

**WATERFOWL SEASON CLOSING**

The waterfowl season will be coming to an end with duck hunting closing January 8, both in the Panhandle and southern Idaho, according to the Department of Fish and Game. Duck hunting closes New Year's Day in North Central and parts eastern Idaho.

Goose hunting, which closed Dec. 18 in virtually all of the lower half of Idaho will remain open until Jan. 1 for the northern half of the state. Pheasant hunting, along with sage and sharp-tailed grouse hunting, is closed, but in most of the state it is still open on huns, chukars and quail. Many areas will be open for their taking until December 31, and parts of north central Idaho will remain open until January 15. The 1977 Idaho Upland Game Regulations contain more specific information.

Dear Editor:

This is an open letter to your reading audience.

Driving a motor vehicle after drinking alcoholic beverages has become a commonplace challenge accepted by a large percentage of Idaho's driving population.

Drinking-drivers who lose at the drinking-driving game of chance are verified through required blood alcohol tests on all adult traffic fatality victims in the State. Certified blood alcohol concentration (BAC) test results conducted thus far in 1977, indicate that at least one out of every five people dying in an Idaho traffic accident has had an average BAC of 15 percent. During 1976, there were 6,063 BAC tests performed on non-fatal vehicle drivers in Idaho. The average BAC was 16 percent. The BAC level which a person in Idaho is legally presumed to be "Under the Influence" is 8 percent. When all BAC tests have been completed for the year, the 15 percent BAC, for drinking-driver fatalities will undoubtedly be higher.

Unfortunately, alcohol tests cannot be conducted on those drivers who are not involved in a traffic crash or those who go unapprehended. Consider that, if each driver who had been drinking was required to place a sign on the front and rear of his or her vehicle to notify other drivers and pedestrians or his or her presence in the traffic flow, what a revelation that could be!

It is factually clear that not all drivers accept the responsibility for their life or that of others. We in highway safety realized that driving and drinking is dangerous. Alcohol lessens our ability to reason; reduces our inhibitions and increases risk taken; weakens our neuromuscular control; affects our vision, and slows down our reaction time.

After considering the facts, if you have any doubt about your driving condition, don't drive! Be able to be part of the holiday spirit next year, too! I don't want to read an officer's motor vehicle accident fatality report with your name on it!

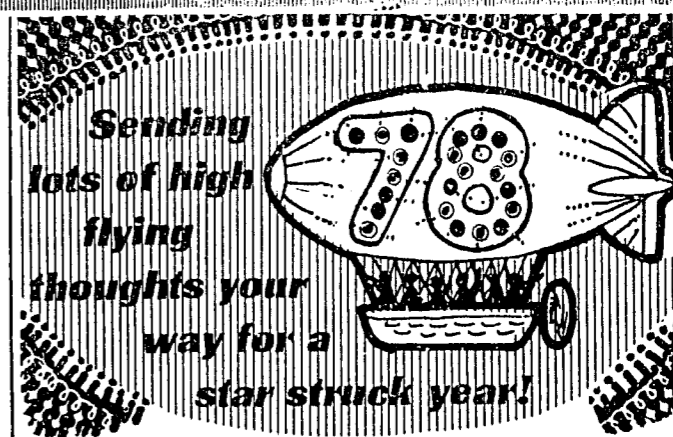



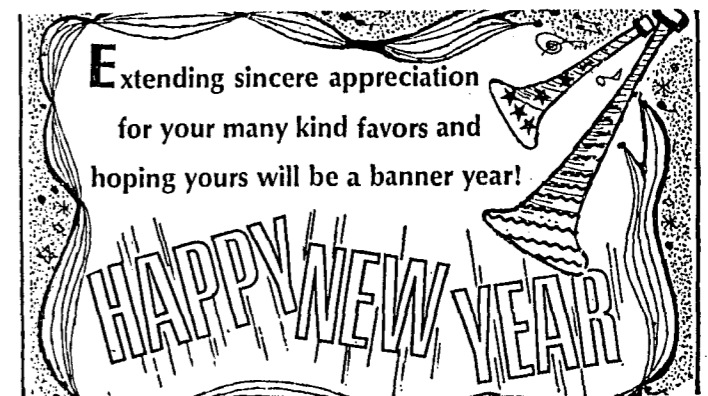
