## Avon Hamilton, 35, Killed In Auto Accident Friday

Avon Hamilton, 35, a resident of rural Juliaetta was killed Friday night, June 30 when his pickup truck apparently lost its brakes descending Hubbard Gulch grade. The area is three miles east of Cherry Lane Bridge over the Clearwater River. About 100 feet downroad from Hamilton's home he had run the truck up a steep embankment trying to stop; the vehicle smashed back into the road and he was thrown out. His wife, Shirley, who was riding with him at the time, was injured, but managed to reach their home and call for help.

Nez Perce County Sheriff's deputies investigated the accident.

Mrs. Hamilton was taken to Gritman Memorial Hospital at Moscow. She was reported to be in satisfactory condition early this week, but would require surgery. She sustained chest contusions and other injuries.

Hamilton was employed at Gem State Lumber Co. in Juliaetta and he and his family had lived in Juliaetta and Kendrick before moving to their present home a few months ago.

He was born March 10, 1944 in Mobil, Alabama, the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Hamilton, who now reside in Kendrick.

Survivors in addition to his wife at the family home include a daughter, Laurie Hamilton; a step-daughter, Christina and step grandson, Phillip Brown of Juliaetta; a son, Davy Hamilton of Glade, Oregon; two step sons, Gary and Donald Arnold of Napa, California; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Hamilton, Kendrick; two brothers, Gene Hamilton and Harvey Hamilton, both of Kendrick; four sisters, Darlene Eilers, Kendrick; Rebecca Gillispie, Cream Ridge; Linda Ochoa and Margaret Ayala, both of Santa Rosa, California; a grandmother, Mrs. J. D. Hamilton of Mississippi; 10 nieces, 5 nephews; 4 great nieces and 1 great nephew. An infant son and daughter preceded him in death.

Services will be held at 11:00 a. m. Thursday, July 6, at the Assembly of God Church in Kendrick with the Rev. James Bennett officiating. Burial will be at the Kendrick cemetery.

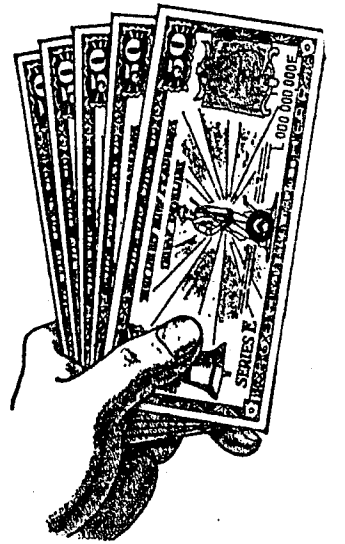

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

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**Family Affair—**

**ANXIETY** If you put the physical stress of tension on a chain, it is the weakest link that breaks. It is the same in human organism as in an inanimate machine. If you put a general demand, any demand on the whole machine, it is the weakest point that is likely to break down. In some people, the weakest point is the kidney; in others it is the brain; and others its the gastric lining. We are predisposed to respond to the same general demand with different types of disease manifestations.

For the victim of chronic anxiety neurosis, or one who experiences continuous attacks of acute anxiety, there are muscle relaxants and antidepressants. For some patients, such chemical therapies are augmented with psychotherapy.

Are several physical and mental illnesses—and even death—the inevitable consequences of our anxieties? Are they to be held at bay only with drugs and expense psychotherapies? Can we not keep ourselves from slipping into severe illness?

There are a number of ways of coping with anxiety. Much of our anxiety comes about from ignorance. And so, one of the most important and useful things to do is to identify for one's self that a problem exists. Having identified the problem, the most useful procedure is to get information about it. In this way, we clarify what it is one has to do.

The information gathering process might be as simple as asking someone for advice on the feared subject. With the information may come a solution to the problem or a reduction of its fear-inspiring potential. There may also be a realization that there is, in fact, no problem, that our anxiety was caused by what we thought was a threat that had no basis in reality.

One of the best ways of coping with normal anxiety is to be aware of one's self, to be able to sit back and say, "I'm kind of upset now." In this sense, we are defining anxiety as self-preoccupation and we mean by that that the individual is concerned with his own inner thoughts.

Then, if the reason for the upset feeling is identified, we continue the inner dialogue by acknowledging that we are behaving rather foolishly.

The fact is, we get upset at things that are not really terribly crucial in life.

The ability to recognize that one essential fact, contains the key to coping with virtually all of mankind's anxieties. Those people who cope best do so by sitting back and saying to themselves: "Well, what if the worst came to the worst? What if the worst fear that I am thinking about were to happen. Would it really be a catastrophe?"

With most of the stresses that we have to contend with in life, even if the worst came to the worst, it would not be so terrible.
