Louis Dedrick Scharnhorst, a lifelong resident of the Genesee area, passed away Saturday, November 5, in Clarkston, Washington. He had been a patient at Tri-State Convalescent Center since August. He was Death was attributed to pneu-



Louis, or Louie, as he was better known, was the son of Dedrick and Minnie Oldag Scharnhorst, and was born in the home his father built 5 miles west of Genesee. He was a grandson of Christian and Fredricka Scharnhorst, who immigrated from Germany to Sigourney, Iowa, in 1844. The elder Scharnhorsts and their family crossed the plains with mule teams and covered wagons, settling in the Willamette Valley in 1872 for two years. In 1874, they came to Genesee where Christian homesteaded and was among the earliest settlers of this area. Louie, as a young boy, attended Genesee Public Schools, worked for his father, Dedrick and other area farmers. He was known throughout his life

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
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
