#### WHEN TO SEE THE DOCTOR

All of us are now and then faced with a quick decision should we, or shouldn't we see the doctor?

The American Medical Association lists several points for consideration as a general guide to help you decide whether medical aid should be sought at once.

\* When your complaint or symptoms are too severe to be endured, such as abdominal pain common to a gall bladder attack or appendicitis or kidney colic, or sudden chest pains. Immediate relief of pain is the purpose of getting the patient to the doctor without delay.

\* When an apparently minor symptom persists for more than a few days or a week, and does not appear to be due to some easily identified cause. A nose bleed from a sharp blow is one thing; a nose that bleeds constantly or frequently for no apparent reason is quite a different matter.

\* When the symptom returns repeatedly for no readily apparent cause. Digestive disturbances due to overindulgence are one thing; constant digestive distress despite great care and moderation in eating is another.

\* When in doubt, it is safer to call the doctor than to take a chance. Many accidents around the house or yard cause bruises and scratches and minor sprains that can be successful treated at home. But some accidents require fast medical attention.

If the accident victim is unconscious, get help fast. Also when bleeding is severe or cannot be controlled; when the victim is groggy or confused; when there are signs of shock, such as pale, cold skin, sweating and weak pulse.

Breathlessness or intensive thirst after the accident require medical attention. If there is a possible broken bone, seek help. Also for severe, pain, signs of poisoning, serious burns, persistent vomiting blurred vision.

#### EXERCISE

Your doctor recognizes the importance of exercise to health.

The American Medical Association points out that exercise, or lack of it, is often a significant factor in the control of obesity, diabetes, heart and circulatory problems, orthopedic problems and emotional disorders.

Fitness developed through vigorous activity and exercise can be preventive, as well as therapeutic, in nature.

In a positive sense, health includes abundant energy and vitality. A healthy person is physically fit when he can perform his daily work and tasks without undue fatigue, maintain adequate reserves of energy to enjoy recreational activities and leisure, and meet the challenge of unexpected demands. These might be running to catch a train, quickly climbing several flights of stairs, shoveling snow, or jacking up the car to change a tire.

Can you go up several flights of stairs without severe discomfort, chest pain, or having to stop before you reach the top? You would expect to be puffing a little at the top, but this should subside in a few minutes if you are reasonably fit.

The best exercise is doing something physically active which you enjoy, with the exercise aspect secondary. If you enjoy swimming or tennis, or handball, these are excellent sports for exercising most of the body. Golf is good for the tired businessman. Most of us find it difficult to exert the mental discipline to keep at a program of daily calisthenics purely for the sake of exer-

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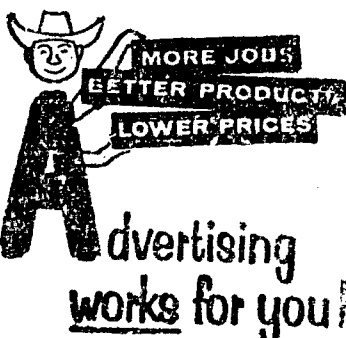
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### DANDRUFF

The most common scalp disorder among Americans is dandruff, notes the Idaho Medical Association.

The causes of dandruff remain unknown. Some evidence points to infection as a cause, but definite proof is still lacking.

One thing is known—true dandruff is almost always accompanied by overactivity of oil glands in the scalp. In acute cases of dandruff, the typical white dandruff scales are very greasy and the scalp becomes red and sore.

Extreme itchingness of the scalp also may accompany dandruff. Do not scratch with your fingernails, as this will deposit bacteria on the scalp and may complicate the problem even more.

Simple cases of dandruff can some time be controlled by washing the hair at frequent intervals.

Advanced cases may be irritated by soap and water, and should be treated by a doctor.

But too often this does not happen. This is one of the early disappointments in love.

Or the adolescent meets a girl who seems beautiful and desirable. Sure-

ly she will approve and accept him. But she is aloof, critical, distant, unaffectionate, inhibited and complex in mood. So he sets his sights on marriage. Here, he is sure he will find love and acceptance—everyone says so!

The church, the books, the movies, his parents tell him that in marriage, his dream for love will at last come true. Here, in an atmosphere of intimacy and relaxation, mutual acceptance and approval will at last prevail! But does it? All too often not. Why?

Because most human beings can only think of wanting love. They are not experienced in giving it. When a girl marries, she wants her husband to give a large amount of his thought to her happiness. But he gets busy and forgets or he assumes that since she is not actually complaining, she must be satisfied.

In any case, he fails, periodically to think something like this: "Are you satisfied, are you happy, are you living your life the way you want to? 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### Listening For Understanding Means Watching Actions, Too

All of us, whether we are young or old, want someone to understand us. And understanding is necessary for our life and growth. But many times what people say or what they mean are not the same. They can't say what they mean, so, careful listening is a must for understanding.

But, we have to listen to what is not said as well. We need to listen with our eyes. Often people's actions show us what they can't say.

A grandmother remembers an incident where this happened. She was at granddaughter's first birthday party. Jenni, the baby's 4-year-old sister, was jealous. She saw her younger sister surrounded by cousins and grandparents. The baby had just ripped open a pile of prettily-wrapped boxes. Now she had all kinds of new toys, as well as all the attention. Jenni felt left out, but she didn't know how to express her feelings.

Soon the grandmother noticed Jenni had crept up to her side. Wistfully, Jenni rubbed her face against her grandmother's knee. She whispered—"I'm still four."

Grandmother didn't miss the point. She swept Jenni tenderly into her arms. "Oh huh," she said, "and we've had four long years to learn to love you very much."

Jenni expressed her needs by her actions. Happily her grandmother could read her behavior. But listening to understand is not easy. Too often a cry for attention, like Jenni's is lost.
