News Items From Genesee Schools

The Genesee School Board met Monday, October 10, 1977 at 7:30 P. M. in the Superintendent's office. The Board adopted the corrected validated census of Wednesday, September 21, 1977 to use for rezoning trustee zones in the Genesee School District.

The Board reviewed two approaches for changing trustee zones to comply with more equal representation on the basis of population among the zones. One approach, pieced the town taking a portion of the town's population and adding to it each of the other zones to balance representation.

The Board heard a review of training policy by Genesee Coaching Staff and gave their endorsement of the existing policy and its enforcement by the coaching staff. Opening enrollment for Kindergarten was 28 students. The Board instructed Supt. Schwartz to divide the kindergarten class and offer a morning and afternoon session.

Public hearing was held at 7:00 P. M. on two proposed ordinances to amend the Zoning Ordinance. Mayor Sorenson presided at the hearing.

Ordinance 241 amending the Zoning Ordinance to allow family dwellings in the C-1 and C-2 was read, approved and passed with unanimous vote. Ordinance 242 amending the zoning ordinance to provide additional requirements for mobile homes on private lots was read, approved and passed with an unanimous vote of the council.

A third Ordinance, declaring the City will have but one precinct, rather than two wards was read, approved and passed unanimously.

Tigers Drop Bulldogs 16-0

Kendrick's Tigers came out of the Valley last Friday night to spoil the Genesee High School Homecoming football game with a 16-0 shutout over the Bulldogs. The Tigers scored in the first and then again in the final quarter and controlled much of the game in scoring their 2nd league win. Eddie Pea's 43-yard gallop in the first quarter set the stage for a 3 yard dive into the end zone by Jim Peavy for the first score of the game. Tony Snyder bounced through the Bulldog line for the 2 point conversion. Genesee battled back and was down on the Tiger two yard line with a 4th and goal to go situation when Tim Elchner, the big Tiger linebacker broke through the Genesee line to tackle the Bulldog ball carrier and forced the Bulldogs to give up the ball on downs. Jeff Lohman was also responsible for dulling several Genesee drives including the recovery of two fumbles forced from the GHS team. Rex Snyder, the Tiger quarterback found the range in the final period, passing to Joe Mathews who took the ball down the 4 yard line on a forty-yard galner. Lyle Deobald, who was the Tiger's leading rusher that evening, carried the ball across for the next score, and Ted Rossiter, getting more used to his fullback slot, bulled over the extra two points. Kendrick rolled up 253 yards of offense, running, for 190. Rex Snyder completed four of seven passes for 63 yards. Genesee managed only 11 yards on its 40 plays. Deary Here Friday The Deary Mustangs, who battered the Highland Huskies 26-6 last Friday, will be down on the Tiger field this Friday for the Homecoming game. Genesee will go up to Garfield Friday afternoon for a 3:00 p. m. game.



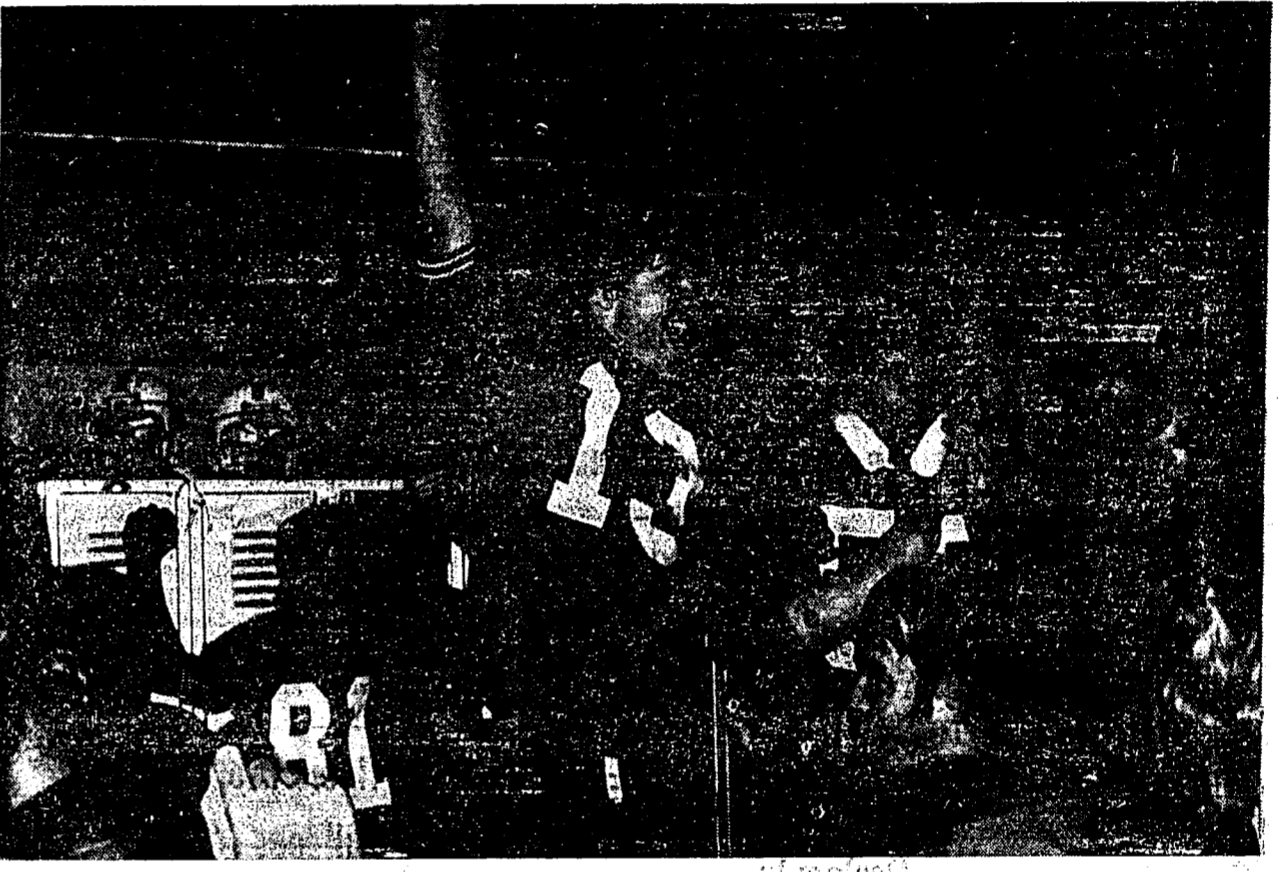


