

David G. Kuehl, Retired Genesee Merchant,
Claimed by Cancer January 13



David Gustav Kuehl, a retired Genesee clothing store owner and a highly respected member of the community since 1934, died at Good Samaritan Nursing Home in Moscow at 3:10 Friday, January 13. Death was attributed to lung cancer. He was 86.

He was born August 5, 1891 at Winlock, Washington, the son of Henry and Alpha Kuehl. He attended Washington primary and secondary schools and was a graduate of Washington State College at Pullman, where he was an outstanding catcher on the college baseball team.

In 1923 he opened a clothing store at Uniontown, Washington which he operated until 1934 when he moved his store and residency to Genesee. He operated Kuehl's Store, clothing and dry goods business on main street until his retirement in the mid sixties.

During his business career, he was very active in community and civic affairs and was a past president of the Genesee Merchant's Association, Genesee Civic Association, a past Commander of Bielenberg-Schooler Post 58, American Legion, of which he was a fifty-year member; and a past Master of Unity Lodge No. 32, A. F. & A. M. of which he was also a fifty-year member and a member of Lily Chapter No. 27, O. E. S.

He married Charlotte Rogers of

Olympia, Wash., at Winona, Wash., in 1924. She survives at the family home. Other survivors include one daughter, Bonnie Stanley of Roseburg, Oregon; a grandson, Michael Stanley, a student at Washington State University in Pullman; a brother, Leslie at Clarkston and numerous nieces and nephews. Two brothers and a sister preceded him in death.

Funeral services were conducted Friday at 1:30 p. m. from the Genesee Community church with the Rev. Don Hammond, officiating.

Mrs. Joan Stout, organist and soloist, sang "O Love That Will Not Let Me Go," and "The Love of God."

Dave Will Be Missed

Genesee had to say goodbye to another prominent member of the community Tuesday afternoon as friends gathered to pay final respects to David G. Kuehl. The obituary stated that Dave was a retired businessman . . . and he was . . . but he was much more than that. For the past 44 years Dave was a spirit and a force in Genesee.

During the time he operated his clothing store, he provided the town with good products at fair prices. He would tell jokes and stories about his store and listen and laugh as others told them about him, but I feel safe in saying that I doubt he ever purposely gave anything but the best. That's why he was successful.

And he was more than just a merchant . . . he believed in the town and the community. He gave unselfishly of his time and money for any worthwhile purpose. He worked many years with the now disbanded Merchant's Association and even after he retired he was a ceaseless worker in the Genesee Civic Association. He was the membership chairman of that organization and if you didn't belong, you heard from Dave.

Dave was a very outgoing man, always in good spirits and had a joke or humorous story for just about every occasion. You could hear his voice and his laugh a block away as he would make his daily trip to the post office to get his mail when he had his store. Some of my best memories of Dave are when he and Floyd Ochs, who used to have the WWP office in the back of Dave's store would get together to bedevil friends who happened to stop in when both were there. If you were in a poor mood when you went in, you couldn't stay that way long around Dave and Floyd.

Much has been discussed around Genesee, I know, as to what happened to our business district. There are lots of reasons: changing times, economic, personal, but also there is one fact; there weren't a lot of businessmen like Dave Kuehl. —Now there's even one less. —Bill

Preliminaries will be Thursday and Friday, Jan. 19 and 20, and the finals Saturday, Jan. 21, all at 7:30 p. m. in the University of Idaho Student Union Building Ballroom.

The girls will have a busy week in Moscow, staying with Host Families, attending daily group meals as guests of Moscow organizations, practicing and rehearsing for the public performances and getting to know each other personally. State Chairman this year is Sherry Fredricks, Co-Director and Co-Choreographer are Beck Nelson Eathing and Amber Nelson, both of Idaho Falls, and Master of Ceremonies is Roger McQueen.

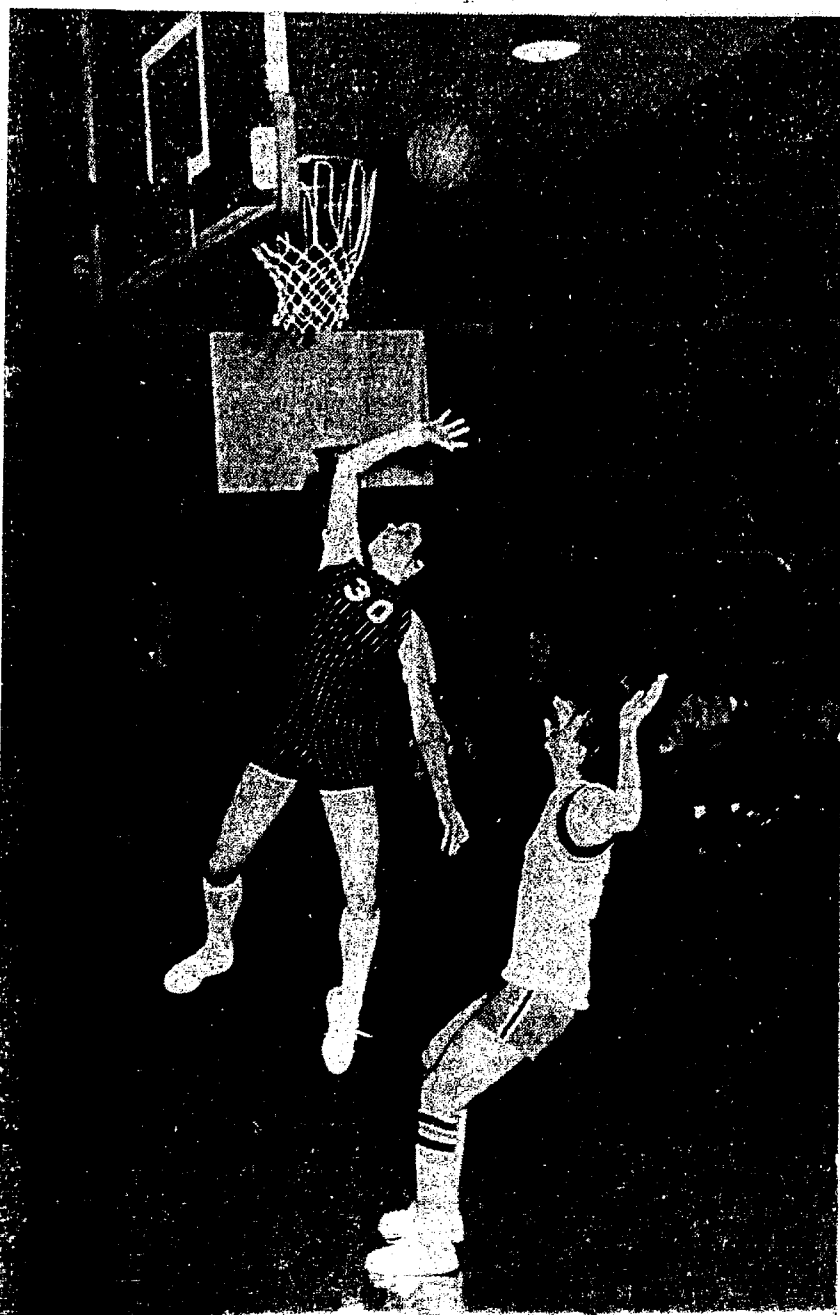

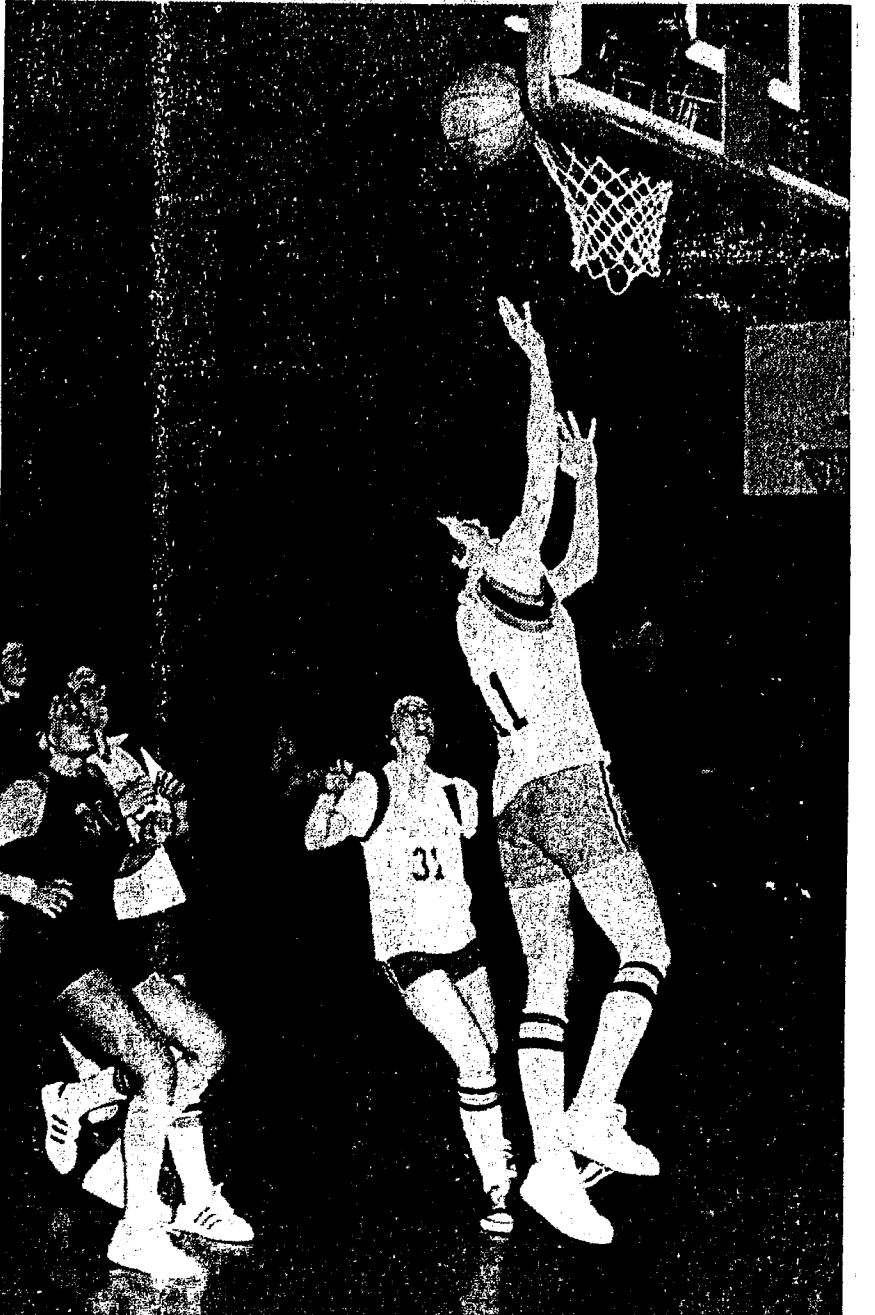

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SNOWMOBILERS HAVE RESPONSIBILITY TO WILDLIFE

The long awaited winter snow is here at last, and a variety of outdoor enthusiasts are having the opportunity to enjoy their winter sports. Cross-country skiers, down-hill skiers, tubers, and snowmobilers are finally having the chance to enjoy their particular brand of recreation. But, snowmobilers must remember that their sport requires a certain responsibility that is not inherent in the others.

Snowmobilers have been maligned for the actions of a thoughtless few, but because of the mechanized nature of their form of recreation, they need to pay heed to these suggestions from the Department of Fish and Game.

The department urges snowmobilers never to harass wildlife. Animals that are chased by snowmobilers will

frequently drop from exhaustion. While the thoughtless person involved may fail to see the harm in the chase, the animal, as a result of stress and shock, may not survive the ordeal.

Deer are especially susceptible to stress from such circumstances; and even if a deer were to survive the chase, in the case of a doe, she could be caused to abort a fetus she may be carrying.

Snowmobilers are also reminded that winter places certain stresses on feeding wildlife without the intrusion of man, and the department urges snowmobilers to avoid areas where wildlife may be feeding.

Wildlife observers and photographers who use the snowmobile to pace animals to get action pictures, while not intending to harm animals, may cause extreme stress in the animal. Even the sound of a snowmobile is enough to move a herd of elk

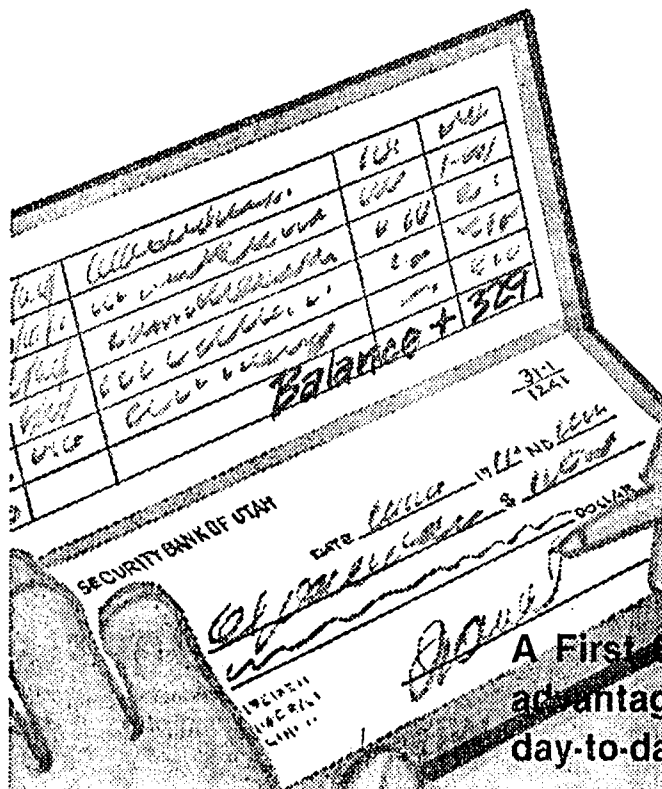
