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

The Department of Fish and Game reminds Idahonans they need a hunting license before they can carry an uncased gun in the field, even though they may be hunting only ground squirrels.

According to department conservation officers, complaints from landowners begin to pick up this time of year, complaints about people shooting from cars, shooting across high-

ways and trespassing. Hunters need to ask permission before hunting on someone else's property, the department said.

All game bird and waterfowl seasons are closed now and so is cottontail and pygmy rabbit hunting But there are animals that may be hunted, and a check of the regulations may be necessary.
