Louis D. Scharnhorst, Retired Genesee Farmer, Passes at 82

Louis Dedrick Scharnhorst, a lifelong resident of the Genesee area, passed away Saturday, November 5, in Clarkston, Washington. He had been a patient at Tri-State Convalescent Center since August. He was 82. Death was attributed to pneumonia and the infirmities of age.



Louis, or Louie, as he was better known, was the son of Dedrick and Minnie Oldag Scharnhorst, and was born in the home his father built 5 miles west of Genesee. He was a grandson of Christian and Fredricka Scharnhorst, who immigrated from Germany to Sigourney, Iowa, in 1844. The elder Scharnhorsts and their family crossed the plains with mule teams and covered wagons, settling in the Willamette Valley in 1872 for two years. In 1874, they came to Genesee where Christian homesteaded and was among the earliest settlers of this area. Louie, as a young boy, attended Genesee Public Schools, worked for his father, Dedrick and other area farmers. He was known throughout his life for his amazing physical strength, dry wit, and humorous stories.

He married Mary J. Sprenger at the Thorn Creek Catholic Church on November 20, 1917 and she survives at the family home. The Scharnhorsts farmed all their married lives, moving back in 1926 to the home and farm where he was born. They spent several winters in town but until Louie went to the Convalescent Center, lived primarily on the farm. Ill health forced his retirement a few years ago and his eldest son John continues the farming operation.

Louis was a clever blacksmith, carpenter and mechanic. He loved sports and as a young man pitched many a winning baseball game for Genesee's town team. He was a great competitor all of his life, whether it was pool, boxing or riding bulls and bucking broncs in the old Genesee stock shows. An avid hunter and fisherman, he accompanied his own father and later his sons and grandsons to the mountains, lakes and rivers. He was a trapshooter of note and won many prizes. The Scharnhorsts celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1967 and would have been married 60 years on November 20.

Although he suffered much pain in the last years of his life, he kept his sense of humor. Louis was a communicant of St. Mary's Catholic Church, Genesee. He is survived by his devoted wife, Mary at the family home; three sons, John C., Lewiston; Robert J., East Sound, Wn.; Donald F. (Dick), Genesee; four daughters, Lorena Carmage, Forks, Wn.; Anita Babich, Zillah, Wn.; Teresa DeLore, Imperial Beach, Ca.; and Betty Fuller, Clarkston; 32 grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren, and two sisters, Hattie Koster, Genesee, and Emma Carver, Lewiston.

The family has suggested memorials may be made to the Genesee Ambulance Fund or the charity of the donor's choice. The rosary service was held Tuesday at 7:30 at St. Mary's church. The Requiem Mass was celebrated Wednesday at 10:30 at St. Mary's. Rev. Fr. Edward T. Cope was officiant. Altar boys were Jeff and Matt Becker. Mrs. Wilson Esser was organist, and vocal selections, "Ave Maria," and "The Rosary" were sung by Mrs. Glen Baumgartner.

was and their physical strength and courage, Louie had few equals. His strength was almost legendary and the stories of some of his feats are still told and re-told; like the time he bet he could carry five sacks of wheat . . . and he did, so the story goes: one under each arm, one in each hand and one in his teeth. He was an outstanding athlete and a mainstay of the Genesee town baseball team for many years. He was also a well-known local boxer and the best stories were about the battles that didn't happen in the ring, one friend remembers when Louie was playing pool in Troy and a big Swede decided he wanted to play on the table Louie was using . . . Louie hit him once and it took 15 minutes to bring the fellow around. These aren't stories that are disrespectful to his memory, but to remember him and the world he lived in . . . a world that produced his kind of man.

He had a deep, abiding love of the land and was one of the most avid sportsmen in the area. He hunted, fished, and during off-season was a skillful trap shooter. I never came to know him until he was past his prime, a remark I would never have made to his face. I remember him at the Gun Club, crippled by old age, still shooting pretty darn good, and cursing under his breath at every missed bird . . . never making excuses, except in a joking manner the way trap shooters do.

And as he did grow older, his powerful body and gallant heart and spirit were tested to the utmost as he spent his last few years in great pain and torment. Enough agony that would have broken a lesser man, but that his great heart was filled with courage, strength and determination and he fought on until one who is wiser and stronger called him Home. And, his big heart held love and tenderness, too. And this I'll always remember about Louie: one evening, maybe 20 years ago, I was going up the street in Genesee. It was winter and I saw Louie talking to someone outside the Genesee Motors. As I almost got to them, one of Dick's boys, I can't remember whether it was Jim, Bob or Bruce came running by. Louie saw him, too; flashed out his big arm and said, "come here, dammit." The little grandson stopped in his tracks and looked up and then Louie said, "Kiss your Grandpaw," and then he bent down and the boy stretched up and kissed him. Louie straightened up, smiled that crooked grin of his, said "Okay" and gave the youngster a pat on the back that sent him about three feet down the street. That was Louie Scharnhorst, too.

In years to come, Genesee people will talk about good men, and when they do, they'll bring up the name of Louie Scharnhorst; they'd better . . . he was one of the best. —Bill

Election Results—

Wayne Harris Kendrick Mayor

Wayne Harris, owner and manager of Fleming Truck and Equipment Co., was elected to a four-year term as mayor of Kendrick Tuesday afternoon. Harris, already a member of the City Council, polled 75 votes. Donald (Bud) Elchner also seeking the office of mayor received 44 votes.

In the four-way race for the two council seats, Richard Benjamin and Roger Courtwright won seats on the council. Courtwright received 94 votes and Benjamin 88. David Klatt polled 42 votes and Brad Millard 9 votes.

The newly-elected council members and mayor will take office the first meeting in January. Harris will take the place of outgoing mayor Robert Watts. Courtwright and Benjamin will hold the positions being vacated

by Darrel Broeke and Don Millard. Favor New Reservoir

In the results of an opinion ballot asked by the City of Kendrick concerning the possible construction of new water reservoir facilities, 94 voters favored such a project while only 22 voted against it.

Recreation District Approved Kendrick area voters, both city and rural, overwhelmingly favored the creation of a recreation district. (See separate story).

Library Vote Kendrick area was slightly in favor of the construction of a new Moscow-Latah County Library, but not by the required two-thirds margin. There were 101 Yes votes and 76 No votes.

Juliaetta Elects Woods Mayor

Woods Returned as Juliaetta Mayor Clark Woods was elected to a four-year term as mayor of Juliaetta Tuesday. Woods was named mayor by the council earlier this year after the resignation of Paul Gravello.

Also elected to the Juliaetta council, without opposition, were Bruce Sherman and William Turner. Woods received 128 votes; Sherman 118, and Turner 132.

Yes To Recreation Dist. Juliaetta voters also strongly en-

dorsed the creation of a proposed recreation district. There were 150 Yes votes on this proposition while only 28 No votes were cast. There was one void ballot.

On the library issue, 88 in Juliaetta favored the library while 87 opposed it; far short of the required margin.

There were 183 qualified voters in Juliaetta Tuesday and 137 of these turned out to vote.

Sorensen Returned as Genesee Mayor

Incumbent Genesee Mayor Lawrence Sorensen was returned to office for another four years after Genesee voters went to the polls Tuesday. Sorensen received 117 votes and was unopposed on the ballot. Former mayor D. F. Scharnhorst received 4 write-in votes. Don Springer received 2 and Willis Moser, 3 write-in votes.

In the five-way contest for two vacant council seats, incumbent councilman Stan Merrill received a strong vote of confidence, out-polling all other nominees and being returned for another term with 101

votes. George Wilson was elected as the other new councilman in Genesee as he received 62 votes.

Other contestants were Chas. Pratt, who polled 51 votes; Willard Hansen with 45 votes and James Smith with 37.

Holover councilmen this year are Walt Moden and Len Singhose.

No To Library Sorensen said a resounding No to the new county library; there were 141 voters opposed to the issue and only 99 in favor of it.

Juliaetta, Kendrick Area Voters Approve Formation of Recreational District

Residents of the area went to the polls Tuesday and voiced their overwhelming support for the creation of a Recreation District in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area. This vote will now pave the way for the organization of such a district which will give this area control over its recreational priorities in the years to come. The group urging the forming of such a district were hoping for favorable response, but were almost speechless at the results of the election Tuesday afternoon.

Voters in NezPerce county favored the District with 61 Yes votes and only 7 No ballots.

Latah County voters in the Kendrick area gave the issue a 181 to 25 Yes vote.

Juliaetta's Latah County voters marked 150 yes votes and 28 no votes for a combined total of 392 in favor

of the district and only 60 opposed to it.

The results of this election may now be taken before the County Commissioners. The county commissioners will then declare such a district organized and will divide the district into three sub-districts, as nearly equal in population as possible, to be known as director's sub-district 1, 2 and 3. Because the district contains portions of both Nez Perce and Latah County, the commissioners of each of these counties must work together in setting boundaries.

The first board of directors for the recreational district will be appointed by the Governor of the State. After that the directors will be elected. The Governor's appointments will undoubtedly be influenced by recommendations from this area.

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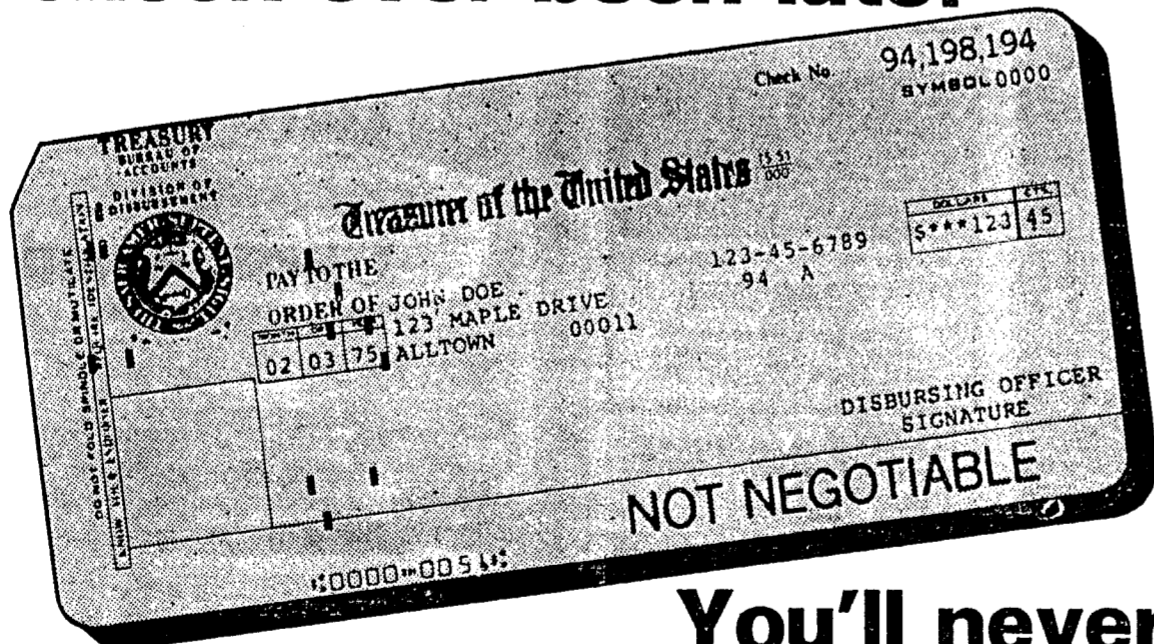

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### Local Co-Co Shares in \$6.3 Million Stock Retirement

CENEX is one of the nation's leading farm supply cooperatives and serves as a regional supplier of agricultural and home products for the local co-op.

Genesee Union Warehouse Company, Genesee, Idaho recently received a cash payment (\$354,000) during a meeting sponsored by CENEX, its regional supplier of agricultural and home products. The co-ops check represents its share of a \$6.3 million in patronage stock being retired by CENEX this fall. CENEX retired \$7 million of stock in June 1977 as well.

The cash payment was announced by William O. Haxton, president of the co-op's board of directors. "This

check stands as a reminder that in a cooperative the savings are returned to the people, its member-owners," he said.

CENEX is one of the nation's leading farm supply cooperatives serving over 1400 cooperatives throughout 13 states. Through membership of their local co-op, farm families share in the ownership of basic production facilities such as CF Industries, one of the largest chemical fertilizer producers in North America, and several large petroleum refineries.

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### Wages, Salaries Rise, but Farm Income Will Suffer Decline Says Newsletter

Idaho's wages and salaries are projected to rise nearly 13 percent in 1977, but net farm income will suffer its third consecutive annual decline, according to the First Security News Letter released this week said James Hoogland, Jr., manager, Kendrick, and Orrin S. Merrill, manager, Genesee.

Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist is editor of the News Letter.

Nationally, the outlook for the economy over the next six to nine months appears generally sound. Almost no evidence currently available suggests a recessionary economy in 1978.

Personal income in Idaho is forecast to reach \$5,245 million, a 12% increase over 1976. After adjustment for inflation real personal income will have increased approximately 5.5% in 1977.

The contribution of agriculture to Idaho's total income continued to decline from previous years. In contrast, income generated from manufacturing and construction has increased consistently over the past 3 years; mining income has remained generally stable during the same period.

Drought and depressed crop prices sharply lowered 1977 production totals for many Idaho crops. Wheat production was down 2%, barley down 7 percent, sugar down 27 percent and dry beans down 17 percent. The forecast is that potato production will increase two percent over the record output in 1976. Per capita potato consumption declined six pounds in 1976, however.

Prices for potatoes, wheat and beef are expected to increase slightly during the 1977-78 winter months. However, the substantial worldwide supply of wheat will prevent any significant improvement in the price of that commodity.

The September rise in Idaho's unemployment rate to 7 percent reflects abnormal seasonal patterns in the food processing industry but that state unemployment rate is expected to decline in the fourth quarter.

Fourth quarter business activity in Idaho is expected to remain favorable. Residential construction has yet to slow, and new dwelling unit permits reached a record high in September. Spending for non-residential construction is 35 percent ahead of last year.

Idaho lumber production should remain strong in the fourth quarter. Regionally, there has been a decline in new orders resulting in a 15 percent reduction in cash lumber prices during September and October.

Retail sales in the fourth quarter are expected to exceed last year's totals by 14 percent. A strong 4th quarter sales climate for 1978 model automobiles is expected.

While important economic indicators—retail sales, industrial production and unemployment—were sluggish nationwide in the third quarter of 1977, they are read as a transition to a slower growth rate, rather than percentage points higher than earlier rate of inflation continues near six percent, a pace which will probably be maintained during the first half

In the third quarter, short-term interest rates rose generally one percentage point and are now nearly 2 signs of impending recession. The short-term interest rates were below the average inflation rate. The tremendous expansion of credit, shift of funds from short-to-long-term investments, and rising demand for money are basic factors causing the upward trend in interest rates.

The Index of Leading Indicators for the United States, designed to predict trends in the overall economy, rose in August following a three month period of weakness. The index correctly identified a slowing economy, but the renewed strength in August was a positive factor.

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
