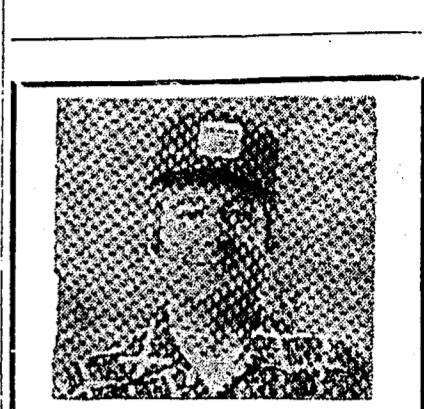

**Mike Blewett to seek  
District 7 House seat**

Mike Blewett, a 34-year-old farmer who resides in the Culdeseac area, has announced his candidacy for State Representative, Position B, from District 7 on the Republican ticket.


