

A recreational district, under the Idaho Code, is organized for the uses and purposes of acquiring, providing, pools, picnic areas, camping facilities, etc., for the use of residents of the district. The first thought of people in this area must, most assuredly, be the continued use and improvement of the swimming pool. The recreation district is the best hope we have for maintaining the War Memorial Swimming Pool. But, the pool is only one of numerous possibilities open to the area under a recreational district.

More will be published on the recreational district in next week's Gazette, including taxation and cost.
