To simplify it's geographical area, the proposed Recreation District will follow the boundary lines of Joint School District No. 283. If you send What's It Going To Cost?

Regardless of how needed or how important a Recreation District Henson and family to her house for could be to Kendrick-Juliaetta and cake and ice cream. the area, it would not be proper to ask voters to approve its formation without knowing the cost. First, just creating the district will cost nothing. It is only when the directors are chosen, the needs of the district determined and the cost of meeting these needs estimated that costs appear in the picture. Under the Idaho Code, the board of directors of the Recreation District is empowered to levy a tax not exceeding three (3) mills in any one year on each dollar of assessed valuation upon taxable property within the district. This does not mean that the total three mills must be levied.

Assuming that if the issue is approved, the board of directors decides that just 1 mill could give the district enough income to meet the recreational needs. What would this mean in dollars per year to the home To Be Honored On 45th owner and the farmer? A mill in Latah County is 18 cents on each \$1,000 of assessed valuation. if a person in Juliaetta or Kendrick valued at \$100,000, the 1 mill levy Tammy and Brenda. would compute out to \$18.40 per year added to his tax bill.

These figures were confirmed by The Gazette Tuesday afternoon in a conversation with the Latah County Court House

We Could Save Some Money It might seem strange to say that by taxing ourselves we might save money, but consider this: there is an excellent possibility that if this area does not create its own Recreation District, it might be annexed into someone else's district. That dis- Early Day Resident trict might not have the same desires or goals we would have and would certainly not be as sympathetic to our taxpaying public. Another district might immediately levy the maximum 3 mills, where if we had our own district, directed by local people who are more aware of our own needs and desires, the 1 mill might be what we would pay.

In addition to being more aware of what the district might want to ents spend on recreation, a locally directed board would be in a far better position to determine what type of recreation is needed and how the money is to be spent and for what. Let's take the swimming pool for example, each year it is becoming more difficult to operate the pool and meet the ever-increasing costs and health requirements. There can be little doubt that a local board would place the swimming pool as a top-priority item and set aside a major portion of the district income for the pool. The money collected within our district would stay within the district. There would be little chance that local tax dollars might be funneled into, say, a golf course in Lewiston or Moscow.

There are some funds already available for recreational needs from county, State and even federal programs, but what is needed is a local body to qualify for the funds and direct and be responsible for administering them. Some of these funds might be outright grants and others on a matching funds basis, but a re-creational district would meet the

requirements for obtaining them.
In the final analysis, the voters of this area are being asked, once again, to reaffirm that they want to keep control of local affairs and determine what is best for our own people.
A "Yes" vote November 8th is the

answer.

In the event a registered elector is unable to vote in person at his designated polling place on the day of the election because of an emergency situation which rendered him physically unable, he may nevertheless apply for an absentee ballot on the day of election by notifying the city clerk. No person, may however be entitled to vote under an emergency situation unless the situation claimed rendered him physically unable to vote at his designated polling place within (48) hours prior to the closing of the polls.

Registration will close at 9:00 p m., on Sat., Nov. 5. Until then you may register at the office of the city clerk or at city hall during regular business hours. E. A. Deobald, 83, **Retired Kendrick Businessman Passes**

E. A. "Ed" Deobald, a lifelong resident of the Kendrick area and owner-operator of Deobald's Garage for over 50 years, died at 6:40 p. m. Thursday at Gritman Hospital in Moscow. He was 83.



He was born June 30, 1894 on a farm on American Ridge. He worked on the farm until 1917 when he left for one year to serve with the U.S. Army during World War I. He returned to Kendrick following his discharge and in December of 1919 he and the late Herman Schupfer rented a garage in the building now occu-pied by Braden's Dept. Store. Later they leased the space which now houses the Kendrick Theatre. Mr. Schupfer left the business after 21/2 years and in 1922 Ed moved into the garage the firm still operates.

On July 12, 1921 he married Anne Becker at Moscow. She survives at

the family home. He was a 50-year member and also a life-member of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, A. F. & A. M., a charter member of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Lions Club and a member of Kendrick Grange No. 413. Active in community affairs he was former Kendrick mayor and served on the

school board for a number of years. Survivors in addition to his widow include two daughters, Ann Keene of Kahlotus, Washington and Arlene Watts, Moscow; three sons Charles and John of Kendrick and Ted of Richland; two sisters, Mrs. Josephine Schupfer of Juliacita and Carrie Bechtol of Edmonds, Wash.; 20 grandchildren and six great grand-

children. The funeral was held Monday at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel with Steve Caskey, pastor of the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church officiating. Organist was Mrs. Dee Morton, and Donna Lohman and Ann Smith sang two vocal selections, "In the Garden," and "Beyond the Sun-

A Kind, Gentle Man If you lived in the Kendrick area within the past fifty years and owned a car, a truck or a piece of machinery, you probably owed Eddie Deobald a debt. . .a debt you couldn't pay back and a debt he never tried to collect. Maybe you had to call him out after hours to fill your gas tank, repair your car or stop what-ever else he was doing and make some emergency repairs on machin-

ery or equipment. Under Ed's operation, his garage and this man came to stand for accommodating service, hard work, fair prices and unquestioned integrity, both personal and professional. He earned a reputation as a master machinist and mechanic. thing broke down, people in Kendrick "took it to Ed," for they knew that if it could be repaired, Eddie could do it. There probably isn't a piece of machinery in the Kendrick Gazette that isn't operating with some parts either repaired or completely manufactured by that talented man. And it was how he served that made him so respected . . . never impatient, always kind, tolerant, and understanding. He could have probably been a wealthy, or at least a well-to-do man if he had charged for only a portion of the service and work he gave so freely away. But that wasn't Ed's way. I remember when I broke a piece on the Linotype machine, a part he welded so perfectly that it didn't even need adjustment when I put it back on the machine; I tried to pay him, but he just waved it away saying, "No, Bill, maybe you can do me a favor some day." He knew I could never repay that kind of help, and I knew it, too. None of us can repay Ed Deobald now. All we can do is remember him with love and respect. It hardly seems enough, -Bill

WHY DO WE NEED IT?

The Latah County Library District Headquarters in Moscow was built in 1906, for a population of about 3,000. Today it serves all 28,000 of us in Latah County. It is just too small.

HOW LONG HAVE WE NEEDED IT?

Too long. In 1962, the Moscow Public Library Board told us that better facilities were urgently needed. Remodeling, even at that time was deemed too expensive.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO THE OLD LIBRARY?

Our beloved old library is owned by the City of Moscow, and the City Council must decide what happens to it. Our Latah County Museum Society is very interested in using it for a County museum; a place for pictures, writings, and objects that belonged to our parents and grandparents. These can be shared by our children, and their children . . .

WHAT WILL IT LOOK LIKE?

We have a preliminary design that will be revised to fit the style and atmosphere of the community. We need to contact the Citizens Advisory Committee that has been appointed to get our suggestions. One of our county businesses, Bennett Lumber, has donated Idaho cedar for the exterior of the building.

WHAT WILL IT DO FOR US IN THE COUNTY?

The library in Moscow is our library too. It serves as a home base for our branch and bookmobile services. It provides resources not in our branch collections, interlibrary loan service, summer reading programs for our children(books-by-mail, sevices to county residents i nthe Latah County Jail, and direct service to us who visit Moscow. It provides reading sessions and in-house collections of materials at the Latah Convalescent Center as well as Paradise Villa; also an in-house collection of books at Johnson Manor in Juliaetta.

WHAT WILL IT COST?

We in the county will pay one-third (\$200,000), residents of Moscow two-thirds (\$400,000). In the county, on a \$40,000 home, the cost would be \$3.60 per year for twenty years. THAT IS LESS THAN 7c PER WEEK!

WHAT IF WE DON'T PASS THE LEVY?

Our need for a new library is great and will not go away. Waiting will cost us more, probably much more.

HOW DO WE GET OUR NEW LIBRARY!

County voters do not need to register to vote. We can vote at our district polling place. Rural Moscow residents can vote at the Moscow library.

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

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
