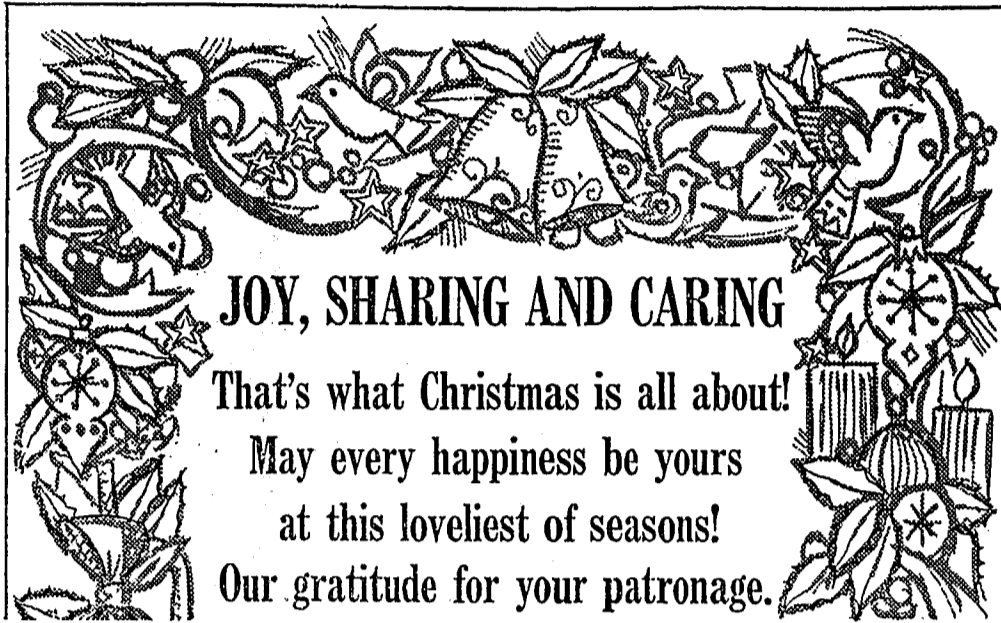

No Magic Cure for Acne, Though Some Things Help

There is no magic cure for acne, but something can be done about it, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

Acne is a very common condition afflicting the skin of most people during the teen years. Waiting to outgrow it can be a serious mistake.

Acne consists of blackheads, pimples, and sometimes deeper, boil-like blemishes. It can be disfiguring. The blemishes can lead to serious and permanent scarring.

Acne is caused by a faulty adjustment of parts of the skin to the influence of maturing endocrine glands, the glands which produce hormones. The imbalance in the hormone accretions will correct itself in time.

Acne is not a disease of dirt, even though patients are told to wash thoroughly and frequently. Washing removes oil and clears plugged oil glands, keeping blackheads to a minimum. Certain foods may be a factor, but a change in diet alone will not clear up acne.

Thorough cleansing, possibly a diet prescribed by your doctor, and medical attention all are needed to cope with acne. Treatment is individual. The patient should not assume that medicine prescribed for a friend will not serve for him.

Your physician likely will warn against picking, scratching, popping and squeezing of pimples. Sometimes small doses of antibiotics or other drug may help. In other cases ultraviolet light may be administered. A family physician or dermatologist—skin specialist—can determine specific needs.

Color Blindness
 Some degree of color blindness is not unusual, however, total color blindness—when the person sees everything in various shades of gray, is comparatively rare, observes the Idaho Medical Association.

A number of hereditary conditions may cause individual differences in color vision, and the inability to distinguish between various colors can be caused by disease or injury of the retina, the optic nerve or the conduction paths of the eye to the brain. The most common type of color blindness is that in which the individual has difficulty in distinguishing red from green but can still see blue and yellow. Rarer types involve other pairs of colors.

Red-green color blindness appears more frequently among men than among women. Although only one girl in 100 will be color blind, the disability will appear in one out of every 10 to 12 boys. It is rarely transmitted from father to son. More commonly, it is transmitted

The air is so bright and clear here that one has to wear sunglasses.

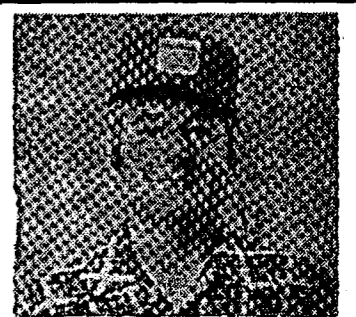

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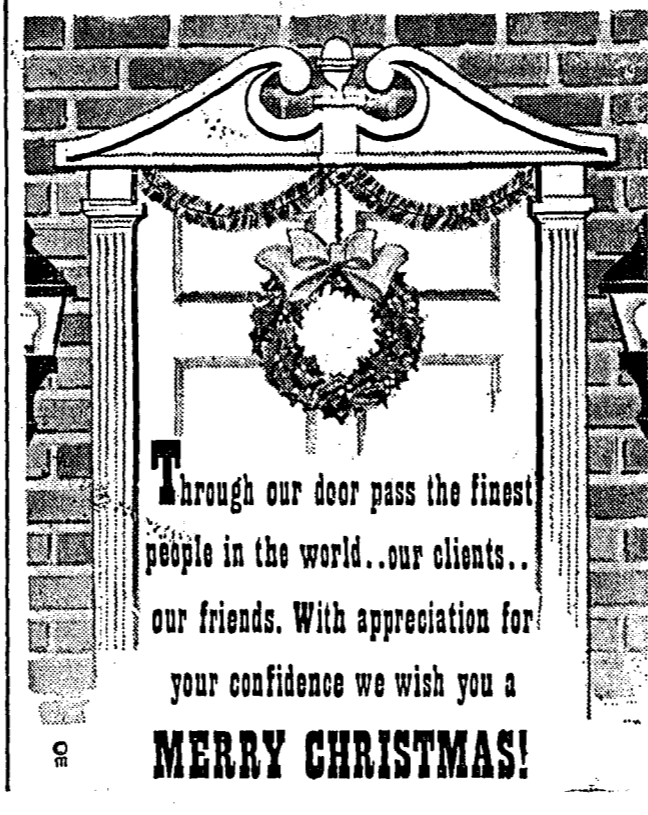
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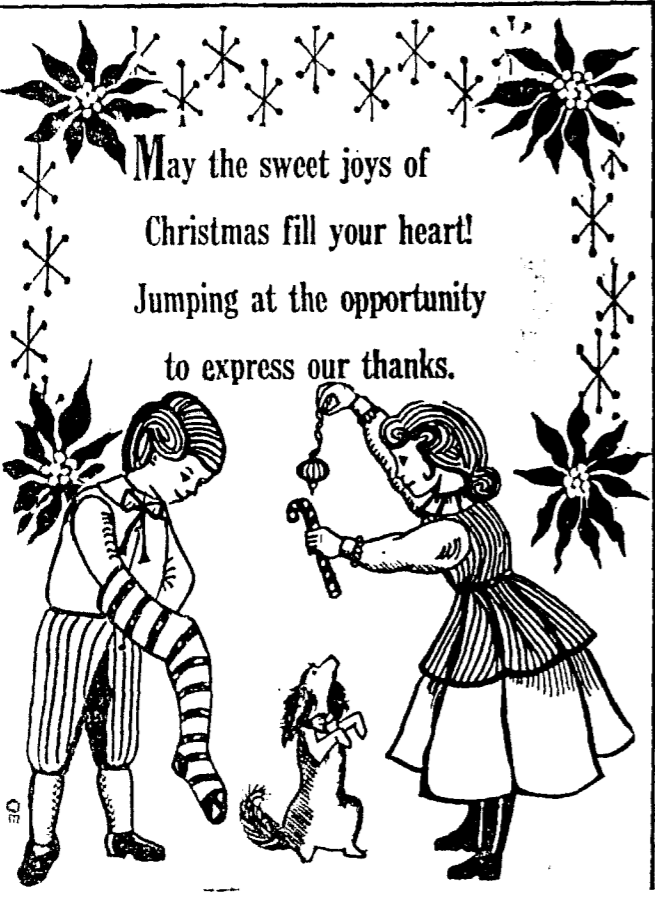

LEAD POISONING

Lead poisoning is a menace to small children especially if they live in older homes where plaster or paint may be scaling, cautions the Idaho Medical Association.

Most paints used on house interiors today do not contain lead, however, flakes of old paint may contain enough lead to cause trouble.

Youngsters should not be allowed to chew on plaster, window-sills or painted doors—all possible sources of lead poisoning.

Avoid using lead-based paints inside the house. Labels on cans should tell you if the paint contains lead.

Most toy makers have stopped making lead toys, but if there are lead toys in the house, they should be kept out of reach of small children.

Lead poisoning can lead to serious illness, mental retardation and death. If you suspect a child may have eaten some substance containing lead, contact your physician immediately.

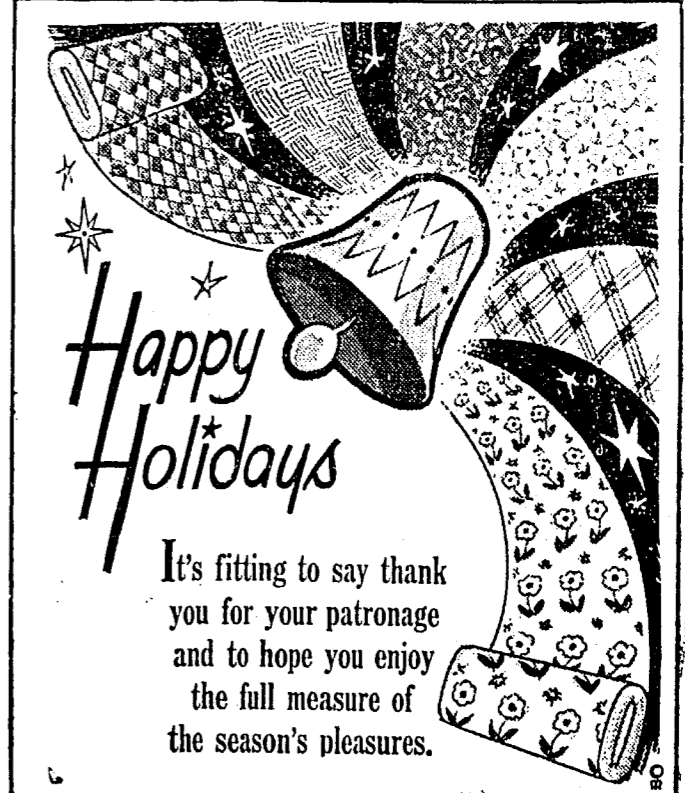

Winter Driving Tip Told

Winter often catches people unprepared. This may be especially true during holiday travel.

"Extra care, planning and preparation will help you avoid many inconveniences and get you to your destination safely," says Thomas J. Karsky, UI extension farm safety specialist. "When traveling, there are several points to keep in mind."

Prepare your vehicle for winter driving. Make sure it is winterized and has dependable tires and battery. The lights, wipers and defroster should be in good working condition, and the fuel tank always should be more than half full.

Antifreeze protection must be sufficient for the lowest temperature expected in the area of your travels. Use a single or multi-weight winter grade oil.

"When buying snow tires, don't mix conventional tires with radials as this may adversely affect handling," Karsky cautioned. "To start a battery in extremely cold weather, install a battery with a cold crank amp rating equal to or greater than the size of your engine in cubic inches." Keeping your fuel tank more than half full will prevent vapor from forming in the tank which can cause gas line freeze up in extremely cold weather. It also can assure ample fuel for heat if the car becomes stalled.

Carry extra gasoline only in an extreme emergency," Karsky stressed. "If you must carry gasoline, use a heavy metal can, fill it no more than three-fourths full and tightly cap it. Escaping gasoline fumes in your car's trunk could explode with the force of several sticks of dynamite."

Adjust your speed and drive accordingly to road conditions. The posted speed limit may not be safe under icy or snowy conditions.

Know your vehicle and drive accordingly. Allow extra room for stopping; calmly pumping the brakes in an emergency will stop you quicker. When starting on slippery surfaces, gradual acceleration will get you going easier than "flooding" the accelerator.

"Remember, if skidding, turn the wheel in the direction of the skid even when the vehicle is headed off the road," the UI safety specialist said. "Let up on the accelerator. Do not use the brakes as this may cause loss of control."

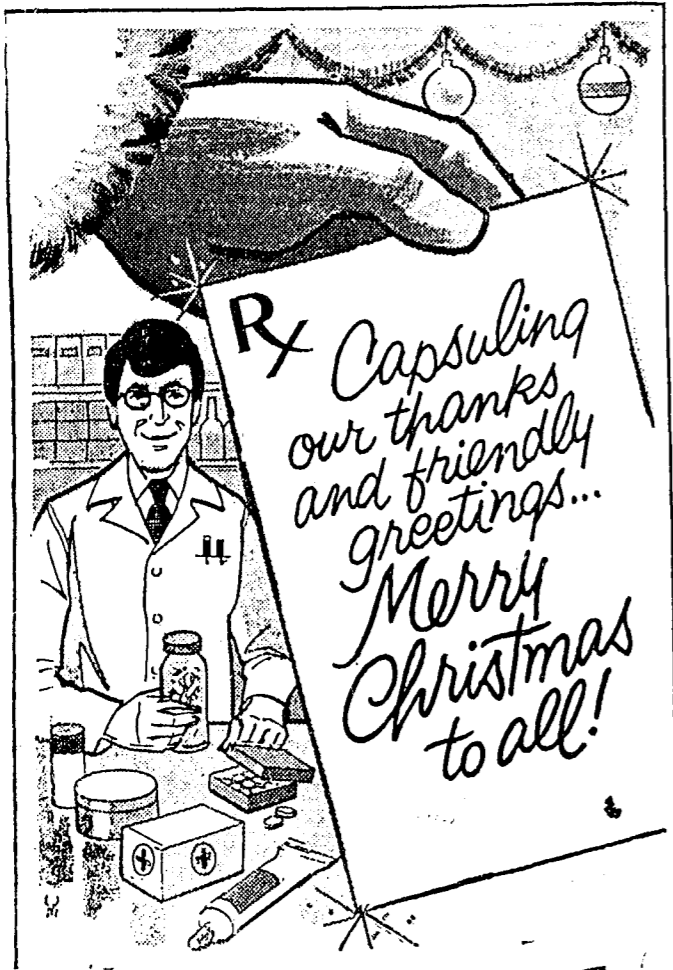
When your travels take you thru open country, take extra precautions and "know before you go." Listen to weather reports, check local sources

that give road reports, and, if not sure of safety, check with the highway patrol.

"To keep up-to-date on road conditions as you travel, use your citizens' band (CB) radio or stop at a service station or truck stop," Karsky suggested. "They may be able to relay information from other travelers."

If you have to travel in bad weather, try to travel with other vehicles. You may be able to help each other out. Keep in touch with home when you're on the road in adverse weather.

"It's advisable to carry a 'survival kit' in your car in case you get stranded," Karsky said. "Remember it's too late to think about winter preparation when you're stalled, stuck or perhaps stranded."

Battle Against Air Pollution Needs Help of All

The problem of air pollution is much in the news in the 1970s.

For people who live in metropolitan areas—which now means most of us—air pollution becomes more apparent all the time. Cleanup efforts have made some progress, but the city air still is loaded with unpleasant and unhealthy particles.

The American Medical Association points out that there's little doubt that pollutants in the air aren't good for us. Just how serious a health problem is air pollution is a question still being studied. It has been associated with a number of physical ills.

We read about air pollution, but it seldom occurs to us that we can do something about it. Isn't air pollution merely a matter for the factory with the belching smokestack, or the apartment building with a smoky incinerator?

Actually, there are some things we all can do to reduce air pollution. If everyone who operates an automobile would just make certain the engine is properly tuned and adjusted, a major source of air pollution would be considerably reduced. This will not only reduce air pollution it will also save money on gasoline.

Community groups could make it a point to know air pollution sources and seek from elected representatives legislation to control the hazards. Or enforcement of laws already on the books.

Keep the home furnace in good working order. Have it checked annually, both for your safety and for the sake of the community.

Leaves, trash and rubbish should not be burned in metropolitan areas. Arrange for them to be hauled away.

Prevention of air pollution is a matter that must be met by the whole community. Proper laws are required where voluntary actions are inadequate. Tight enforcement of these laws is essential.

We can anticipate that air pollution will continue to be much in the news in the years ahead. The problem will be alleviated much sooner if all of us become aware that it is serious and all of us are involved in its ultimate solution.

HANDICAPPED ADULTS

Does someone in your household have a physical handicap?

The American Medical Association points out that it is understandable and quite normal that you should wish to "do for" the disabled member of your family, but it may be more helpful to allow him to do for himself.

To make sure you are really being helpful, it is wise to consult with the patient's physician and have him outline the patient's real capabilities and limitations. It is possible that the patient is not interested in minimizing his physical problems. Real psychological problems are best handled with the advice of a physician, but there are several factors that illustrate the type of problems that may be encountered in living in a household with a handicapped person.

The dependent nature of some people, which their disability tends to accentuate.

The lack of intellectual ability or education background.

Just plain laziness.

The need to let others do the work after having spent a lifetime of "doing for others." The parents feel the children should take care of them.

The aesthetic type who may object to equipment or certain techniques (such as use of mouthstick, wearing of splints) because they are not cosmetics or graceful in use.

The false expectation of complete recovery so that devices aren't seen as necessary.

Once you know what can be realistically expected of the handicapped

Family Affair—

Child Needn't Suffer In One-Parent Family

A child with only one parent living at home can develop normally. Family breakup is not the overwhelming thing in a child's life as many have thought.

Children can be hurt by a parent's absence. That's true whether the parent died or moved out of the home. But children are often able to be mentally whole again in a short time.

Knowing that should help and comfort a single parent, but it may also help to remember that any

parent, at times, feels inadequate about his or her child.

There is a special worry, though, for single parents. They wonder if they can raise boys who are happy to be boys, and girls happy to be girls.

A single parent can never be both mother and father. But she or he can provide models of the opposite sex. As a father, that means making sure your child, boy or girl, spends time with and gets to know the kinds of women you want your child to like or admire. As a mother, that means getting your boy or girl to know men you want him or her to like or dislike.

Children need sex-role models, people to pattern after. The models show

children how to become adult men or women. A boy without a father can develop an esteem about himself as a male if, from men he knows, he can create what is lacking. In different ways, he copies his uncle, grandfathers, older brothers, neighbors, teachers, any older male. A girl does the same with women if she has no mother living with her.

Besides knowing and spending time with either men or women, children need more. They need to see good male-female relationships. That is, they need to know how men and women get together as friends or marriage partners.

The single parent is not helpless. The child can develop a happy feeling about his or her sex if given

CARBON MONOXIDE

A silent killer may be loose in your house.

The criminal is carbon monoxide—CO—a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas produced every time a carbon-containing material burns.

The American Medical Association points out that CO combines with blood 200 times more easily than oxygen. If you breathe air containing a normal amount of oxygen and a moderate amount of carbon monoxide, your blood will be starved for oxygen. When blood cannot supply oxygen to your brain, permanent

brain damage or death may result. Dangerous quantities of CO accumulate when a cool, slow fire burns in limited air space. Since you can't see, smell, or taste it, the gas is hard to detect except by your symptoms—drowsiness, headache, tightness across the forehead, confusion, nausea and muscular weakness. CO poisoning may confuse you so that you cannot reach fresh air to relieve the symptoms and prevent serious injury.

until you are certain the fire is entirely burned out.

Be sure your garage is sealed from the house. Never run the car in a closed garage.

To prevent a carbon monoxide attack in your home—

- * Have all heating systems checked annually for operating efficiency. Make sure that vents, pipes, flues, and chimneys are tight.
- * Make sure your heating plant is not starved for air.
- * Be sure that all heating devices designed for venting are properly vented to the outside.
- * Provide additional fresh air for charcoal grills and hibachis used indoors. Better still, don't use these charcoal cookers indoors.
- * When changing types of fuel, ask a qualified serviceman to adjust all appliances involved.
- Don't close your fireplace damper
