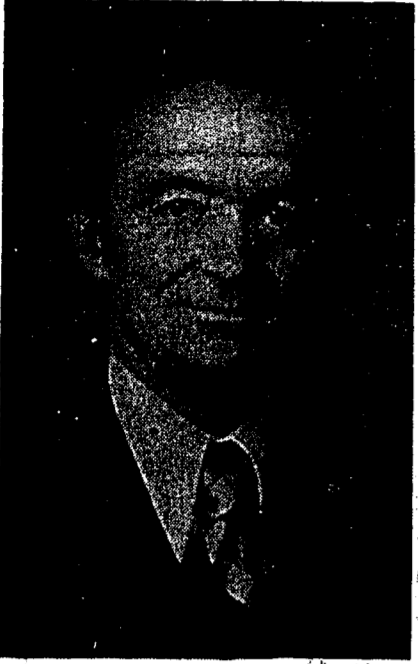


Tom Boyd to Seek Re-election

Tom Boyd, Genesee farmer, has announced his candidacy for State Representative, Position "B", District 5, on the Republican ticket. Boyd, a freshman lawmaker, is a member of the House Agriculture, Education, and Judiciary committees during his first session. He is serving on an interim committee studying mandatory minimum sentencing for some crimes which will be designated.



Boyd feels that the one percent tax initiative will get on the ballot in November and be passed by the electorate. He thinks that the initiative drive is a tax protest and states that its passage may have serious implications for school and local government funding. "It will jab the legislature into changing the tax structure, but I do not know where the changes will come." If the one percent initiative passes, the legislature may be able to make some adjustments... it looks to me as if there will be a substantial increase in state support for the public schools. I would support that." He noted that the state now provides about 42% of public education costs, down from 60% eight years ago, although the sum of money is larger now.

Tom feels that energy is a most critical issue facing our state. He originally favored a plant-siting bill that was considered in the last session, but withdrew his support after the Senate tacked several amendments on it. He does favor keeping State Hospital North at Orofino open for treatment of mental and emotional ills and for alcoholism.

Boyd is a native of Twin Falls and a graduate of the University of Idaho where he was in the R. O. T. C. program. He is a member of the University of Idaho Parents Association Executive Board; Vandal Boosters, American Legion, Genesee Civic Assoc., Elks, Masons, the Shrine, and the Genesee Boosters. He is a former member of the U. S. Dry Pea and Lentil Council, the Genesee Union Warehouse board, and served 33 years on the Genesee School board, six years as chairman.

Tom and his wife, the former Beverly Bressler, of Genesee, are the parents of three children: a married son, Jeff, who farms with his father and attends the University of Idaho; a daughter, Tracy, who will be a sophomore at the U/I this fall and daughter, Lisa, a sophomore at Genesee High School. The Boyds have one grandson, Thomas Jeffrey. They farm northeast of Genesee and in the Lenville area where they raise wheat, peas and barley.

John Galloway, 86, Retired Bear Ridge Farmer Passes

John Galloway, the son of Bear Ridge pioneers and a resident of that area since 1898, died at 12:20 p. m. Saturday, June 10 at Gritman Hospital at Moscow of natural causes. He was 86.

John was born October 23, 1891 at Galloway, Missouri, to Alexander and Kate Galloway. The family left Missouri and moved to the Kendrick area in 1898, and he had lived in this vicinity since then. Before retiring he farmed on the Big Bear Ridge with his brothers.

Survivors include three brothers, Dewey, Edd and Andy, all of Juliaetta; two sisters, Anna Bower of Kendrick and Mary Larson of Georgetown, Calif.; five nephews and four nieces. Two brothers preceded him in death.

The funeral was held at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday at Short's Funeral Chapel, with Rev. Steve Caskey of Kendrick officiating. Burial was at the Wild Rose Cemetery.

The family suggests any memorials be made to the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund.

Genesee Board Sets Mill Levy Vote Again

The Genesee Board of Trustees held its regular monthly meeting Monday, June 12, 1978 at 8:00 P. M. in the Superintendent's Office. New Superintendent Philip Stanley attended the meeting. He will begin his new position July 1, 1978 and indicates he plans to move into the school-owned house the latter part of June.

The board reviewed a survey taken on the wishes of Kindergarten parents on the length of the Kindergarten year. A majority of the parents returning the survey favored extending the program to a 9-month half-day program. After much discussion the board approved to extend the kindergarten year from 6 to 9 months. Additional moneys will be obtained from the State Foundation program to cover additional costs of extending the program, thus not requiring additional request for funds from local district patrons.

After much study and review during a special board meeting held June 9 and the budget hearing held June 12, 1978, as required by law, the Genesee School Trustees have reduced the override request to 9.9 mills, this reflects a 1.1 mill reduction and a reduction of \$10,196,000—6.9 mills will produce \$63,958,000. The major portion of this reduction (\$8400,00) was gained by reducing the extent of classroom remodeling in the weight room to providing an adequate classroom facility and postponing the Science Lab components. The board felt this was the most they could reduce the budget without having a major effect on instructional programs. The board set Tuesday, June 27 1978 as the date to hold the second override levy since the first override levy was turned-down June 6th. The board encourages all patrons to vote and if you have questions about the override contact a board member or the superintendent.

The board accepted the first half of the 650 report to be sent to the State Department of Education and approved the May bills prior to adjourning the meeting.

Absentee ballots for the June 27th M&O override levy of 6.9 mills will be available at the District Office Friday, June 16th through June 27th.

Kendrick Restricts Water Use

The Kendrick City Council has decided to set up watering schedules within the city limits effective Monday, June 19. The restrictions were felt necessary because the city reservoir is drawing down dangerously low during the later afternoons and evenings when most of the lawn and garden sprinkling is done.

Why the water levels fell so rapidly this year, hasn't been determined, but the council felt it had better move early to avoid a worse situation later in the season.

The city will use the same water schedule it used last year. So effective Monday, June 19—using the State Highway as a dividing line, the residents south of the highway may water on Monday, Wednesday and Friday only. Those on the North side of the highway may water on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. No Sunday watering is allowed.

The Kendrick city ordinances also set forth fines for violations and even provide for shutting off water service to those who repeatedly violate the ordinances.

The restrictions will be in effect until further notice.

Latah Voters Reject Library Bond Issue

Residents of Latah County went to the polls Monday afternoon and sent a proposed \$200,000 library bond issue down to defeat by a solid margin. This vote was for county residents outside the Moscow city limits. Moscow had approved its share of the new library in November, but at that time the county turned it down by a 54 percent favorable vote, less than the required two-thirds.

Monday, the issue was brought up again and this time only 35 percent favored the proposal. The unofficial tally for the county was 490 "yes" and 896 "no" votes.

Residents in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area also voted against the issue with 52 "yes" votes and 119 "no" votes.

Peggy White of Troy was elected to the library board for a five-year term, defeating Carole Hughes of Moscow 597 to 421. Mildred Krasselt of Potlatch won a one-year term defeating Tom Truka of Troy 629 to 462.

Stella McIver Recovering Satisfactorily After Accident

Mrs. Stella McIver was reported to be making slow but satisfactory recovery from the effects of a traffic accident last week on main street in Kendrick. Mrs. McIver was knocked to the pavement and shaken up when she was struck by a car while crossing the street.

She was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston for observation and treatment. She suffered no broken bones but is receiving whirlpool therapy to help her recover from bruises and sore muscles.

Kendrick School Board Adopts '78-'79 Budget; Hires New Teachers

June 8th the Kendrick School Board adopted a balanced budget for the 78-79 school year, which amounted to \$528,870.00 in expenditures.

The Board also applied for renewal of the Remedial Reading Title I Grant. Glen Utzman of Moscow was hired to perform the annual District audit.

Miss Colette Cozort of Coeur d'Alene was hired to teach secondary science. Ted Mickelson of Grace, Idaho was hired to teach Vocational Agriculture and to be the F. F. A. Advisor. James Alford of Boise was hired for a secondary math position.

The next regular meeting, the annual meeting, will be July 13th at 8:00 p. m. in the high school.

Juliaetta Reservoir Develops Leak

Although rainfall has been almost twice this year what it was last, the cities of Juliaetta and Kendrick are faced with water problems and the councils of both towns took action to remedy the situations this week.

Juliaetta's problem developed over the weekend when city workers found a leak in the bottom of the main water reservoir. Mayor Clark Woods said investigation determined the leak was in the bottom of the reservoir, making it necessary to drain the unit in order to begin repairs.

Materials to repair the leak were ordered from a Texas company who air shipped the material up, but part of the shipment had not arrived by Tuesday evening. Repairs will begin immediately upon arrival of the needed supplies.

Juliaetta also has a smaller reservoir as a back-up unit but it can't provide the output for the entire city during the summer months.

Until repairs are made and the main reservoir is refilled, Mayor Woods has asked that there be no outside watering or sprinkling and that household usage be kept at a minimum.

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
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State Grange Style Revue Held In Kendrick

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County Weed Control Operations are Underway

County weed control operations are again underway on State and county rights-of-way and motorists are urged to proceed with caution when overtaking and passing these sprayers. All spray vehicles attempt to leave as much of the roadway open as possible; however, this year we are countering some steep and unstable shoulders—due to aggravated soil erosion. County weed control is working harder than ever to avoid injury to native wildflowers and this year's good moisture has provided an unusually fine display.

Right of way spraying is perhaps the original and most useful of the integrated pest management tools now available. Only when the plant population in a region can be stabilized will biological or "natural" control methods become cost effective.

It is a notable fact that good weed control practices will allow great progress toward implementation of natural control methods for plant diseases and insect pests as well. Weeds should not be allowed to continue in their traditional role as host and vector for insect pests. Even foreign weeds, that at first appear to be a limited problem and not warrant chemical treatment, may in the future prove to be the undoing of some valuable conservation measures.
