



safety with a bang. Murrell, an Idaho Department of Fish and Game conservation educator fired a blank round from a rifle to dramatize the hazards of improper handling of a firearm.

He was one of eight panelists who discussed subjects that included hunter safety and survival; physical fitness, search and rescue and good safety practices involving such activities as swimming use of recreational vehicles and woodcutting and chainsaw operation.

More than 400 persons attended the 2-day conference in Boise March 16-17..


Murrell accompanied his presentation with slides illustrating the department's gun safety program conducted in Idaho schools for seventh graders.

He demonstrated typical field situations in which gun accidents occur-plinking problems, mistaking people for game, improper handling around vehicles and roads-and out lined the ethics that make for safe hunting.

Murrell credited the department's hunter safety courses in large part with the drop in hunting accidents, from 42 in 1971 to 21 in 1977. "But the bad part," he added, "is that the largest number of victims is within the 10-19 age group."
