





Color Blindness

Some degree of color blindness is not unusual, however, total color blindness-when the person sees everything in various shades of gray, is comparatively rare, observes the Idaho Medical Associatoion.

A number of hereditary conditions may cause individual differences in color vision, and the inability to distinguish between various colors can be caused by disease or injury of the retina, the optic nerve or the conduction paths of the eye to the brain. The most common type of color blindness is that in which the individual has difficulty in distinguishing red from green but can still see blue and yellow. Rarer types involve other pairs of colors.

Red-green color blindness appears more frequently among men than among women. Although only one girl in 100 will be color blind, the disability will appear in one out of every 10 to 12 boys. It is rarely transmiteted from father to son. More commonly, it is transmitted ``

poisoning is a menace to Lead small children especially if they live in older homes where plaster or paint may be scaling, cautions the Idaho Medical Association.

Most paints used on house interiors today do not contain lead, however, flakes of old paint may contain enough lead to cause trouble.

Youngsters should not be allowed to chew on plaster, window-sills or painted doors—all possible sources

Avoid using lead-based paints inside the house. Labels on cans should tell you if the paint contains lead. Most toymakers have stopped ma king lead toys, but if there are lead toys in the house, they should be kept

out of reach of small children. Lead poisoning can lead to serious illness, mental retardation and death. If you suspect a child may have eaten some substance containing lead contact your physician immediately
