# WHAT TO HUNT AFTER

What do you hunt when the season for deer, elk and waterfowl is over?

Along with coyote and jackrabbit, hunters who can brave the snow and tend the secondary school principals cold can hunt other "nongame" animeeting in Boise January 29-31, and the request of Supt. Schwartz to atsuments including badger, porcupine, snowshoe hare, fox (with some exceptions) and raccoon, according to the Department of Fish and Game.

There is no open season for female mountain lions accompanied by kittens or spotted mountain lion kittens. After black bears come out of hibernation, they may be hunted in the spring until as late as June 30, in certain management areas. Mountain lion can be hunted until

March 31 in specified areas, and it is best to consult the hunting regulations for details on the open management units. Along with examput and deferred action until they ining the regulations, hunters must possess a valid hunting license.

Trapping furbearers and other non game animals also provides excellent winter sport. Currently, the bobcat season is open for trapping and hunting until January 31.

There are three birds on the unprotected list, which means they can be hunted anytime during the year by any valid license holder. are English sparrow, starling, and wild pigeons.

Crows may be hunted until January 31, and there is no daily bag or possession limit.





WINTER SNOW PROVIDES DEADLY PLAYGROUND FOR PETS

More snow in the higher elevations has moved a lot of Idaho's big game animals down to their w. ering areas where they could make targets for roving dogs.

The likelihood of pets chasing deer

and elk increases as wildlife moves down to winter areas which, in some cases, are being encroached up n by new homes, according to the Department of Fish and Game. With heavy snow, wildlife moves within range of dogs which may

chase a deer for fun but may endanger the deer's life. The problem is acute for larger deer and elk because dogs can run on top of the snow's surface while the heavier deer or elk will break through the snow. This kind of chase tires the big

game animal quickly, making them victims of the dogs. The departent has issued guidelines for conservation officers to use when confronted with dog harassment situations. Although Idaho statutes give the officer authority to des-

troy dogs actually harassing or killing big game, the officer will: -Do everything possible to identify and locate the owner of the dog before attempting to catch the dog and

destroy it. -Issue a warning to the owner to keep the dog under control with subsequent incidents of vig game harassment calling for a citation.


-Use caution and discretion before destroying any dog within or near a

city or subdivision. 
