**Fish and Game Department Adopts Controlled Hunt Changes.**

The Fish and Game Commission adopted two changes to the 1978 controlled hunt regulations.

At their regular January meeting the Commission adopted an alternate permit proposal for bighorn sheep and a new refund policy for both resident and nonresident hunters.

The new alternate system will allow a drawing of unsuccessful bighorn sheep applicants to provide an alternate hunter for each successful applicant who did not pay for his permit and tag by the cutoff date.

Applications for all controlled hunts must be received at the headquarters office of the Department of Fish and Game no later than 5 p. m., June 30, or postmarked not later than June 30.

The drawings for all species will be held August 1 in the computer room of the Len B. Jordan State Office Building. The drawing for alternate sheep hunters will be held August 22 at the Fish and Game Headquarters Office.

Successful bighorn sheep applicants must have their correct fees to the License Section, Headquarters Office, not later than 5 p. m., August 21, in order to receive their permits and tags. The regulation change also calls for any applicant to be disqualified who fails to submit the correct fees by August 21.

In other action, the Commission directed the department not to make refunds on resident license, tag or permit purchases after the sale has been completed.

Nonresident hunters may receive a refund on the purchase price, less vendor commission, for nonresident hunting licenses, deer tags and elk tags which are under restrictive quota. Refunds will be granted only upon death of the licensee or if the purchaser is in the military service and is transferred.

The Commission also directed the department not to make refunds on sales of nonresident licenses, tags and permits which are open to public purchase.

**Recycling Helps Solve County Disposal Problems**

Garbage, all Latah County residents have it. But how do we all dispose of it?

Some people just toss it and let the weekly garbage truck carry it away to the county landfill between Moscow and Troy. Others recycle it.

But the best way is to recycle as much as possible because the present landfill is almost full according to David Morey, Moscow Recycling Center. In one year, it will be full and no other Latah County sites meet existing regulations.

Besides saving tax money to create a new county landfill, Morey explains that recycling conserves mineral and fiber resources thereby requiring less new energy to reproduce these materials.

Approximately one-third to one-half of solid waste can be recycled. Most common categories are newspapers, glass bottles, tin cans, and aluminum cans.

Moscow Recycling Center currently operates a county wide and county funded recycling program to provide monthly household pickup of recyclables for residents living in Juliaetta, Genesee, and other communities in the county. For residents living outside of city limits they have provided bins for deposit of recyclables.

In Juliaetta, the bin is located next to City Hall. There are two bins in Genesee, one in the alley behind City Hall and the other on the west side of the city shop. Kendrick's bin is next to the post office.

The next dates of household pickup according to Morey are April 4 at Genesee and March 15 for Juliaetta and Kendrick.

If you are interested in household pickups or recyclables, contact Morey at 882-0590.

Higher taxes is the alternative to recycling, Morey said an increase in taxes would result from collecting more garbage each year. Without recycling, another potential cost lies in an increased cost of hauling garbage to Whitman County landfill once Latah's landfill is full according to Latah County Commissioners.

"Currently in the recycling program there has been an approximate saving of \$16,000" Morey said, "with only 8 percent participation of county residents."

Participation for the month of February in this area was a total of 19 households with 2 households in Juliaetta, 4 in Kendrick and 13 in Genesee.

Moscow Recycling Center collected a total of 1151 pounds last month. Juliaetta had 67 pounds, 194 pounds in Kendrick and 900 pounds in Genesee.

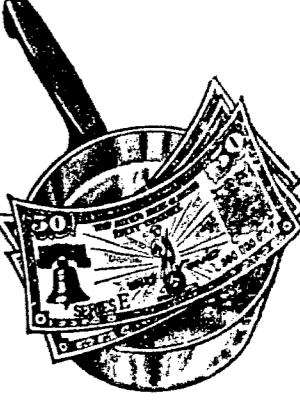

**LOW COST DENTURES STARTING**

A program to provide dentures at a low cost to eligible senior citizens is getting underway in the Lewiston-Clarkston Valley. The program is a joint project of the Lewis-Clark Dental association, the Area Agency on Aging, the Banana Belt Senior Citizens, the Retired Senior Volunteer program and the Idaho Department of Health & Welfare. It will provide dentures on a sliding scale price to senior citizens meeting low income requirements. Greg Heartburg, supportive services coordinators with the Area Agency on Aging, said those interested in the program should call the Information and Referral Office of his agency. Other organizations lending a hand with the project are the Community Action Agency and the Volunteer Bureau. 


