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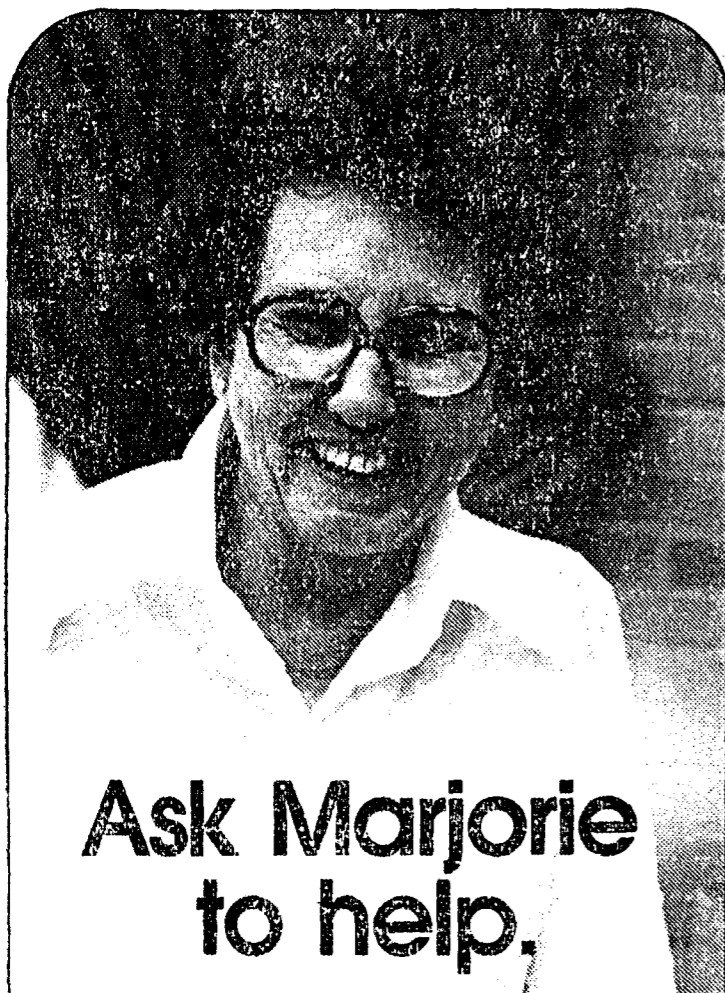
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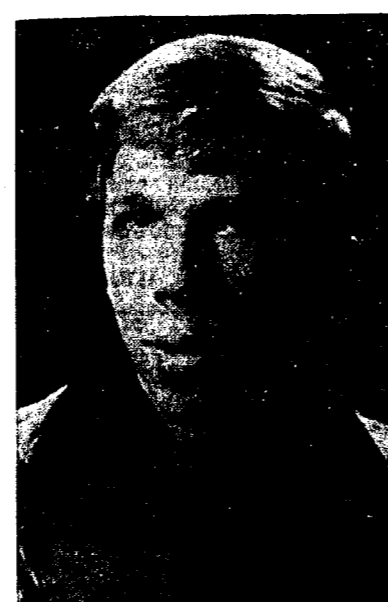

County Agents are Information Source

John R. Crosiar, Assistant Agricultural Editor, Moscow—If your favorite shade tree is losing its leaves has you stumped or how to plant a vegetable garden that will produce all season escapes you, check with the people at your county office of the Idaho, Cooperative Extension Service.

"Backed by researchers at the UI College of Agriculture, they're ready to help," said James L. Graves, extension service director. "If our agents don't have an immediate answer to your questions, they'll find it and tell you what they've learned as soon as possible."

With offices located in 42 of Idaho's 44 counties and at the Fort Hall and Nez Perce Indian Reservations, the extension service serves all Idahoans with information tailored to local needs. Specialists at Moscow and at research and extension centers from Sandpoint to Teton provide expertise based on the latest research by the Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station and other agencies.

Besides personally assisting in finding a solution to your problem, county agents also stock a number of helpful publications in their offices and can obtain others from the University of Idaho in Moscow.

"The latest 'List of Available Publications' (Bulletin No. 401) contains more than 50 information sheets, brochures and pamphlets offering pointers and home gardeners will find useful," Graves noted. New publications are added periodically, and existing ones are updated often.

A number of publications are available without charge. However, to help offset printing costs, most single copies are priced from five to 50 cents.

If your county extension office is out of the particular publication you want, you may order it by mail from the UI College of Agriculture, Agricultural Information, Moscow, Idaho, 83843. List both the number and title of the publication and include check or money order made payable to UI Agricultural Information.

Home Cookin'...

Rhubarb is plentiful right now and there are so many ways to prepare it. Marilyn Jenkins sent in recipes that I'm sure our readers will welcome and enjoy trying for "something different." Marilyn also gave us a very generous "helping" of her red rhubarb.

Rhubarb Cake

2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tsp. baking powder
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening
2 eggs, beaten
1/2 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
2 cups chopped rhubarb

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, sugar. Crumble in shortening. Beat eggs and add milk and vanilla to it. Then add egg and milk mix to sifted flour and shortening and mix. Add chopped rhubarb to batter and pour into greased 9x13 cake pan. Bake about 40 minutes at 375 degrees. Depends on how hot your oven is you may have to lower temp. Frost with powdered sugar.

The same batter can be used for apple or prune cake also. Decrease sugar to 1/2 cup and layer apples or prunes on top of batter in cake pan and sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Frost if desired.

Rhubarb Crumb Cake

1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1 tsp. soda
1 cup buttermilk
2 cups flour
1 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 cups rhubarb, cut in 1/2 inch pieces

1/2 cup chopped nuts
Cream shortening and brown sugar, add egg and blend well. Combine soda and buttermilk and add alternately with flour. Stir in rhubarb, nuts and vanilla. Place in 9x13" greased and floured baking dish. Sprinkle with topping. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-40 minutes.

Topping: Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 Tls. butter and 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Sprinkle over rhubarb mixture.


