### City Will Seek Grant For Study, Construction Of New Well

Darrel Brocke, water commissioner and city council member said this week that the City of Kendrick will apply through CEDA for a grant to do an engineering study of a new well and reservoir for Kendrick. If satisfactory, the study will be followed by an application from the H. U. D. (Housing and Urban Development) for the construction of the new system.

A sample ballot was taken by the city last November which showed a majority of tax payers in Kendrick were in favor of a bond issue for construction of a new well.

If present plans continue favorably it is hoped construction will begin in August or September of this year.

An unofficial estimate of the cost of the proposed project is in the 100 to 150 thousand dollar range. When the preliminary engineering is completed, the city will have a much better estimate of the total project cost. Brocke indicated.

The Kendrick City Council plans on selecting an engineering firm at the next regular meeting.

Brocke, whose regular term on the council expired in December and who chose not to seek re-election, accepted Mayor Wayne Harris' appointment for a two-year term. The vacancy on the council was created when Harris, already a council member, was elected to the office of may-

Controlled aggression enables us business and in our daily lives. Aggression acted out in the form of music and art is one of the major creative forces working in man, And, at the same time, uncontrolled aggression has become possibility the most damaging factor in our society

Criminal violence in our streets, abused children, emotional, crippling hate between marriage partnerswars between nations, terrorism in the air, individual and collective acts of violence and hatred are daily tearing at the fabric of both the family and modern civilization. They are as much a product of aggression as was the controlled drive that led famous composers to write music or Michael Angelo to paint.

The history of aggression can be called the history of man, and yet, aggression defies definition in modern mental health terms. The reason lies in its complexity.

Aggression falls into a number of categories. In the first place, it it known as an affect—a subjective feeling of pleasure or pain. Secondly, it is also classed as an emotion—a mental state that involves both thought and perception. And third, it is an active behavior that has the potential of being either constructive or destructive.

The symptoms of aggression are many and varied. The actual aggressive behavior may be masked or disguised. Thus, the person may not even realize how aggressively he is acting. A man smashing his hand down on the horn of his automobile because the car in front of

him does not move instantly ahead when the light turns green is demonstrating the symptoms of aggres-

A woman's whose only response to constant frustration is to bottle her anger up in under-the-breath mutterings is also exhibiting the symptoms of aggression. Violent abuse of a child as he repeatedly destroys toys and/or screams "I hate you, I'll kill you" is another symptom of aggression.


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


