

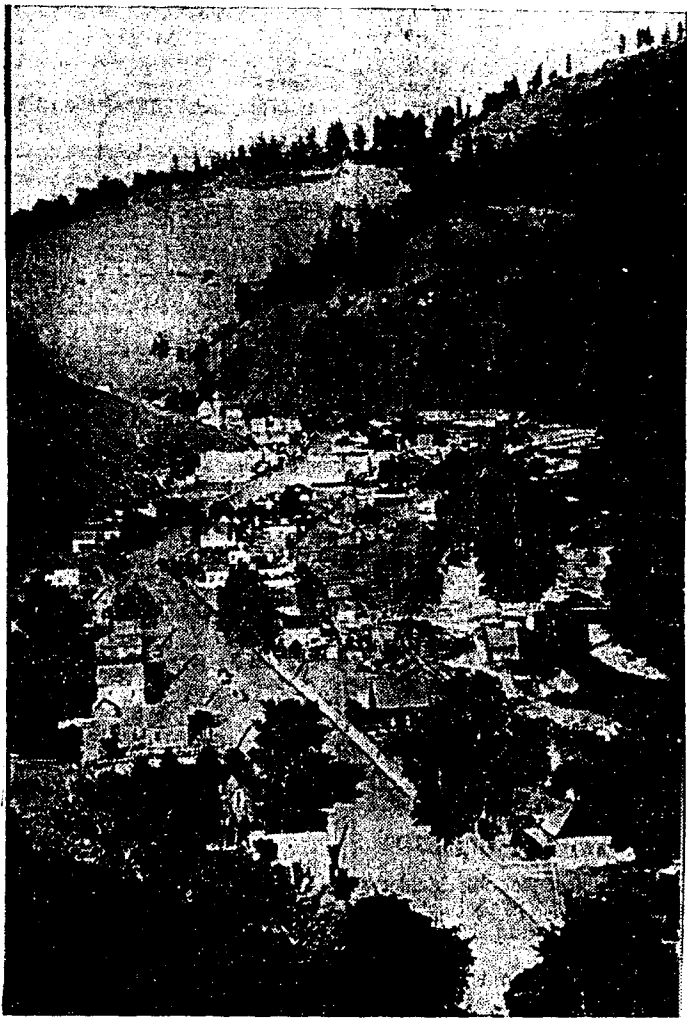

the above photo. This picture was taken by his grandfather, in 1915, the same year the Kendrick Park was dedicated. There is an interesting story concerning this picture which we hope to print next week.

## DEDICATION OF THE KENDRICK PARK

(Note: This was written by Jo Benscoter in 1915, following the dedication of the Kendrick Park in the summer of 1915.)

Last Wednesday afternoon and evening, the citizens of Kendrick met together to dedicate the park which was started a few weeks ago.

In the afternoon the program was rendered mostly by pupils. Students marched with their teachers from the school house to the park where the entertainment was to be held. The exercises were opened by the whole school singing the state song, followed by a short talk by Professor Knepper, which was enjoyed by all. Next a few pupils from rooms one and two gave a little dialogue entitled "Trees" after which Gwendoline Moser recited "A Dream Composition". The two rooms then ended their program by singing, "Pussywillows".

Rooms three and four next rendered their part of the entertainment which consisted of recitations by Helen Durbin, Edna Janes and Harold Hanson, also a song by room four, "Voices of the Wood", and was a great success. The high school program came next. It was opened with a reading by Miss Clara Bailey, followed by two essays, "Kendrick in 1915", and "Kendrick in 1925", it was written by Miss Ruth Helpman and told of the general disorder of Kendrick and ways in which it might be improved. "Kendrick in 1925" was written by Miss Edith Compton and described the little city as it appeared to her upon awakening from a Rip Van Winkle sleep. We hope Kendrick will live up to her expectations, especially in regard to the cement sidewalks and electric lights. After the last essay was finished N. B. Long and Mrs. H. P. Hull gave short addresses. At the close of its program each room planted a tree while the band played a few selections and it also accompanied the audience in singing "America" which ended the entertainment.

In the evening Mr. Woody and J. I. Mitchem gave short lectures, but Dean Schattuch was the principal speaker. His subject was, "Decoration of Home and City Grounds".

(Note: As part of its educational program this year, the Hill and Valley Garden Club members are devoting a part of each meeting to hear reports from the group on trees of the area. Here are two such reports plus an account of the dedication of the Kendrick Park written 63 years ago as seen through the eyes of Mrs. Jo Benscoter.)

## WHITE PINE TREE

The White Pine is Idaho's State tree. It was so designated by Idaho's legislature in 1935. It is a tall, hardy conifer growing to the height of from 75 to 150 feet or more. The tallest known Western White Pine in the world is near Elk River, it is 219 feet tall and 21 feet in circumference. It can be recognized easily by its soft, blue green needles, two to four inches long, cones have short brown curved scales without spines. The winged seeds grow under the scales and the bark is dark gray, broken into small squares.

The tree was ruthlessly cut down in the past. Lumber companies and the Forest Service are planting seedlings. Potlatch Corporation of Lewiston plants from 300,000 to 400,000 seedlings yearly. They include White Pine, Ponderosa Pine and Douglas Fir. The company gave 700 Ponderosa Pine seedlings to the Potlatch Ridge 4-H club at Leland and the Kendrick Boy Scout Troop which were planted in this area.

In the lumber industry, the White Pine has the highest commercial value because of its straight grain, light weight, uniform texture and workability and the many ways in which the lumber can be used.

The tree is planted ornamentally in the United States and in Europe.

In forests it is habitat for animals

## John C. Scharnhorst, 59, Genesee Area Farmer, Claimed by Cancer

John Charles Scharnhorst, a Genesee native and Lewiston resident for 20 years, passed away Thursday at St. Joseph's Hospital of cancer. He had been ill for six months—hospitalized one week. He was 59.



Scharnhorst was born August 26, 1918 to Louis D. and Mary J. Sprenger Scharnhorst at Genesee. He attended school there and worked for area farmers and on the family farm as a youth. He later farmed with his father and at the time of his death was operating the family farm.

In the early days of World War II, Mr. Scharnhorst was employed by Consolidated Aircraft of San Diego. He enlisted in the U. S. Navy on November 15, 1944 and served until January 25, 1946.

In 1952, Scharnhorst began work as a woodworker for the Potlatch Corporation at Headquarters. He continued as woodworker and equipment operator for the next 26 years, being cited by Potlatch Corporation in 1977 for 25 years of continued employment. He was one of the crew of the now famous Potlatch Forests, Inc. spring log drive for several years and in 1971 worked on the final drive No. 40.

He married Adrianna M. Engels at Genesee Oct. 29, 1949. Scharnhorst was a member of Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church at Lewiston, the Lewis-Clark branch post of the American Legion, the Nez Perce County Sheriff's posse, the Amateur Trapping Association as well as being an avid hunter and fisherman.

He was a chef of note and often prepared the family's holiday meals. In addition to his wife at the family home, Scharnhorst is survived by four sons, William A., Gerald, Louis and David, all of Lewiston; five daughters, Kathleen Minton of Frankfurt, West Germany; Theresa Erickson of Santa Ana, Calif., and Constance Schelhuber and Marina Scharnhorst, both of Seattle; his mother, Mary J. Scharnhorst, of Genesee; two brothers, Dick of Genesee and Robert of Orcas Island, Wash.; four sisters, Lorena Carnagey, of Forks, Wash., Anita Babich of Zillah, Wash., Teresa DeLore of Imperial Beach, Calif., and Betty Fuller of Clarkston, and three grandchildren.

Two sons, John and Kevin, preceded him in death.

Rosary services were held on Sunday at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church in Lewiston with Monsignor Hugo Pautler, Clarkston, conducting the service.

Funeral mass was celebrated at St. Mary's Catholic Church, Genesee on Monday with Father Edward T. Cope officiating.

He had a gentleness that belied his physical size. His family came first in all things and surely one of the fondest memories his wife and children will cherish was his love of preparing holiday dinners and the "fuss" it all entailed.

I'm sure that John's wife, children and his family have many wonderful memories of this good man that they would prefer to treasure just among themselves, and that is how it should be. For myself, I'll remember John as I best knew him: as a trap shooting buddy at the Lewiston Gun Club. Sometimes there'd be Louis, Dick, John and some of his boys out on a Sunday afternoon. Louis was getting old and grouchy but John and Dick always looked after him, picked up his empty shells and generally did his bidding. There was a lot of love there. John Scharnhorst was a good son, a good husband, a good father. John Scharnhorst was a good man. —Bill.

**U. of Idaho Releases New White Wheat Varieties**

Moscow—The University of Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station this week announced the release of two new soft white winter wheat varieties that have tolerance to snowmold and other disease problems occurring in northern Idaho.

The new varieties are named Lenore and Greer. They are sister lines, derived from a cross made in 1967 by Dr. Warren K. Pope, U/I wheat breeder, in an effort to combine the tolerance in foot rots found in an experimental variety which had the European wheat Odin as a parent with the tolerance to dwarf smut and snowmold which characterized a variety having Turkish wheat as a parent.

Lenore and Greer will be introduced to area farmers Friday during a tour of the U/I Plant Science Farm at Moscow. Also on display at the tour will be a new hard red winter wheat variety, Weston, which has performed well in Boundary and Franklin Counties.

Following the 1978 harvest, breeder and foundation seed of the new varieties will be available through the North Idaho Foundation Seed Association, Moscow, Idaho.

Greer and Lenore are brown-chaffed, awned and stiff-strawed varieties. Compared with other soft wheats, their grain has good quality. Both are tolerant to snowmold and have fair to good tolerance to dwarf smut, stripe rust and leaf rust.

Greer is a semi-dwarf type of medium while Lenore is tall. Greer has a higher level of resistance to dwarf smut and is widely adapted to the high yielding areas of northern Idaho. Greer has a very high tolerance to stripe rust.

Lenore is much superior in cold tolerance. It is highly tolerant to Cephalosporium foot rot and other soil disease problems which are common in wet locations in the cut-over area of northern Idaho. Lenore shatters easily and has only an intermediate level of resistance to dwarf smut.

Unlike Lenore, Greer performs poorly in wet soil locations and lacks hardness. In trials in the higher elevation cut-over areas or northern Idaho, Lenore has outranked all varieties tested.

Pope, the originator of the new varieties, reports Greer "has general adaptation to the high yielding areas of northern Idaho and has a unique combination of tolerance to dwarf smut, snowmold and stripe rust." Lenore and Greer have been named for towns on the Clearwater River.

#### Save That Grass !!

The removal of all ground cover, including grasses, is not generally prescribed as a method of noxious weed control. Sterilization of the ground is a practice limited to fire protection and other limited uses. In the long run, all attempts to render the soil barren are more effective against desirable grasses than the broadleafed weeds.

Over applicants of sterilants or popular commercial formulations such as Roundup may aggravate both the weed problem and the soil erosion problem. Areas large enough to mow should be cut regularly and treated with selective herbicides as necessary.

Roundup and other related products are best used in edging these grassy areas to facilitate mowing. The remaining healthy stand of grass with its sod layer will do much to reduce erosion and inhibit the germination of weed seed.

Please use pesticides wisely!

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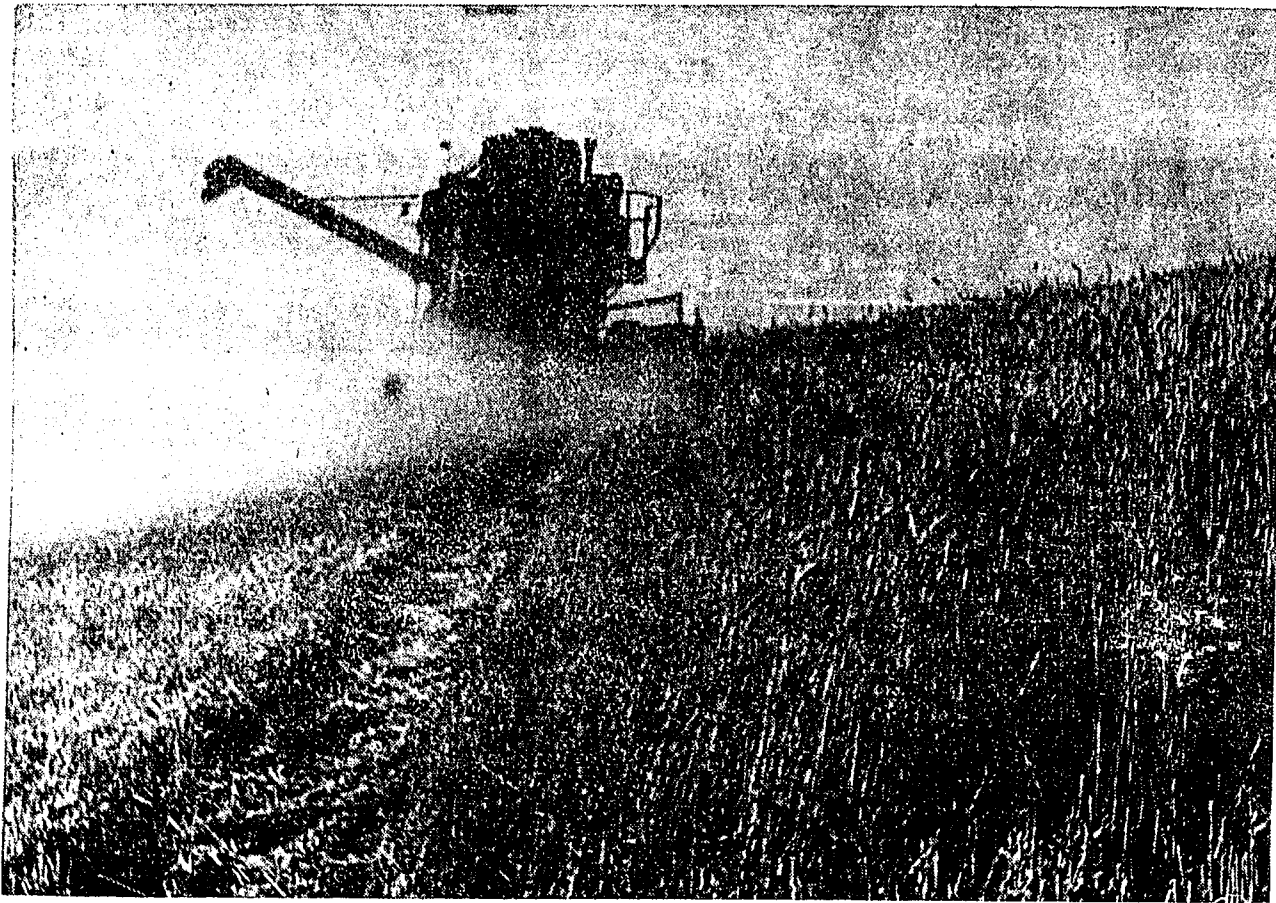

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
