Prior to employment, Hermann completed an extensive three-month training program conducted by the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Spokane and other Production Credit Associations throughout the 12th District.

The training program included on-the-job training at the FICB and at various PCAs. It was designed to provide intensive instruction in credit policy and analysis.

PCAs provide short- and intermediate-term credit and financially related services to farmers, ranchers, and commercial fishermen. The 30-member-owned PCAs in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana obtain loanable funds for the FICB of Spokane which sells bonds to private investors. In 1977, Twelfth District PCAs provided \$1.47 billion to area producers.

FRUIT HOBBYISTS BELIEVE OLD VARIETIES ARE BEST

Moscow—Old fashioned varieties of fruit trees that are still being grown here and there in Idaho may be on the "wanted list" of fruit fanciers in other states.

Robert Kurle secretary of the N. American Fruit Explorers says members of his organization are amateur fruit growers who are interested in growing some of the older varieties that have become rare in recent years.

"The qualities we look for in fruit are things like tartness, aroma and texture. The commercial grower, on the other hand looks for eye-appeal and shipping and keeping ability," Kurle stated.

Members of the group share information on how to grow fruits and nuts and where to find grafts or plant materials of rare and unusual kinds.

GARDENERS CAN AVOID USE OF PESTICIDES

Moscow—Gardeners who wish to avoid spraying and dusting with chemicals should grow tough, pest-resistant vegetables, horticulturist experts say.

In a list of vegetable crops that can be grown without pesticides, the U. S. Department of Agriculture includes asparagus, beets, carrots, celery, Swiss chard, collards, cress, endive, kohlrabi, leeks lettuce, mustard, onions, parsley, parsnips, peas, peppers, radishes, salsify, spinach, turnips and watermelon.

Tomatoes may need to be sprayed to control blight. However, tomato varieties are available which are resistant to fusarium and verticillium wilt and nematodes.

Sweet corn may be damaged by borers in the ears, but chemical control is not essential. Damage by borers can be prevented by treating the silk with mineral oil before it turns brown.

Broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage and cauliflower may become inedible because of cabbage loopers. Use of a bacterial disease, "Bacillus thuringiensis," is an effective, non-pesticide method of controlling this insect.

CRABAPPLE TREE

A crabapple tree on the Fred Newman farm at Cameron was planted by William Freitag, who filed homestead rights on this land in 1882. Mr. Freitag planted this tree among other fruit trees in the 1880's.

This crabapple tree is nearly one hundred years old and is bearing fruit in alternate years. It is about forty feet tall and has a trunk circumference of seven feet.

The apples are made into delicious jelly and pickles.

The tree is beautiful in the spring when in blossom and in the fall with its many colorful apples.

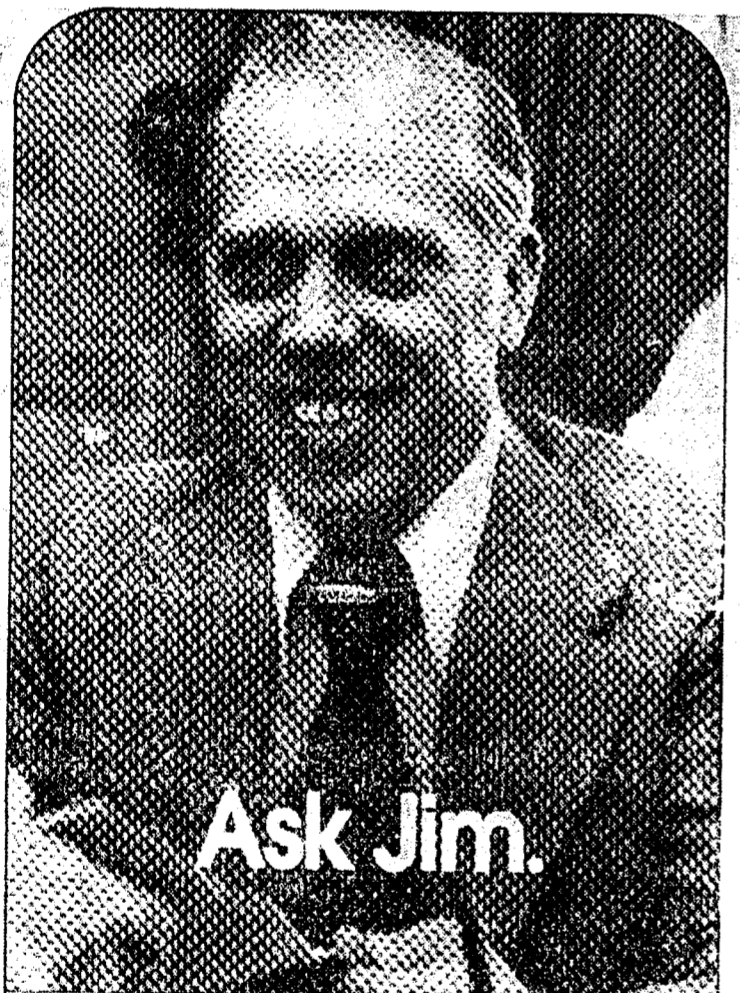

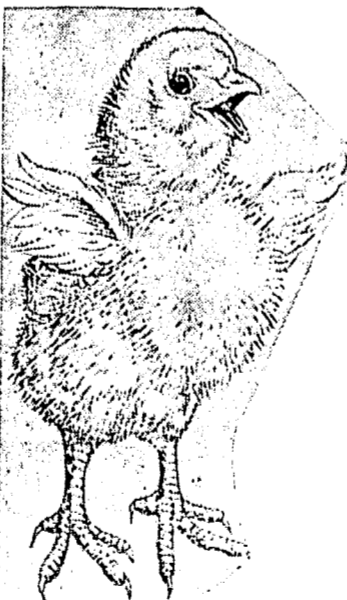


