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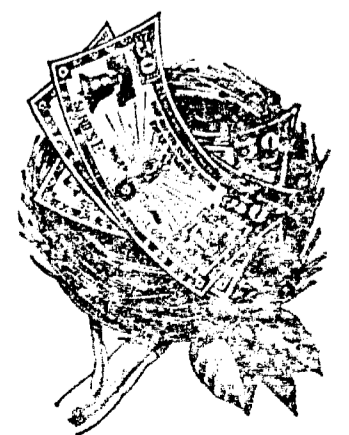

She says she's prepared these for family dinners and taken them to parties and other occasions where they met with instant approval and praise. So many have asked Mercedes for her recipes that she decided the simplest way to share with everyone would be in our column. We hope you enjoyed them—thanks again, Mercedes for sharing.

Baked Shrimp

1 5-oz can shrimp
1/2 lb. or less sharp cheese
5 slices of bread cubed
2 cups milk
3 eggs, slightly beaten
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 dash pepper
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
Grease casserole and put in layer of bread, shrimp and cheese in that order, repeating until ingredients are used. Add milk to beaten eggs. Add salt, pepper and mustard. Pour mixture over other ingredients in casserole. Place casserole in a pan of warm water in oven and bake at 325 degrees for about 50 minutes.

Serve for lunch with tossed green salad, rolls and coffee.

Ming Loaf

3 cups medium white sauce
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon Tabasco
2 eggs, separated
4 hard-cooked eggs, chopped fine
1 cup tuna, flaked
1/2 cup chopped almonds
2 teaspoons chopped chives
3 cups chow mein noodles
1/4 cup chopped pimiento
Combine white sauce with Worcestershire sauce, salt and Tabasco.
Mix 1 1/2 cups of sauce with two well beaten egg yolks, 3 chopped hard cooked eggs, tuna, almonds chives and 2 cups of chow mein noodles.
Beat eggs whites stiffly; fold into tuna-egg mixture and pour into well oiled 9x5x3 inch loaf pan.

Bake in 350 degree oven 45 to 50 minutes or until a golden brown crust is formed. Unmold onto hot platter surrounded with remaining noodles. Serve with remaining 1 1/2 cups white sauce to which 1 chopped hard-cooked egg and 1/4 cup pimiento have been added.

It was suggested at the hearing on selling the town property in the west end of Kendrick that people write letters to The Gazette airing their ideas on selling or keeping said property.


It was advised to let voters know my intentions if you vote to sell.


