**Genesee Council Met
Monday Evening**

Minutes of the Genesee meeting for the City of Genesee held January 9, 1978 at 7:30 p. m. at City Hall. Mayor L. W. Sorensen presided.
 The January meeting of the council followed a Public Hearing for the purpose of determining whether to vacate the alleyway bisecting Block One North Add. No protests were received.
 John Bieker, of Colton, Washington, an appointee of the Latah County Parks and Recreation Board met with the Council to exchange ideas and assess the needs of Latah County in regards to related activities.
 Discussed were different projects including Robinson Park, Spring Valley Reservoir, Moose Creek Reservoir, Laird Park and the defunct Milwaukee Railroad right-of-way between Elk River and Bovill. Mr. Bieker also noted the County Fair grounds are overcrowded and it will soon be necessary to look for a different site. He noted the County is also interested in our local needs and was told we feel our tennis court and new lights at the ball park are two needs at this time.
 R. M. Wright of Genesee attended the meeting and is protesting the snowmobiles entering the City at high rates of speed and at hours that are in violation of the curfew set by the City.
 A building permit application from Wm. T. Shirley for remodeling the kitchen in his home was reviewed.
 George R. Wilson, elected Councilman and Stan Merrill, re-elected Councilman in the November election, and Mayor Sorensen, re-elected Mayor were sworn in by City Clerk Don Springer. The councilmen then re-elected Leonard Singhose President of the Council.
 Mayor Sorensen appointed Wilson commissioner of Parks and Recreation, and renewed the appointments of Singhose to Water and Sewer; Moden to the Street Department and Merrill to Police and Fire Departments. Wilson will replace outgoing Councilman Zenner as an ex-officio member of the Planning and Zoning Commission. Mayor Sorensen appointed Lloyd Esser to the P. & Z. The terms of Betty Greenwell and Elvon Hampton have expired. Anyone wishing to serve on the Planning and Zoning board and have been a resident of Genesee for the past 5 years are eligible. OK's School Bus Purchase**

The Genesee Board of Trustees held their regular monthly meeting January 9, 1978 at 1:30 p. m. in the Superintendent's Office.
 The board decided to purchase a new school bus for the 1978-79 school year and instructed E. F. Lettenmaier, transportation supervisor, and Supt. Schwartz to prepare bus specifications and call for bids. The Board authorized the Supt. to schedule in-service training sessions in metrics for the Genesee teaching staff during the month of March. The board approved the request of Roger Wechl, high school Principal to attend the secondary school principals meeting in Boise January 29-31, and the request of Supt. Schwartz to attend the Supt. meeting in Boise January 18-20.
 The board began initial work on the development of the 1978-79 budget and held an executive session to discuss negotiation strategies.
 At 4:00 P. M. the board met with representatives of the Genesee Education Association in a problem solving session covering qualified substitutes for Elementary and Secondary school and special education at secondary level.
 The board heard the G. E. A.'s input and deferred action until they have time to review and study their input.
 The board recessed at 5:00 P. M. and reopened the meeting at 7:30 P. M. to hear patron concerns. Approximately 60 patrons attended the meeting. The board received and recorded concerns expressed by patrons, stating that they would review and study these concerns before comments and constructive criticism was heard.

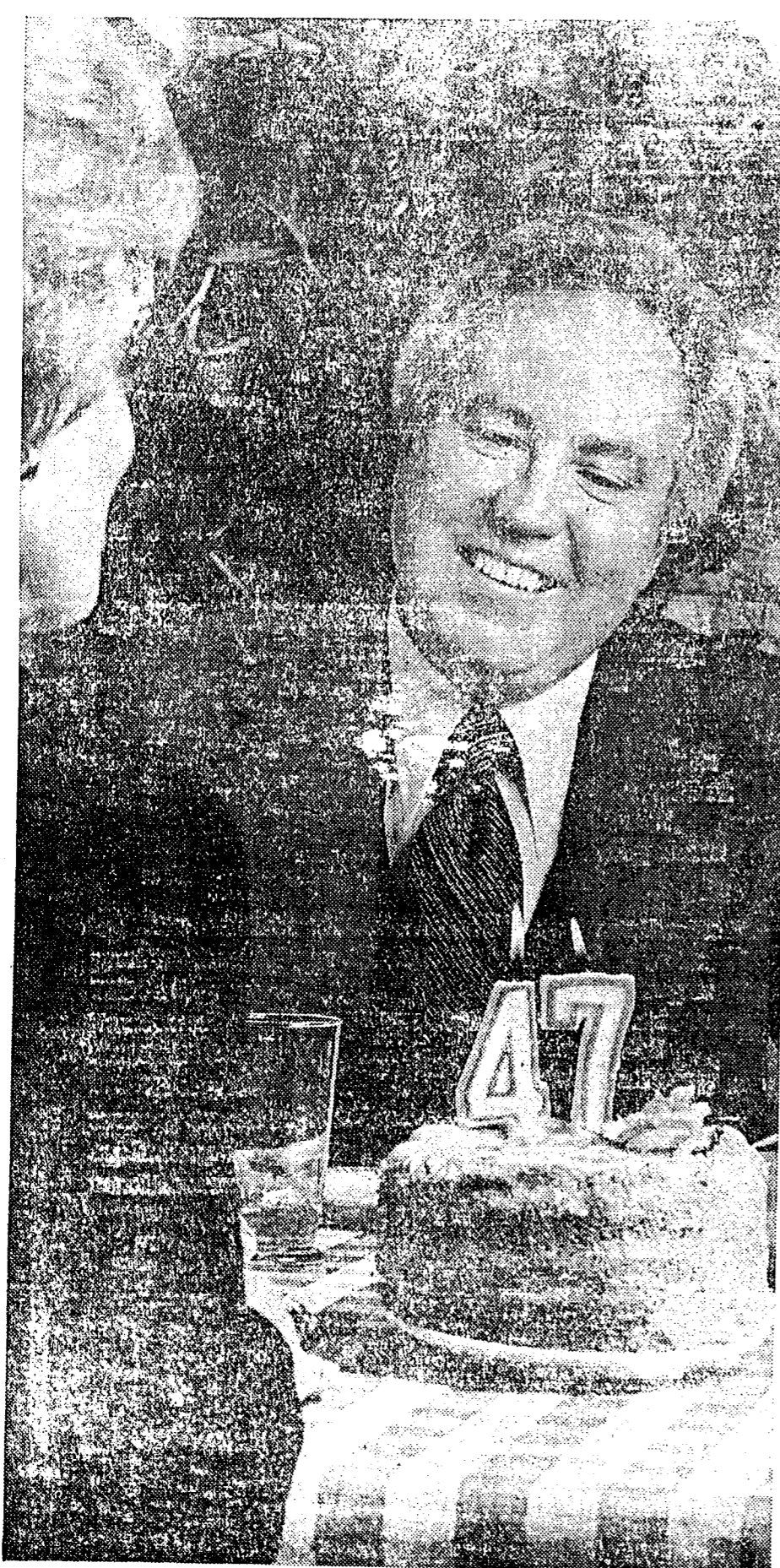

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
