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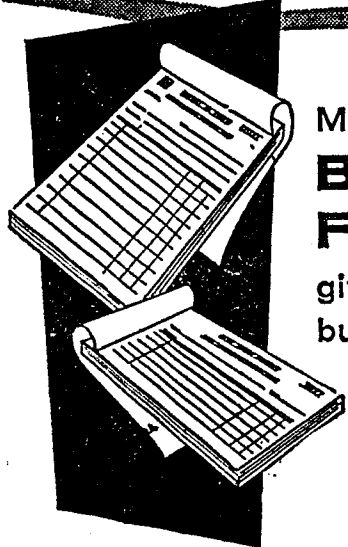
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Israel - Ward Wedding Vows Exchanged In Ephrata Ceremony September 3

Family Affair—
 Make Home a Safe Place For Expression of Feelings

Society teaches people not to show negative emotions. But everybody has them, even "nice" people. Even kind and loving people have them.

Try to make it safe for family members to express emotion. Don't suggest to loved ones that they are bad for feeling as they do, or that they should not feel the way they do.

Instead, let family members blow their cool once in a while. Then, they won't be overwhelmed by their emotions.

What makes a safe environment? 1st never tell anyone "you shouldn't feel that way." If your frustrated teenage son, for example, says he hates school and wants to quit, he's being honest. He's admitting his feelings. Accept them. And don't counter this anger with logic. Wait until his temperature cools.

2nd, let actions speak loudly. Do something positive about anger. Learn to describe negative feelings. Then you won't have to act on them. Actions taken in anger may be inappropriate, harmful, or destructive. They could even land you in a hospital or in jail. Talking about your feelings brings relief. It lowers emotional temperature and brings the situation into focus. Once you've cooled down, you can begin to look at your problem rationally. Only then you can begin to look for solutions that meet your real needs and goals.


