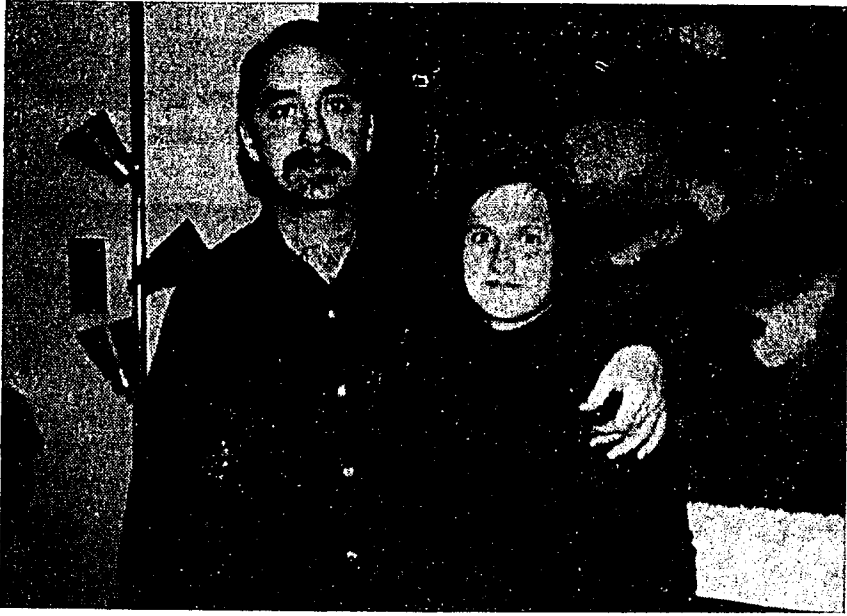


Magnuson - Winter Wedding In Nevada—

Hail Storm Damage In Genesee Area Saturday

The Genesee area, threatened several times earlier this month with electrical storms was rocked under a damaging wind, rain, hail, and electrical storm Saturday evening that caused extensive damage to crops and buildings. Accompanied by the sounds of thunder and lightning, wind, rain and hail cut a two-mile wide path from southeast to northeast of Genesee leaving an aftermath of severely damaged peas and grain fields, unrooted trees, and, in at least one instance, a demolished hay shed. Electrical power in the Lenville, Aspendale and upper Fix Ridge area was interrupted over an hour after lightning struck a power pole of Clearwater Power Co. Kendrick and the surrounding areas received only the fringe force of the storm with some rain, but much thunder and lightning. The power blinked off momentarily several times. The rapidly ripening peas and fall grains which were just starting to turn suffered damage ranging from moderate to complete loss. It will be sometime before the complete picture of the extent of the damage can be made.

Genesee Voters Approve 5-Mill Levy Override Issue on Third Attempt

The third time proved a charm for Trustees of Jt. School District No. 282, Genesee, as they took their request for a trimmed down mill levy override issue to the taxpayers Tuesday afternoon and received voter approval. In the largest turnout in school history 413 voters went to the polls casting 228 "Yes" ballots and 185 "No."

In May the District requested an 8 mill override and 163 votes were cast, total, rejecting the issue. In June the Trustees trimmed over 2 mills off the first request and saw the issue defeated again with 321 votes cast.

Then the District and Supt. Stanley went back to the drawing boards; pared the request down to 5 mills and this time the issue carried.

Trimmed from the last budget were funds for a new half-time teacher, some teacher aides, and some school re-modeling.

SHEEP SALE SET FOR AUG. 2 IN CALDWELL

Clifton Anderson, Associate Agricultural Editor Caldwell—More than 440 sheep from the University of Idaho's South west Idaho Research and Extension Center will be sold Aug. 2 at an auction sale to be held at the Treasure Valley Livestock Auction, 1900 E. Chicago, Caldwell, beginning at 10:30 a. m.

Dr. H. R. Guenther, superintendent of the UI research center, said 33 Suffolk and Panama rams will be sold. The 410 ewes and ewe lambs offered for sale include Panamias, Finn-Panama crosses, Suffolk-Panama crosses and Suffolk-Finn-Panama crosses.

Animals will be sorted by age and sold in lots of four to six rams and 10 to 12 ewes. Youth buying animals for 4-H or FFA projects will be able to bid on a lot and purchase one, two or three animals. These animals will be gate cut.

All animals will be available for viewing prior to the sale.

Consistency In Parent Behavior

To begin with, children are neither good nor bad. If they are usually happy, lively and a job to be with, their parents have helped to make them that way. If they are usually irritable, fearful, obstinate or sly, their parents have helped make them that way. Not knowingly of course. Parents arrange situations in which learnings take place. Often the arrangement is accidental and learnings occur which we don't want.

What is consistency? Consistency here means the absolute predictability of a parent's behavior. To the child, it means "every time I fail to do the dishes before I go to bed, mother will get me out of bed to do them." Or, "every time I am late for dinner, I will get nothing to eat." Or, "every night I get out of bed at night, Dad will put me back in."

To the parents, it means "every time Johnny asks for candy before supper I will say 'no,'" or "everytime Mary attacks her baby brother, I will remove one of them," or "I will always insist that Jill clean up her room on Tuesday evening before she joins the family for dinner."

Why is consistency important? To a child, the adults having authority over him are the main sources of threat, just as they are the main sources of comfort and nurturance. If much of their behavior is consistent and predictable, he feels safe. He need not spend all his energy figuring out what Mom is going to do the next time. He can concentrate on determining what other events in the world are predictable. That is, he is free to explore the world and to learn about it.

The result of consistency. Whenever a change occurs in the child's environment his whole world becomes unpredictable. An emotional response to this unpredictability will occur. With children, it takes the form of temper tantrums, or sometimes, of illness. Older children and adults experience feelings of anger, frustration and fear, or sometimes illness. When a child's life has no important points of consistency, his predictions are constantly unfulfilled.

LISTENING—

Listening for meaning can help solve problems. Good listening alone can't solve problems. But listening for meaning is an important first step.

Sometimes talking out a problem helps shrink them down to size. People have trouble dealing with problems when gripped by an emotional fever. Talking can lower their "temperature" and at other times, active listening can reveal problems at a deeper level.

Active listening is a way to help a person define his own problem. When you listen actively, you listen hard for the speaker's feelings. Then

SUNCHOKE PROVIDES FLOWERS AND TUBERS

Moscow—The old Jerusalem artichoke has a new name—sunchoke. Horticultural experts say the old name was misleading because the tuber-bearing sunflower is not an artichoke and did not originate in the land of the Bible.

A native of North America, the sunchoke was introduced into Europe in the 17th century. In Italy it was called "girasole" and gardeners in England mistakenly believed this meant "Jerusalem." Actually, the meaning of "girasole" is "turning to the sun."

A sunflower growing six to nine feet tall, the sunchoke is fairly attractive as a background planting or for bedding. The yellow flowers do not set for the seed. Underground

tubers are harvested for food and are used as planting stock.

Sunchoke tubers may be eaten raw or prepared for the table in the same way that potatoes are used.

Many seed companies sell tubers for planting. Produce counters at supermarkets and health food stores are other sources of tubers.

Sunchoke tubers may be planted in spring as soon as the ground can be worked. They should be planted 4 inches deep and spaced about 24 inches apart in the row, the rows being spaced 36 to 40 inches apart.

Idaho gardeners may expect to harvest about three bushels of sunchoke tubers per 100 feet of row.

Sunchoke tubers are thin-skinned and do not store nearly as well as potato tubers.

Idaho Construction Activity Declines

During June, building permit construction activity in Idaho unmistakably dropped below last year's pace, said James Hoogland, Jr., and Stan Merrill, managers, quoting the Idaho Construction Report. The Report, a monthly publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A., to be distributed this week, is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist of First Security Corporation.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in June was \$48,298,937, representing a 6.6% decline from 1977 value for the same period.

New residential construction was off both in number and value compared to a year ago. A total of 894 dwelling units valued at \$28,148,206 were started last month, down 16.4% in number and 8.9% in value from June, 1977 figures.

Nonresidential construction valued at \$12,561,482 was down 3.9% from last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$7,589,249 were down 1.9%.

Year-to-date statistics also reflect the slowed construction pace. During the first six months of 1978, a total of 5,501 building permits for new dwelling units have been authorized, down 8.5% from last year. This deduction in residential construction volume was evident statewide. In the January-June period permits for new dwelling units were down 7.8% in northern Idaho, down 3.6% in southwestern Idaho, down 5.9% in eastern Idaho and down 35% in southeastern Idaho.

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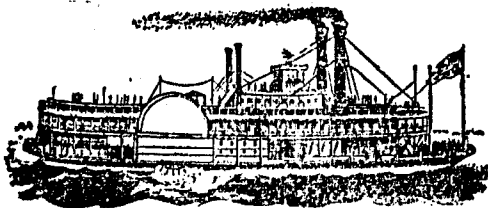
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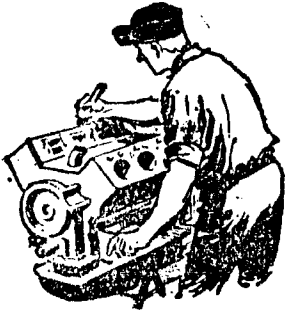

ORDINANCE NO. 579

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 191, VACATING THE WEST 45 FEET OF THAT PART OF BROWN STREET BETWEEN WILLOW STREET AND MAIN STREET, SUBJECT TO EXCEPTIONS FOR EXISTING FRANCHISES AND RESERVING CERTAIN EASEMENTS FOR WATER AND SEWER LINES; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF DEEDS TO OWNERS OF LAND ABUTTING ON THE VACATED STREET, AND AUTHORIZING THAT THE DESCRIPTION INCLUDE PART OF SAID STREET HERETOFORE VACATED; PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. That the ordinance passed on April 11, 1923, as Ordinance No. 191 of the City of Kendrick be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 2. That the West 45 feet of that part of Brown Street between Blocks 96 and 97 of Oaks Addition to Kendrick, Idaho, as shown by the recorded plat thereof, and lying and being between Willow Street and Main Street in said Oaks Addition be, and the same hereby is, vacated.

Section 3. That the aforesaid part of Brown Street is vacated SUBJECT TO the rights granted to telephone and other utility companies by ordinances of franchise heretofore enacted by Ordinance of the City of Kendrick, and RESERVING unto the City of Kendrick easements over, under and across the above described vacated portion of Brown Street for the location, construction, installation, removal, maintenance, repair and replacement of water, drainage and sewer lines, mains and connections, for all other purposes of every nature pertaining thereto, together with the right of ingress and egress to and from said premises for the purposes aforesaid.

Section 4. That the Mayor and the Council of the City of Kendrick, Idaho, be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed, in the name of and on behalf of the City of Kendrick, to execute and deliver to the owners of land abutting on said vacated street proper quitclaim deeds conveying to said owners the proper portion thereof as is provided by law, SUBJECT TO the exceptions and reservations set forth in Section 3. above.

Section 5. That this Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

Recruiting Starts for Orofino YACC Camp

About 35 enrollee positions with the Young Adult Conservation Corps (YACC) residential camp at Orofino are now available, according to camp director Ray Tate.

Tate said the enrollees must be between 16 and 23 and must be out of school and unemployed. Students who will be enrolled in school in the fall cannot hire on for the summer only, Tate said. Enrollees can remain in the program for up to one year.

Enrollees will be paid the Federal minimum wage, \$2.65 an hour. Those with supervisory ability may be selected for crew leader positions which will pay higher than the minimum wage.

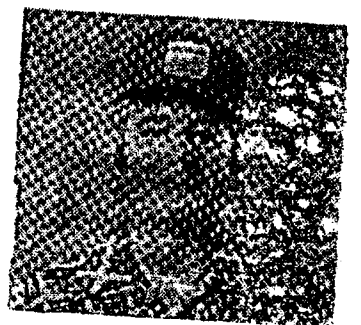

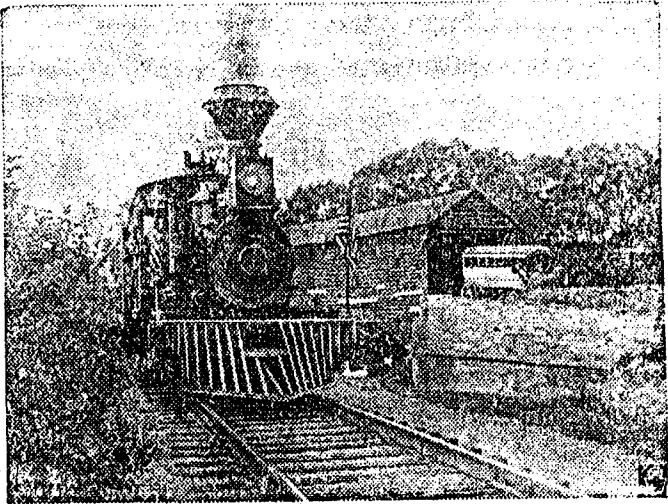

Take a Leisurely Ride . . .

Through America's Past



DEARBORN, MI—Visitors to Greenfield Village in Dearborn, Michigan can choose from any of ten leisurely ways to view 300 years of American History.

While walking is the oldest and still the most complete method, many choose one or more historical modes of transportation available for at least part of their tour of the past. Two vintage steam locomotives offer a panoramic view of the 240-acre Village. The 1873 "Torch Lake" and 1868 "Mason #1" each carry 210 passengers around the outer perimeter.

For a closer casual trip through the historic settings, visitors can choose a narrated carriage tour which will brief them on major points of interest. Both a haywagon and a survey provide shorter glimpses into our past. Children find the pony wagon an exciting method of traveling without adults along.

Naturally, the opportunities for an unhurried pace wouldn't be complete without a horseless carriage. This takes the form of a Model T ride which carries passengers past such sites as the Wright Brother's cycle shop.

Also part of Greenfield Village, Suanee Park complex provides transportation for those who don't want to go anywhere. The sternwheeler "Suanee," a 60-foot version of an 1880 riverboat, meanders slowly around Suanee Island for a tranquil six-minute excursion. Passage to the rustic island is possible on a Toin Sawyer-like electrically-powered raft.

Finally, a 1913 carousel travels in a 42 foot circle to the sound of a Wurlitzer band organ.

The opportunity to take one or more of the peaceful rides allows visitors the chance to save their feet for the 2 1/2 miles of exhibits available in adjacent Henry Ford Museum.

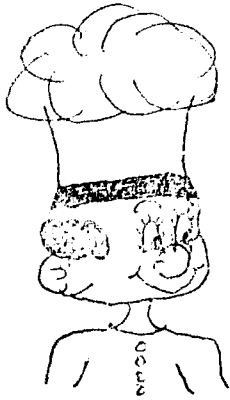
