

Your script is a game plan for how you'll act and talk. It helps keep the discussion on the right track. It can also keep you from attacking the other person, rather than simply explaining how you feel or think. Finally, the script helps you keep in charge of yourself in a situation.

Generally, a script has four parts. These are the four parts you go through in presenting your step-bystep case.

First, describe what bothers you as objectively as you can. Account only what you say and heard.

Next, say how you feel about this. In doing it, use "I". Instead of blaming others to saying, "You did. ." or "He said . ." say something like, "I felt I was taken advantage of when . ." This explains how you feel without pointing the finger at anyone.

Then tell exactly what change you want. Ask for some sort of agreement or compromise. Finally, list the steps to take that keep or don't keep the agreement. Don't threaten any-An example might be when you
