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
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

Nonresidential Building **Building Permits Remain** Strong, Says Bank Report

New building permits for nonresidential construction activity remained strong in January, according to the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. Nonresidential construction building permits rose above the previous month's total and sharply exceeded the January, 1977 activity level.
Reflecting seasonal patterns, Jan-

uary permits for residential constru-ctions declined from the December

Total value of authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in January was \$27,-155,284, or 53.8 per cent greater than the value recorded in January, 1977. January, 1978 figures in the Idaho Construction Report, include Ammon and Bingham counties unincorporated and more complete construction data for Ada County unincorporated.
Bear Lake County unincorporated data are no longer available.
Construction in January of 520 new residential dwelling units was valued at \$15,607,623. This reflects

valued at \$15,607,623. This reflects a 29 percent increase in number and a 52.7 per cent increase in value compared to a year ago.

Nonresidential construction valued at \$8,486,830 was up 75.6 percent from last year. Alterations and repairs, totaling \$3,360,831, showed a 19.8 percent increase.
