarter. The first was on a 40 yard run after a blocked punt by Paul McGahran and then Troy quarterback Dick Hammond passed to Mark Hoffman for 13 yards and another score and Troy was leading 12-6 at the end of the first period.

Mike Smith scored both Troy touchdowns in the second quarter as he went 6 yards for the first one and then broke clear to gallop 51 yards for the second tally. Troy failed to convert any of its touchdowns that evening.
In the third quarter it was Hammond again passing to Hoffman in a 29 yard touchdown play. In the final period of play, Jeff Nelson hammered over from 3 yards out to give the Trojans the 36-6 win.

uous work or participating in sports. It may also be caused by disease not directly relating to the back, or to injury or strain.

Good posture of the entire body is important in preventing low back pain. Sit with head, shoulders and trunk erect. Stand straight. Not the military ramrod posture, but straight.

A soft, saggy bed and low, soft chairs contribute to backache. Chairs should be firm, straight and have the contour of a normal back.
Low-heeled shoes are best for standing or walking. High-heeled shoes throw the posture off balance and increase strain on the lower back. Loafers, slippers or sneakers may contribute to backache if worn extensively. In lifting heavy objects, keep the back straight and life with the knees and thigh muscles.

Like most other ailments, backache may be aggravated by emotional tension or anxiety. Treatment varies. When it is due to strain, usually rest, heat and a pain reliever will help. Moderate massage may relieve discomfort, and doctors may

PAY ATTENTION; THERE'S A QUIZ

As hunters are heading afield for another fall season, statistics at the Department of Fish and Game say between five and ten of them will not return alive.

Between 25 and 30 of them probably will be wounded while hunting. The department reports that seven persons were killed in gun accidents while hunting in 1976. Twenty-nine were wounded.

Of this total of 36 gun accidents, six of them occurred during a deer hunt, followed by bird hunting with four accidents. The leading cause of accidents was removing a gun or placing it in a case or holster.

The next leading causes were the shooter stumbling and fell; removing a gun from or placing it into a vehicle or boat, and the victim out of sight of the shooter.

How does a hunter know whether or not he or his hunting partner is safe?

If a hunter can answer "always" to each of the following questions, he has a good chance of not showing up

on the department's hunting accident statistics:

—Is your gun on safety until you are ready to shoot?

—When unloading your gun, do you count the number of shells you eject to make sure the gun is empty?

—Do you know where your hunting partners are at all times?

—Have you fired at least 100 rounds of ammunition to become familiar with the firearm you are using?

—Do you wear hunter orange clothing?

—Are you sure of the background behind your target?

—Do you unload your gun before crossing a fence or other obstacle?

—Do you report game violations to your local conservation officer?

On the quiz, score ten points for each question answered "always"; five points for a "sometimes" and a zero for "never." Sixty points or above indicate good hunter safety.

40-60 points show a need to improve hunting habits and less than 45 points means the hunter should make tracks to the nearest hunter safety manual.



This meeting is for Farm Bureau members, but all Nez Perce County residents are invited to be present.


