

Kendrick Council **Proposes Sale of** West End Property

It was learned this week the Kendrick City Council has approved an ordinance proposing the sale of approximately 2½ acres of land in the West end of the city. The land involved in the proposed sale includes the site which once was used as a riding arena by a local saddle club. Since the club gave up its lease the area has not been used except for an occasional childrens ball game.

The law provides that when the city owned property is not used for a public purpose, the city may, if there are no objections, sell the land. However, the law also sets strict conditions on the sale.
